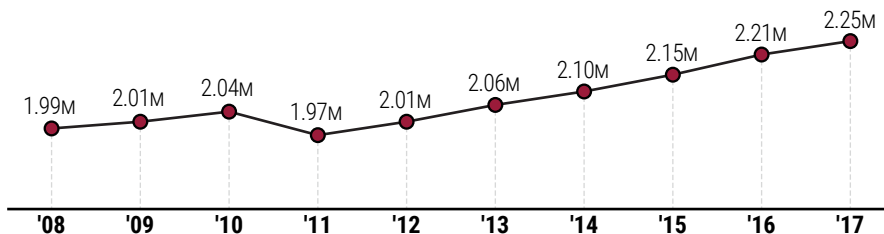

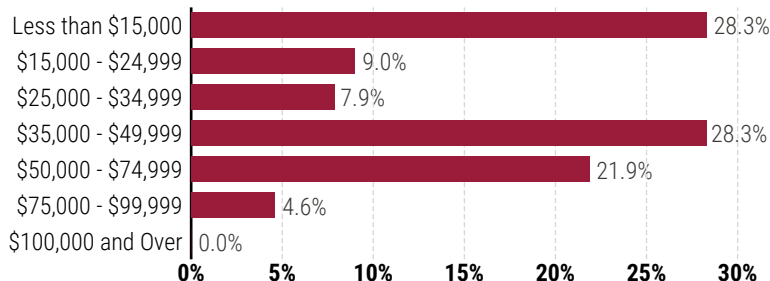

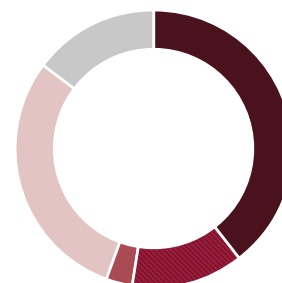

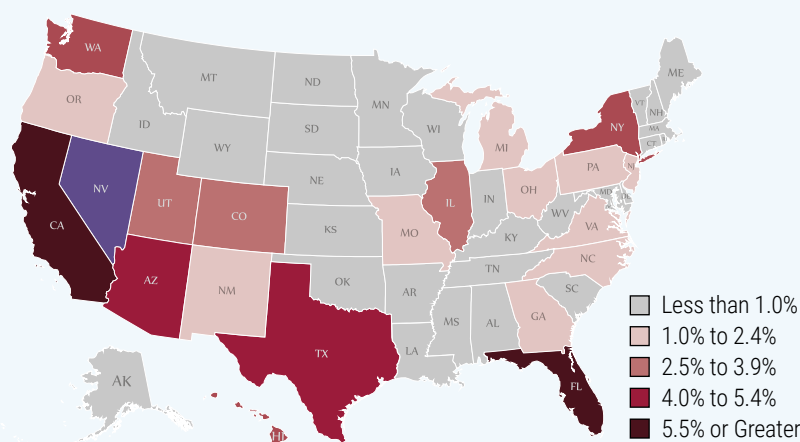


State of Origin

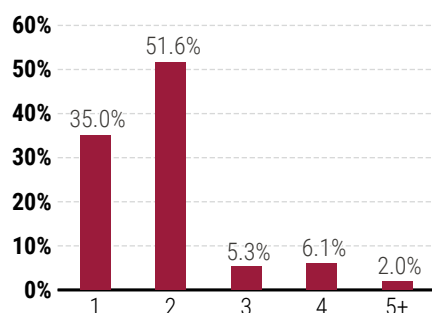

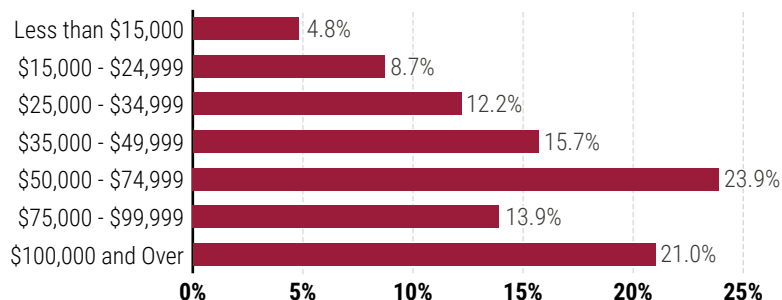

About the Index

The Council for Community and Economic Research, C2ER, produces the Cost of Living Index to provide a useful and reasonably accurate measure of living cost differences among urban areas. Items on which the Index is based have been carefully chosen to reflect the different categories of consumer expenditures. Weights assigned to relative costs are based on government survey data on expenditure patterns for professional and executive households. All items are priced in each place at a specified time and according to standardized specifications.

Interpreting the Index

The Cost of Living Index measures relative price levels for consumer goods and services in participating areas. The average for all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, equals 100, and each participant's index is read as a percentage of the average for all places.

GROCERY ITEMS: Ribeye steak, ground beef or hamburger meat, pork sausage, frying chicken, chunk light tuna, whole milk, eggs, margarine, grated parmesan cheese, potatoes, bananas, iceberg lettuce, whole wheat bread, fresh orange juice, vacuum-packed coffee, white sugar, corn flakes, sweet peas, peaches, facial tissue, dishwashing powder, extra virgin olive oil, frozen prepared food, frozen corn, potato chips and soft drinks. **HOUSING:** Apartment rent for 950 square feet, the full purchase price of a 2,400-square-foot house and current mortgage rates.

UTILITIES: Monthly electricity, natural gas, heating oil (if applicable), and telephone. **TRANSPORTATION:** Includes auto maintenance and gasoline. **HEALTHCARE:** Office visits to optometrist, doctor and dentist. Non-prescription drugs and prescription drugs. **MISCELLANEOUS GOODS & SERVICES:** Hamburger sandwiches, pizza, fried chicken, haircut, beauty care, toothpaste, shampoo, dry cleaning, men's dress shirt, boy's jeans, women's slacks, major appliance repair, newspaper subscription, movie, tennis balls, veterinary services, beer, wine and drop-in yoga class.

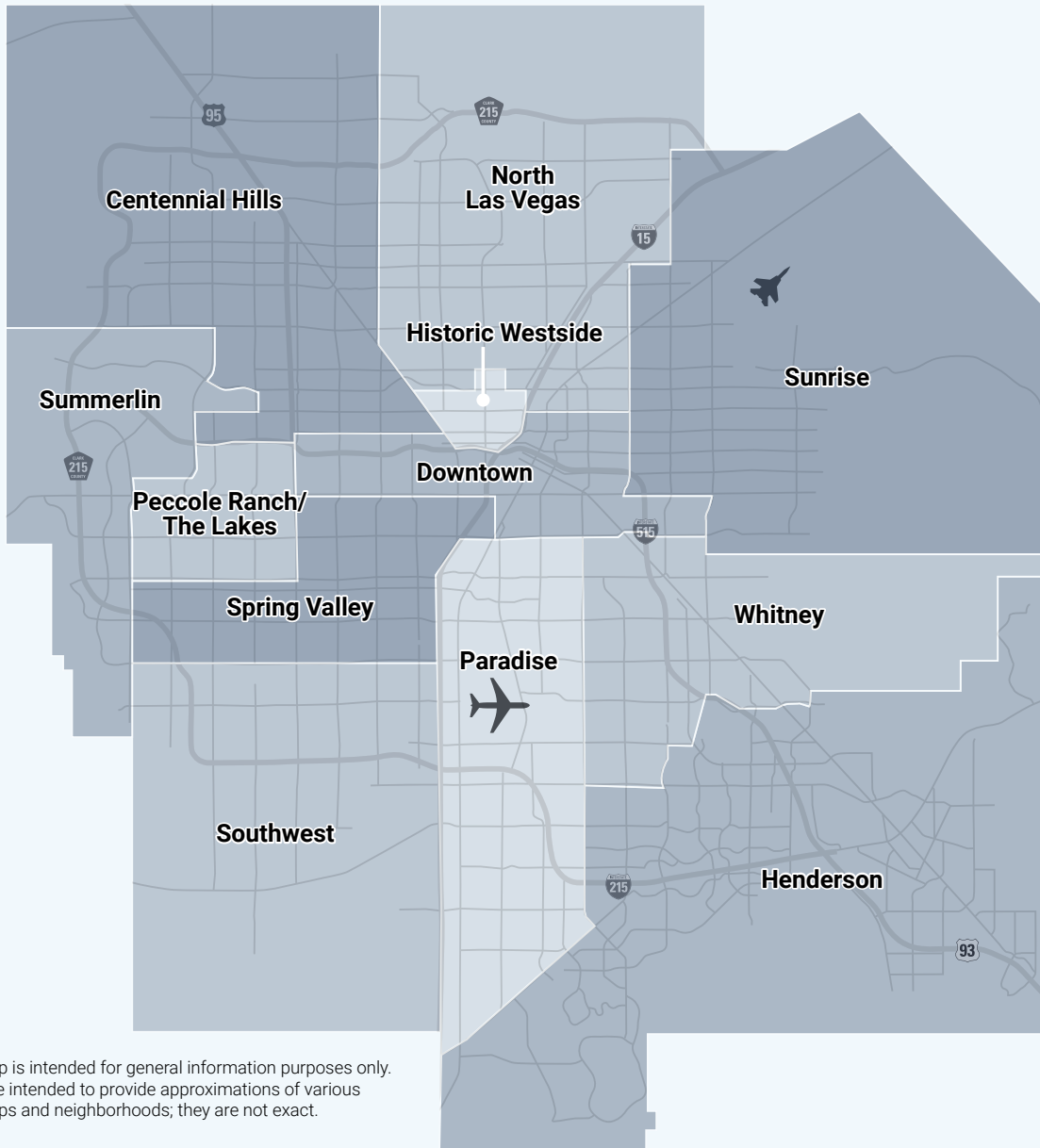

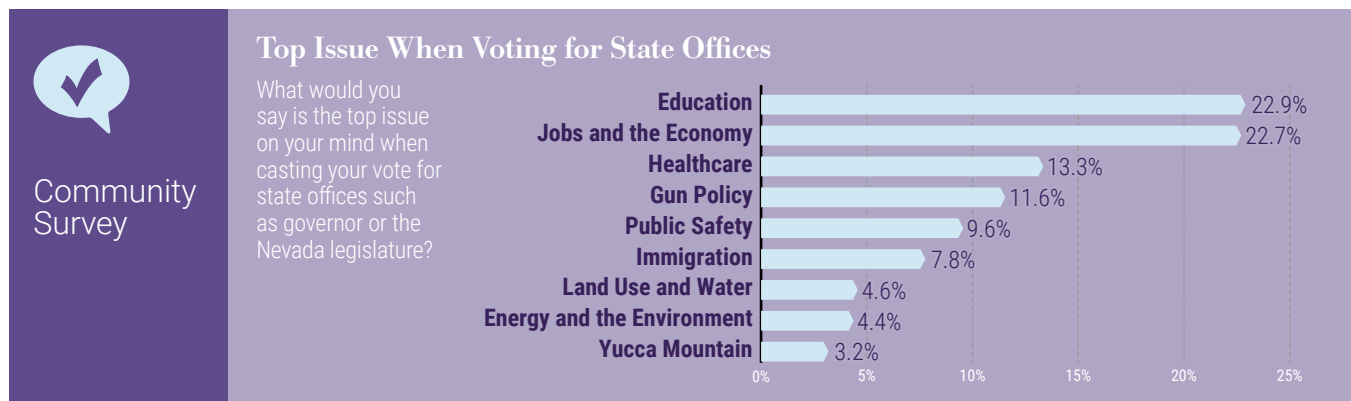

Clark County

With jurisdiction over the world-famous Las Vegas Strip and covering an area the size of New Jersey, Clark County, is the nation's 14th-largest county. If Clark County's unincorporated area were a city, it would be the largest in Nevada. Clark County is governed by a seven-member County Commission, elected from geographic districts on a partisan basis for staggered four-year terms. Commissioners biennially elect a chairperson who serves as the Commission's presiding officer. The Commission, in turn, hires a county manager who is responsible for administrative operations. Clark County employs more than 10,000 people over 38 departments. It has a fiscal year general fund of \$1.3 billion, and a total budget of \$6.5 billion. The County is known for its strong ending-fund balance, overall financial strength, and an investment-quality credit rating. Clark County, formed in 1909, is named for Sen. William Andrews Clark, who established the railroad that linked Los Angeles with Salt Lake City. Las Vegas was founded in 1905, after Clark's railroad purchased land for a town site and sold lots via auction, creating Downtown Las Vegas.

- › Clark County, the state's largest local government with jurisdiction over the Las Vegas Strip and its economic development program, are dedicated to attracting new businesses to southern Nevada and strengthening the local economy.
- › McCarran International Airport, located in Clark County, is the 8th-busiest airport in the country, offering direct access to hundreds of cities across the world. This assures our businesses have access to their customers and markets, making Clark County an attractive place to invest.
- › Our business-friendly climate and low tax structure – not to mention our top-notch quality of life and great weather – are further inducements to build and grow a business in Clark County.
- › In the past year, Clark County has seen more than \$315 million in new investments, creating over 720 new jobs.

Specifically, the office works on building relationships with perspective business clients through facilitating positive interactions and experiences within comprehensive planning and other county departments such as zoning and building requirements. The office works with other local agencies and the Nevada Governor's Office of Economic Development (GOED) in order to help provide and determine any needs-based requirements the client may have, as well as possible incentives that may be offered to promote a new business or relocation of existing business to the county.

Las Vegas

Las Vegas was founded as a city on May 15, 1905, when 110 acres of land were auctioned off by the Union Pacific Railroad. Las Vegas was incorporated on June 1, 1911. The city is divided into six wards with an elected representative for each ward. The mayor is elected at large to serve the entire community.

The city of Las Vegas is a council-manager form of government, combining the strong political leadership of elected officials, with the vigorous managerial experience of an appointed city manager. All policies and major budget decisions rest with the City Council, with the city manager charged with running the day-to-day operations of the organization.

Today, the city's core is in the midst of a renaissance, inspiring key projects such as The Smith Center for the Performing Arts and the Cleveland Clinic Lou Ruvo Center for Brain Health, both located at Symphony Park, a 61-acre development in the heart of the city. Other key downtown projects like the Mob Museum, Neon Museum, DISCOVERY Children's Museum, the Las Vegas Premium Outlets and the Zappos.com headquarters have brought an economic influx to the place where Las Vegas started.

In addition, the Las Vegas City Council has prioritized the Las Vegas Medical District, which is emerging as one of the most important economic development projects in southern Nevada. With the health and well-being of the community in mind, the medical district is a collaborative effort between the city and the downtown Las Vegas medical & university community, aimed at becoming the clinical care, research, wellness and education and training center of southern Nevada as well as the premier academic medical district in the southwestern United States.

The Smart City Transportation Master Plan is another way the city of Las Vegas is leading the way in essential areas of innovation. The city's philosophy is "mobility for all" and this led the city to establish an Innovation District. This demonstration site is within downtown Las Vegas and allows testing of new technologies. As a result of a study that concluded driverless vehicles would change the landscape of mobility, the city began an exploration of this technology. The city implemented a test site for a driverless shuttle operating on a 0.6-mile loop in mixed traffic within the Fremont East Entertainment District. There are also six traffic signals downtown that are outfitted with Dedicated Short Range Communication (DSRC) radios that broadcast signal timing and phasing. The installation of the DSRC on the traffic signals was the main infrastructure modification made for the project, which aids the driverless shuttle in recognizing traffic signal phases.

Downtown Las Vegas is also home and host to the Downtown Project, a private catalyst for new and inventive businesses, which includes the Downtown Container Park among its investments. Apart from the Downtown Project, the Fremont East Entertainment District, the Fremont Street Experience along with projects under construction by Derek Stevens, Main Street, 18b The Las Vegas Arts District, multiple restaurants and small businesses are all breathing a fresh, hip vibe into the area.

City of Mesquite



Mesquite, a municipality with 20,000 people, is located approximately 80 miles northeast of Las Vegas along Interstate 15 near the Nevada/Arizona border. Nestled in the heart of the Virgin River Valley, Mesquite, is known for its stunning natural beauty, low cost of living, and high quality of life.

For decades, Mesquite has been known as a tourism and recreation destination, with seven championship golf courses and more outdoor recreation within a 100-mile radius of its boundaries than any other city in the western U.S.

In recent years, Mesquite has also become known as a top place to do business. In 2015, the Boyd Company, a noted site selection firm, rated Mesquite as one of the top 25 U.S. locations for new distribution warehouse operations.

Mesquite sits exactly 365 miles between Los Angeles, CA and Salt Lake City, UT and has approximately 4,000 acres of industrial land available for commercial development, with abundant water supplies. Mesquite has improved the transportation infrastructure access by building an all new freeway exit to serve the industrial core of the community. As southern Nevada's regional economy expands, Mesquite is well positioned to take advantage of its diverse industrial growth.

Services Provided: As an Unincorporated Township, Laughlin’s municipal-type services are provided by Clark County, its subsidiary districts, and several metropolitan-type regional districts, including police, fire, water, sewer, streets, parks and recreation, library, transit (24-hour fixed-route service), flood control, tourism, and schools. The Clark County Commission is assisted by an elected 5-member Town Advisory Board.

The county and special districts have invested significantly into infrastructure for diversification to help the community grow. The community has plenty of water, drawn directly from the Colorado River, and sewer services for domestic, commercial, and industrial use.

Business Development: The Laughlin Economic Development Corporation provides business development and site selection resources for businesses and industries wishing to locate in the township of some 80 square miles, of which only about 6 square miles are developed. The LEDC works closely with the county’s Town Manager’s Office, LVGEA and the Nevada Governor’s Office of Economic Development.

Some 14 square miles of vacant land extends to the California and Arizona borders immediately south of the Big Bend State Park, which the 4-lane Needles Highway (15 miles to Interstate 40) bisects. A county-commissioned study showed industrial, commercial, and residential areas feasible for development. Also, the electric utilities that own a 4 square mile block in the middle of town, have offered more than 2,000 acres for sale to a master developer – with all utilities and roads surrounding the site of a former electric generating station that has been removed.

Laughlin

Nevada’s southern-most community, Laughlin, is nestled between the Colorado River and the mountains at the point where Nevada, California, and Arizona meet in the desert.

Home to some 11,000 residents, the modern community includes retirees from every career imaginable who are better-off financially than average and higher educated than average. Most pay cash for their homes in the residential area called Upper Laughlin at the base of the mountains overlooking the Colorado River.

Laughlin also enjoys two visitor seasons a year, attracting some 2 million visitors annually. In the mild winters, “snowbirds” flock to the community in their RVs. In the summer, Laughlin draws water-worshipping/sun-loving visitors with their watercrafts whom share the aquatic, eastern Nevada border with the community’s water taxis and riverboats.

Laughlin also is home to Nevada’s Big Bend State Recreational Park, complete with full service RV hookups and services, and the Clark County-operated Colorado River Heritage Greenway Park and Trails for walking, hiking, bicycling, equestrian use, and picnic and fishing facilities. It extends several miles from Davis Dam, which forms Lake Mohave, downstream to a scenic pedestrian bridge over Nevada Highway 163 that extends into Downtown Laughlin. Ten casinos, many with high-rise towers providing tremendous views of the water, slopes, and mountains framing Laughlin to the east and west, provide gambling, dining, entertainment, and shopping in a 2 mile strip, and the Laughlin River Walk between the resorts and the water’s edge.

As part of the Las Vegas Metropolitan Statistical Area, Laughlin is also a distinct part of the tri-state river communities’ Mohave Valley, extending to Needles, Calif., and Golden Shores on the south at Interstate 40 upriver to Bullhead City and the Lake Mohave section of the Lake Mead National Recreation Area on the north.

Laughlin is ripe for Vegas Valley businesses to open branch stores and offices in the community. As the area’s primary advocate for sensible growth, the Laughlin Economic Development Corporation, provides networking, promotion, professional services, and site location assistance.

Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC)

The Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC) is the only agency nationwide that manages public transit, traffic management, roadway planning and funding, in addition to administering Southern Nevada Strong, our regional plan, all under one roof. The RTC creates an efficient and effective transportation system that promotes mobility as a key driver to an economically vibrant community.

As the transportation planning organization for southern Nevada, the RTC works with local municipalities to plan, fund and launch infrastructure projects that improve southern Nevada's roads and transportation options. To meet the region's growing transportation needs, the RTC worked with elected officials and the local community to enact FRI in 2013, which voters approved to extend for another 10 years during the November 2016 election.

As the region's transit agency, the RTC provides 39 bus routes throughout the valley. Recognized as one of the most efficient transit systems in the U.S., the RTC fixed-route system sees approximately 64 million passenger trips a year with a fleet of more than 400 vehicles. The agency is committed to converting nearly all of its fleet to compressed natural gas (CNG) vehicles over the next several years to help improve the valley's air quality.

The RTC's traffic management center, the Freeway and Arterial System of Transportation (FAST), uses intelligent technology to monitor traffic flow, identify detours, adjust traffic signals and keep vehicles moving as smoothly as possible. Working in coordination with local jurisdictions, NHP and NDOT, FAST's regional coordination has been advantageous to southern Nevada and private industry alike. It has enticed globally recognized companies such as Audi to launch innovative technologies and pilot demonstrations on the streets of southern Nevada.

As the region's metropolitan planning organization, the RTC engages in transportation-related planning studies and coordinates the long-term collaborative planning effort called Southern Nevada Strong (SNS). The SNS Implementation Office coordinates with regional partners to execute the plan's goals of providing access to reliable transportation, increasing housing options for all income levels, ensuring quality education, and strengthening social services and healthcare networks.

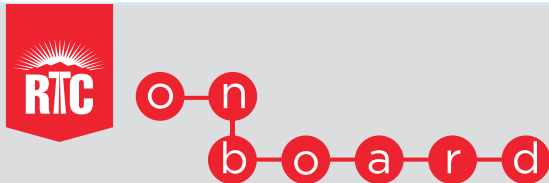

And since southern Nevadans voted to extend FRI until 2026, our community will benefit from continued economic development from future transportation infrastructure projects. The extension of FRI is expected to create up to \$3 billion in funding and up to 25,000 jobs over the next 10 years.

2017 RTC Accomplishments

- › The RTC launched “On Board”, a visionary transit study to identify how enhancements to the current bus system, new high capacity transit services and emerging transit technologies can improve mobility. The RTC also debuted a customized 40-foot bus that travels the valley to gather community input on the plan.
- › As administrator of Southern Nevada Strong (SNS), the RTC led the development of a regional grant competitiveness strategy with local non-profit leaders and held its annual summit focused on regionalism with Oklahoma City Mayor Mick Cornett.
- › To improve transportation infrastructure, the RTC issued \$150 million of Fuel Revenue Indexing (FRI) bonds, bringing the total FRI bond issuances to \$335 million. Thanks to responsible fiscal management and oversight, the agency saved \$2 million in interest.
- › RTC Bike Share celebrated its inaugural year, with more than 9,000 passes sold for more than 18,000 rides spanning 60,000 miles.
- › Also, in its first year, the rideRTC app was downloaded more than 115,000 times, with riders purchasing more than 300,000 passes.
- › The RTC added 38,000 service hours to the public transit system and launched the Vegas Golden Knights (VGK) Express.
- › Free Wi-Fi was also installed on all RTC fixed-route vehicles, enhancing the customer experience and enabling better real-time tracking of a vehicle’s location and estimated arrival time.
- › A 2017 transit ridership survey found RTC’s favorability among its riders five times the transit industry average.
- › The RTC and its partners deployed major technology projects to enhance transportation safety and efficiency in southern Nevada.



The Southern Nevada Transit Coalition

The Southern Nevada Transit Coalition was incorporated in June of 2002 as part of the Nevada Department of Transportation’s Public Rural Ride (Pride) program. Silver Rider Transit is the organizational branding of the Southern Nevada Transit Coalition.

Currently, Silver Rider offers transportation opportunities in eleven communities in southern Nevada: Mesquite, Laughlin, Indian Springs, Logandale, Overton, Moapa Valley, Glendale, Searchlight, Cal-Nev-Ari, Palm Gardens and Boulder City.

The Las Vegas Monorail

The Las Vegas Monorail has been transporting residents and visitors throughout the Las Vegas Strip on its zero-emissions trains for nearly 14 years. Leisure and business travelers comprise the vast majority of its millions of annual riders, though a number of Las Vegas residents have discovered the benefits of the Monorail getting to and from concerts, fights, Vegas Golden Knights games at the T-Mobile Arena and other events along Las Vegas Boulevard. As younger travelers and international visitors alike tend to utilize rail and transit modes more frequently, it's no surprise that 30 percent of Monorail riders are Millennials and more than 30 percent are international visitors to Las Vegas.

In 2017, the Monorail developed the technology interface to all conventions and tradeshows to integrate transit fares directly into attendees' badges, requiring only a quick tap of their show badge on Monorail faregates to ride the system. Several integrations were completed with multiple major, citywide tradeshows—including the National Association of Broadcasters, CONEXPO – Con/Agg, CES and PackExpo, with more to come.

As a long-established leader in providing driverless transit technology, the Monorail continues to be an early adopter of emerging technology solutions that enhance the rider experience. It has introduced mobile e-ticketing, allowing guests to purchase Monorail fares online and have it delivered to their mobile device; at the fare gates, they can simply scan the QR code and go. In addition, it is poised to provide a first-ever transit service solution in partnership with one of the world's most recognizable technology companies in early 2018.

As Las Vegas' most clean mass transit resource, the Monorail, aided in the annual removal of an estimated 2.2 million vehicle miles from southern Nevada's major roadways, reducing emissions by more than 28 tons of carbon monoxide (CO), volatile organic compounds (VOC) and nitrogen oxides (NOx) over the course of 2017.

The Las Vegas Monorail has seven stations: MGM Grand, Bally's/Paris Las Vegas, Flamingo/Caesars Palace, Harrah's/The LINQ, Las Vegas Convention Center, Westgate Resort & Casino, and SLS Las Vegas. Trains arrive every few minutes at each station, enabling passengers to travel the length of the Strip in less than 15 minutes in a safe, clean, and climate-controlled environment. Hours of operation are Monday 7 a.m.-midnight, Tuesday-Thursday 7 a.m.-2 a.m., and Friday-Sunday 7 a.m.-3 a.m. A single ride ticket costs \$5 (\$1 for Nevada residents) and unlimited ride passes are available as well.

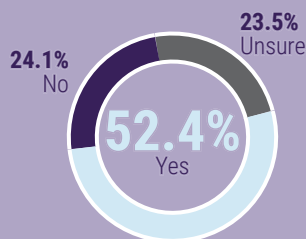

Now more than a quarter-century old, the Las Vegas Bowl has been held each December since 1992 at Sam Boyd Stadium. The first bowl game in the nation owned and operated by ESPN Events, the game has boasted eight sell-outs in recent years. Hosting the top choice from the Mountain West vs. a Pacific-12 Conference opponent, the bowl has featured at least one ranked team in 11 of the last 12 games, including last year's 38-28 victory by No. 25 Boise State over Oregon before the ninth-biggest crowd in event history.

Las Vegas 51s

The Las Vegas organization has the proud distinction of being the longest enduring franchise in the history of professional sports in the state of Nevada. The 2018 campaign will mark the 36th Pacific Coast League season in the Silver State. The franchise has reached the 300,000 plateau in "home" attendance in all 35 seasons! Las Vegas' all-time attendance total at Cashman Field now stands at 11,668,787.

Cashman Field opened in 1983 with the Stars, the Triple-A affiliate of the San Diego Padres. The Stars were the home team for 18 years (1983-2000), until the franchise switched affiliations to the Los Angeles Dodgers in 2001. The franchise also unveiled a new alien theme logo, based on the semi-secret government base known as "Area 51." The team nickname was changed from the Stars to 51s. The 51s were affiliated with the Dodgers for eight seasons (2001-08). Las Vegas then signed a Player Development Contract (PDC) with the Toronto Blue Jays and spent four seasons as the top affiliate of the Blue Jays (2009-12). Las Vegas, on Sept. 17, 2012, then announced a two-year PDC with the New York Mets (2013-14). The two teams then renewed the PDC twice since on August 28, 2014 and August 30, 2016, for two more seasons through the 2018 campaign! The 51s will have a "new" PDC in 2019 (MLB affiliate is TBA). The Mets will be moving their affiliation to Triple-A Syracuse of the International League.

Tony DeFrancesco will enter his first season as manager of Triple-A Las Vegas in the 2018 campaign. In 2017, Las Vegas compiled an 56-86 record (.394) and finished in fourth place in the PCL Pacific Southern Division, behind El Paso. The 51s, under manager Wally Backman, captured the Southern Division Championship in back-to-back seasons (2013 & 2014) with a record of 81-63 (.563) in consecutive campaigns.

Wrangler National Finals Rodeo (NFR)

The Wrangler National Finals Rodeo opened with a tribute to 1 October and continued its 33rd year in Las Vegas in early December. Known as the world's richest and most prestigious rodeo, the Wrangler NFR had a total event attendance of 170,750 over the 10 days of competition. The event attracted the top 120 rodeo athletes in the world, vying for a share of the \$10 million purse and the coveted gold buckle. The event has now sold out more than 300 consecutive performances. According to the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority, the estimated total economic impact in 2017 for the event was \$113 million.

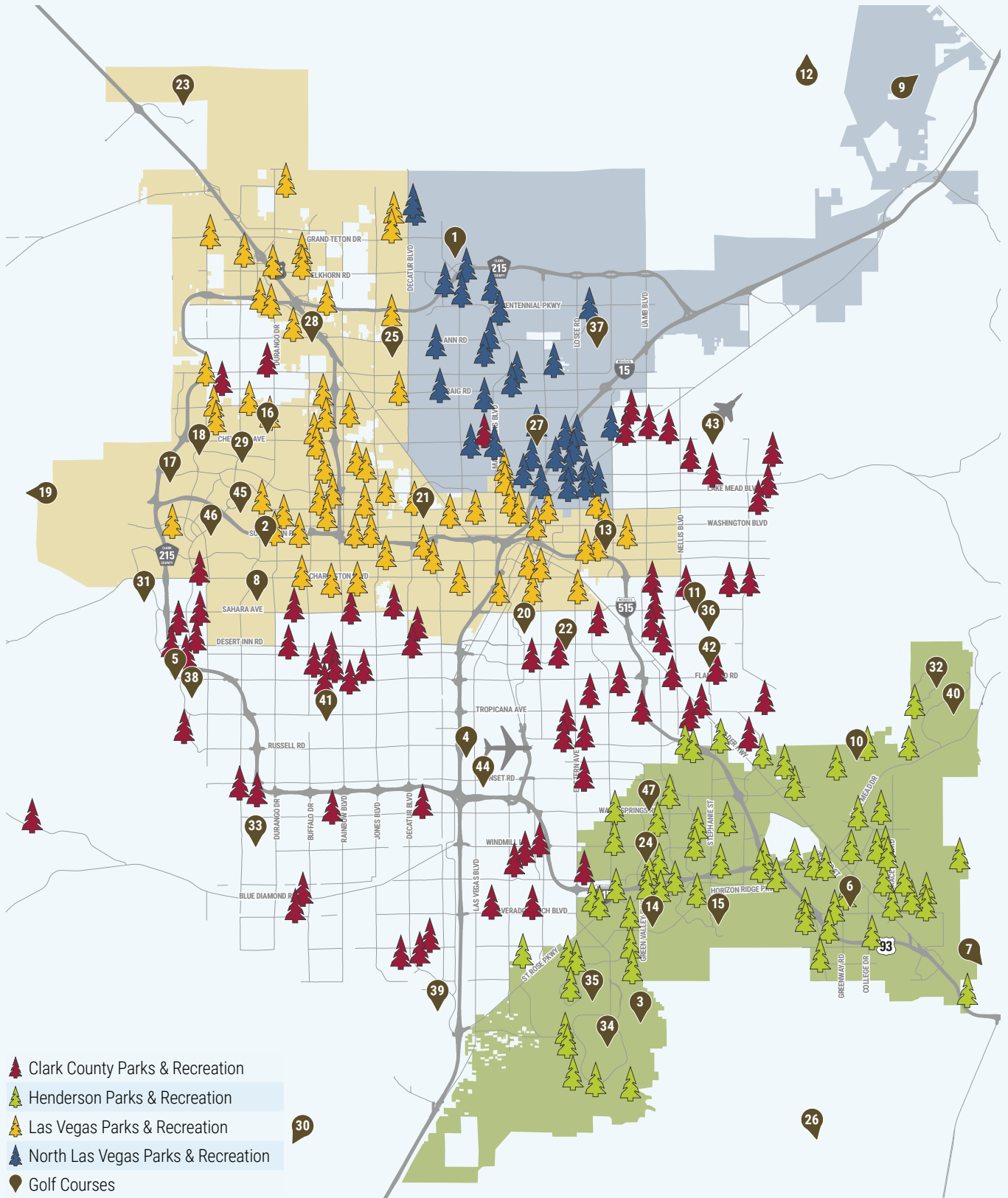
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Las Vegas Valley Recreation Map

In 30 minutes, you can arrive at Lake Mead, where you can boat, fish, hike and camp, and explore the Colorado River’s Black Canyon by kayak. Miss the snow? In the winter, Mt. Charleston (over 11,916 feet high) beckons with snow-capped mountains just 40 miles northwest of Las Vegas while providing a lush, cool retreat in the summer. Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area, offers rust-colored rock formations, as well as sandstone and limestone cliffs and bluffs that ascend as high as 7,000 feet. A mere hour from Las Vegas, Valley of Fire, amazes with beautiful landscapes, 3,000-year-old petroglyphs, and is jeweled by wildflowers in the spring. There is so much more... from Clark County Wetlands Park to the premier mountain biking at Boulder City’s Bootleg Canyon. All reasons why, if you love the outdoors, you belong in Las Vegas.

Bonnie Springs, Old Nevada

Only a half hour from the Las Vegas Strip, Bonnie Springs Ranch was originally built in 1843 as a stopover for the wagon trains going to California down the Old Spanish Trail. The ranch lies in the heart of Nevada's iconic Red Rock Canyon and serves the desert community as a reprieve from the bustle of the city and recalls the West's quieter, scenic past. In 1846, General Fremont, on his way to California, stopped at what is now Bonnie Springs Ranch to gear up for his trip through Death Valley. In 1958 the ranch opened to the public as a tourist attraction that features stables, a petting zoo, a restaurant and Old Town-reproduction of an 1880s mining community along with a functioning saloon, shops, wax museum, wedding chapel, a replica schoolhouse, and daily performances/reenactments honoring the Old West. The ranch subsequently

added a full-sized event arena that has hosted numerous rodeos and equestrian events. Today the grounds represent a delight for locals and tourists alike (as well as a few filmmakers). It is often called "an oasis in the desert", where visitors can stop for a cool drink of spring water and remains the only opportunity for travelers seeking lodging, dining, and gambling in Red Rock Canyon. The restaurant is open daily from 9am to 9pm. The Bonnie Springs Ranch Petting Zoo offers your family an exciting opportunity to view a wide variety of animals, both native and non-native, including wolves and Australian emus and wallabies. There are horses available for riding, pony rides for the kids and scenic train rides. For more information call (702) 875-4191.

Gold Butte National Monument

On December 28, 2016, President Obama designated Gold Butte as a National Monument. Gold Butte, Nevada's piece of the Grand Canyon, is home to countless cultural, historic, and natural wonders that make this area so unique and are now preserved for future generations. For decades, Nevadans have been working to protect the nationally significant cultural, historic, and natural treasures in Gold Butte and today their hard work has paid off.

The new Gold Butte National Monument covers nearly 300,000 acres of remote and rugged desert landscape in southeastern Nevada, where dramatically chiseled red sandstone, twisting canyons, and tree-clad mountains punctuate desolate stretches of the Mojave Desert. The brightly hued sandstone provides a

stunning canvas for the area's famously beautiful rock art, and the desert provides critical habitat. The area is popular for outdoor recreation and visitors to the monument can hike to rock art sites, drive the Gold Butte Backcountry Byway to the area's namesake mining ghost town, view desert bighorn sheep, or tour the area's peaks and canyons on horseback.

Gold Butte National Monument lies east of the Overton Arm of Lake Mead, west of the Arizona border, south of Virgin Peak, and north of the Colorado River. In this region, the Great Basin, Mojave, Sonoran and Colorado Plateau eco-regions all meet, each contributing a colorful piece to the region.

Hoover Dam & Lake Mead National Recreation Area



The Bureau of Reclamation has offered tours of this National Historic Landmark since 1937. Today, Hoover Dam draws nearly one million visitors per year. Considered to be the world's largest dam and an engineering marvel at the time of its construction in the 1930s, the dam straddles the mighty Colorado River, which forms the border between the states of Nevada and Arizona. The American Society of Civil Engineers rates it as one of America's seven modern civil engineering wonders. The Hoover Dam is a curved gravity dam. Lake Mead pushes against the dam, creating compressive forces that travel along the great curved wall. The canyon walls push back, counteracting these forces. This action squeezes the concrete in the arch together, making the dam very rigid. Today, the Hoover Dam is the second highest dam in the country and the 18th highest in the world. It generates more than four billion kilowatt-hours (kWh) per year, enough to serve 1.3 million people. The visitor center is open from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. For tour information please call (702) 494-2517.

The Iconic Spillway House is a fantastic new addition to Hoover Dam. It is one of the most unique event venues in Nevada and Arizona offering panoramic views of both Lake Mead and Hoover Dam.

The Spillway House is LEED Gold Certified facility with solar panels atop of the building that are estimated to produce approximately 24,000 kWh for the building, which offsets the energy requirement from Hoover Dam's station service generator. This multi-use building is designed to be 'flexible', which means a portion of it can be used for meetings or conferences while the rest of the structure is open to the public for viewing exhibits. The building can provide space for up to 200 guests for various events in nearly 6,000 square feet of gorgeous space. Located approximately 100 yards north of the dam on the Nevada side of the canyon on the west bank of Lake Mead, it was originally named the Snacketeria providing food and a gift vending location for visitors for several years.

Lake Mead National Recreation Area is one of America's most diverse national recreation areas offering boating, hiking, cycling, camping and fishing. Spreading across 1.5 million acres of mountains, canyons, valleys and two vast lakes this year-round playground offers striking landscapes and brilliant blue waters. a startling contrast of desert and water, mountains and canyons, primitive backcountry and modern technology. Two powerful and uncompromising forces created this fantastic place. Nature,

working slowly over millions of years, built the foundation.

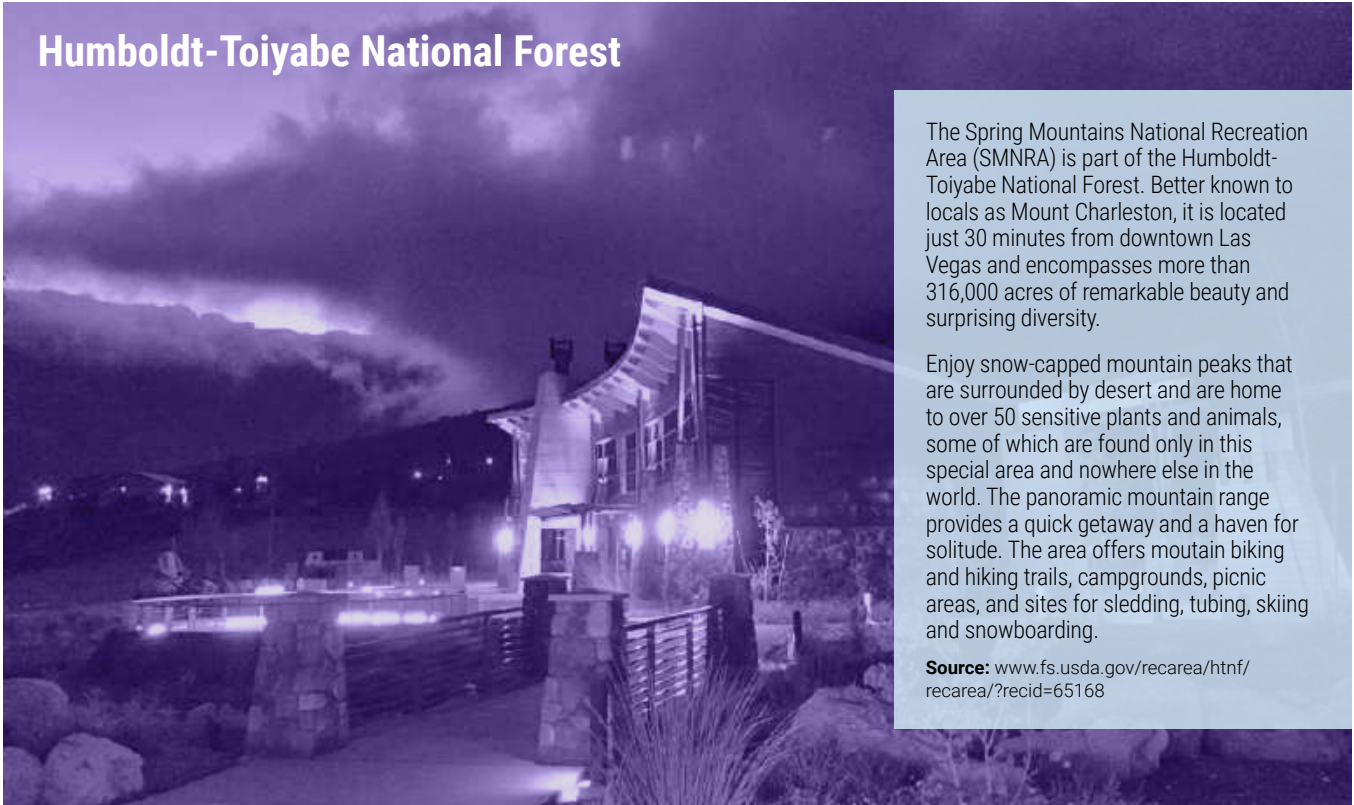
The first National Water Trail in the Southwest and the first to flow through a desert was established in 2014 after the Secretary of Interior designated a portion of the Lower Colorado River that flows through Lake Mead National Recreation Area. The Black Canyon Water Trail can be accessed through a guided tour at the base of the Hoover Dam, from Willow Beach, Arizona, or near an old mining town in Eldorado Canyon, Nevada. The 30-mile trail offers sandy beaches, colorful caves, plentiful coves and active hot springs. Desert bighorn sheep and other wildlife are often seen on the cliffs along the river. There is a great deal of history associated with the construction of and research connected to Hoover Dam including the sauna cave, gauging stations, catwalks, trails and building foundations.

The cultural resources and artifacts of Lake Mead tell a story about Native Americans, pioneers, miners, ranchers, settlers and dam builders who lived and in southern Nevada and northern Arizona. Historic photographs captured steamships, early settlements, ranger activities, recreation and explorations. The once submerged town, St. Thomas, is also included in the artifact and photo sections of the Virtual Museum. Visit the Lake Mead Virtual Museum at nps.gov/features/lake/museum.

Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest



The Spring Mountains National Recreation Area (SMNRA) is part of the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest. Better known to locals as Mount Charleston, it is located just 30 minutes from downtown Las Vegas and encompasses more than 316,000 acres of remarkable beauty and surprising diversity.

Enjoy snow-capped mountain peaks that are surrounded by desert and are home to over 50 sensitive plants and animals, some of which are found only in this special area and nowhere else in the world. The panoramic mountain range provides a quick getaway and a haven for solitude. The area offers mountain biking and hiking trails, campgrounds, picnic areas, and sites for sledding, tubing, skiing and snowboarding.

Old Las Vegas Mormon State Historic Park



More than 150 years ago, a spring-fed creek flowed through the Las Vegas Valley, creating an oasis in the desert. With the only free-flowing water and grass for miles around, the site attracted the native Paiute as well as traders, emigrants and gold seekers traveling the Old Spanish Trail to California. The Spaniards called the place las vegas, which is Spanish for the meadows. By the 1830s the meadows of Las Vegas had become an important stop on the Old Spanish Trail. The Las Vegas springs and creek, which flowed along the southern boundary of the modern site, proved to be a very welcome amenity for those passing through. Mormon travelers began passing through the meadows of Las Vegas almost immediately after settling northern Utah due to the need to procure supplies from southern California.

Old Las Vegas Mormon Fort, the first permanent, non-native settlement in the Las Vegas Valley, features the historic remains of an adobe fort built by Mormon missionaries along a spring-fed creek in 1855. The creek provided irrigation for fields and orchards and the 150-square-foot outpost served as a way station for travelers. Today the park is located in what is now Downtown Las Vegas. In addition to the fort, which contains a multitude of historic artifacts, a visitor center contains exhibits and photos that illustrate the history of the site. The park and visitor center are open from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday, year-round. For more information call (702) 486-3511.

Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area

Red Rock Canyon was designated as Nevada's first National Conservation Area. Red Rock Canyon is located 17 miles west of the Las Vegas Strip on Charleston Boulevard/State Route 159. The area is 195,819 acres and is visited by more than one million people each year. Red Rock offers enticements of a different nature including a 13-mile scenic drive, more than 30 miles of hiking trails, rock climbing, horseback riding, mountain biking, road biking, picnic areas, nature observing and visitor center with exhibit rooms and a book store.

The unique geologic features, plants and animals of Red Rock represent some of the best examples of the Mojave Desert. Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area is enjoyed by the local population as well as visitors from the United States and many foreign countries. Visitors enjoy the spectacular desert landscape, climbing and hiking opportunities, and interpretive programs sponsored by the BLM.

A favorite stop at Red Rock is the visitor center. The LEED gold-certified

visitor center is designed to encourage stewardship for public land by providing an outdoor experience that instills a sense of personal responsibility.

The majority of the innovative interpretive exhibits are outside with four themed elements: earth, air, fire and water. If you are eager to see desert tortoises or learn more about Red Rock's geology, head toward the Earth exhibit. Looking for a dust devil? Head to the air exhibit to create one yourself. Many people think this area is roasting hot in the summer; come to the fire exhibit to learn about agave roasting pits. The water exhibit will remind you of how precious this resource is in the desert.

The indoor portion of the visitor center includes a reception desk staffed by helpful employees and volunteers who can answer questions. A million-dollar view of the Calico Hills, touch screen exhibits, classroom and gift shop.

When the original visitor center – which is now the administrative building – opened in 1982, about 20,000 people visited Red

Rock each year. To address this issue, the Secretary of the Interior approved funds under the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act to build a new visitor center to provide enhanced visitor services to the increasing number of people who visit the National Conservation Area each year.

There are two wilderness areas in the conservation area: Rainbow Mountain Wilderness and La Madre Mountain Wilderness. All of the major canyons in Red Rock Canyon are in the Rainbow Mountain Wilderness, and all of the climbing routes located on White Rock Mountain and many near Kraft Mountain are within the La Madre Mountain Wilderness. Spring Mountain Ranch State Park

Spring Mountain Ranch State Park is located 15 miles west of Las Vegas, via Blue Diamond Rd., adjacent to the Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area. The many springs in these mountains provided water for Paiute Indians and later attracted mountain men and early settlers to the area. This 520-acre oasis was developed into a combination working ranch and luxurious retreat by a string of owners who have given the area a long and colorful history including German actress Vera Krupp and millionaire Howard Hughes. Visitors can explore some of the oldest buildings in Nevada, an 1860s blacksmith shop, the Sandstone Cabin that was home to the founding family and the ranch house. The park offers tree-shaded picnic sites with tables and grills and offers various hiking trails.

The main ranch house offers visitors information about the ranch and surrounding areas, and a self-guided tour of the ranch house interior - hours vary throughout the year. Park volunteers are available to answer questions.

Cultural events are put on by Super Summer Theater every May through September and living history programs bring the past back to life for a brief moment, giving visitors an opportunity to view life at the ranch as it may have existed. These programs, which began in 1992, include costumed role playing, demonstrations and re-enactments of historic events such as the Civil War. For more information call (702) 875-4141.

Valley of Fire

Valley of Fire is world-renowned for its 40,000 acres of bright red Aztec sandstone outcrops nestled in gray and tan limestone. As Nevada's oldest and largest state park it contains ancient, petrified trees and petroglyphs dating back more than 2,000 years. The park offers a full-scale visitor center that provides exhibits on the geology, ecology, prehistory and history of the park and nearby region. Open year round, the park has numerous campsites equipped with shaded tables, grills and water, as well as many intriguing trails. Valley of Fire State Park is six miles from Lake Mead and 55 miles northeast of Las Vegas via Interstate 15 and on exit 75.

The visitor center is open daily from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. The rest of the park is open daily from sunrise to sunset with 24-hour access to campgrounds. For more information call (702) 397-2088.

Recent Highlights

- UNLV is a leader in the new field of esports, the competitive gaming industry that combines art, science, and business. This next great wave in hospitality is poised to become a \$1 billion industry, and UNLV's International Gaming Institute is driving best practices and research to help position Nevada as a global esports hub.
- UNLV's programs continue to earn top rankings. The William F. Harrah College of Hospitality was named the world's best for hospitality and leisure management by QS World University Rankings, and the William S. Boyd School of Law climbed to 59th nationwide. The university continues to be named a best college for veterans, and its online nursing master's program is ranked in the top 20.

In 15 years, the college has grown to offer more than 45 high-demand majors and minors. Each program is taught by top-tier instructors with a focus on innovation, technology, and career development. The traditionally small classes are facilitated by faculty who serve as mentors and guides not only in the classroom, but in life. Programs are offered online, on-site, and as a hybrid of both. NSC is accredited by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities.

Program curriculum at the college is developed based upon the needs of the local community and the demands of its students. Popular programs include nursing, education, criminal justice, business administration, visual media, biology, speech pathology, and psychology.

NSC welcomes an eclectic population of students with more than 58 percent of its students from culturally diverse backgrounds. Desert Research Institute

The Desert Research Institute (DRI) is a recognized world leader in investigating the effects of natural and human-induced environmental change and advancing technologies aimed at assessing a changing planet. For more than 50 years, DRI research faculty, students, and staff have applied scientific understanding to support the effective management of natural resources while meeting Nevada's needs for economic diversification and science-based educational opportunities. With campuses in Reno and Las Vegas, DRI serves as the non-profit environmental research arm of the Nevada System of Higher Education.

Recent Research & News Highlights

- › In January 2018, a group of DRI atmospheric scientists published new research on snow droughts and how the new scientific term applies to ongoing drought in the West and how rising snow levels are impacting Nevada's water supplies. Snow droughts have become increasingly common in the Sierra Nevada and Cascade mountains in recent years, as warming temperatures push snow lines higher up mountainsides and cause more precipitation to fall as rain. *Read the full story online at - <http://www.dri.edu/newsroom/news-releases/5610-scientists-investigate-northern-sierra-nevada-snow-droughts>.*
- › Nevada residents can become Citizen Scientists and help DRI collect environmental data using the new Lake Tahoe Citizen Science app, created in collaboration with UC Davis. DRI is using the pictures and the weather data to better understand how snow storms in our region form, how warmer winters are impacting cloud physics and snow levels. *Get your snowflake phone camera lens and instructions at StoriesInTheSnow.org*
- › Science Alive, the DRI's K-12 outreach program and home of the Green Box initiative, was selected in 2017 for inclusion on the Nevada STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) Advisory Council's new list of recommended STEM programs. DRI Science Alive provides inquiry-based STEM curriculum, classroom supplies, and professional trainings to any teacher in Nevada that is interested, free of charge. The DRI Science Alive program is the only Nevada System of Higher Education (NSHE) program and one of only two non-profit programs (out of 16 total) to earn this commendation.
- › Building on more than 40 years of service to the U.S. Department of Energy, the DRI announced in 2017 it has been awarded a long-term research contract to support the national security mission of the Nevada National Security Site (NNSS). DRI contributes to nearly all of the DOE Nevada Field Office's major programs. The contract also renews support for the operation of the Community Environmental Monitoring Program in both urban and rural locations throughout southern Nevada, Utah, and California, with radiation and weather data collection by local community representatives.

Western Governor's University (WGU)

Western Governor's University (WGU) Nevada is an online, competency-based university designed to expand access to higher education for Nevada residents. Established by the state of Nevada in partnership with WGU Nevada, is designed to serve the needs of Nevada citizens.

Competency-based education (CBE) measures learning rather than time. Instead of being designed around semesters, classes, and syllabuses, CBE allows students to advance as soon as they can demonstrate that they have mastered the subject matter. With CBE, the focus is not on where or how the student learns, but that the learning occurred and the student has acquired a defined set of knowledge and skills. WGU developed and pioneered the use of CBE, and has been offering competency-based degree programs since 1999.

Recent Highlights

- Accreditations: Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU), National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE), and Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE)
- WGU Nevada is committed to keeping tuition low. In 2016, for the eighth consecutive year, the University did not raise tuition. Most undergraduate and graduate programs are about \$3,000 per six-month term, and tuition is charged at a flat rate, regardless of the number of courses taken.
- The University's Responsible Borrowing Initiative encourages students to borrow only what they need to complete their degrees. Since its launch in 2013, average borrowing per student (of those who take out loans) has decreased by \$3,100 per year, a reduction of 40%. In two years, the University has reduced overall student borrowing by \$250 million.
- WGU Nevada recently launched four new academic programs: BS and MS in Data Analytics, MSN in Nursing Informatics, and MS in Cybersecurity and Information Assurance. The University will launch a BS in Cybersecurity and Information Assurance mid-2017.

Touro University Nevada

Touro University Nevada was established to help address and serve the critical needs in medicine, healthcare, and education in the State of Nevada. A non-profit, Jewish-affiliated private university, Touro University Nevada, opened its doors in 2004 in Henderson, Nevada and for nearly 15 years has been a leading educator of healthcare professionals and teachers in Nevada.

Today, Touro enrolls more than 1,400 students in graduate degree programs in Osteopathic Medicine, Nursing, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Physician Assistant Studies, Medical Health Sciences, and Education. Many of these are the first and only programs of their kind in the State of Nevada.

The University takes great pride in the fact that it has become a top choice among Nevada students wishing to pursue careers in healthcare. Nevada institutions of higher education, including UNLV and Nevada State College, are top feeder schools for Touro programs. The University is equally proud that many of our graduates stay in Nevada for graduate medical education (residencies) and employment.

As a non-profit, private institution, Touro is making its mark at absolutely NO cost to the taxpayers of Nevada. With student expenditures, payroll, and benefits for more than 240 employees, as well as other university expenses, construction, and renovation projects, the University invests nearly \$90 million in the local economy each year. Multiply that by 7 to show the number of times these funds are redistributed into the local economy and Touro has had an overall economic impact of more than \$640 million.

Partnering with the Community for a Better Nevada

At Touro University Nevada, service to the community is central to our mission. Therefore, all of our programs have a community service/service learning component to them. A representative listing (however not inclusive) of some of our many contributions to the community includes:

- › The Stallman Touro Clinic at Shade Tree Shelter – Opened in fall 2009, this clinic provides free medical care to abused and homeless women and children. As the first clinic of its kind in Nevada, faculty and students from Touro's Physician Assistant Studies program provide onsite healthcare which has reduced ambulance visits from the shelter to the emergency room by more than 80%.
 - › healthcare clinic will launch in 2018 to serve seniors.
- › Mobile Healthcare Clinic – The first Mobile Healthcare Clinic provides free medical care to southern Nevada's homeless population throughout the Las Vegas Valley and free medical care to our community's homeless veterans. A second mobile healthcare clinic provides on-site medical care to the clients, family members, and staff of Opportunity Village. A third mobile
 - › Center for Autism and Developmental Disabilities – Developed to address a growing community need, Touro's Center offers multi-disciplinary therapy and supportive resources for children and their families dealing with Autism Spectrum Disorder and other developmental issues.
 - › The Health Center & Active Aging Center – This multi-specialty medical facility is staffed by Touro faculty physicians, is open to the public, and accepts most forms of insurance. Services include rheumatology, primary care, geriatrics, osteopathic manipulative medicine, and dermatology. The Center also features an Active Aging Center offering workshops and classes for older adults.

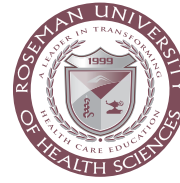


Roseman University of Health Sciences

The Clark County School District (CCSD) is Nevada's largest provider of education, reaching almost 75 percent of all students in Nevada with more than 320,000 students enrolled in grades K-12. The District encompasses 358 schools and approximately 8,000 square miles in southern Nevada. With more than 40,000 employees, CCSD is also the largest employer in the State.

CCSD is governed by a board of trustees comprised of seven members who represent different geographic regions within the County. CCSD is a minority-majority school district with a student population that includes 46.4% Hispanic, 14.1% African American, 6.4% Asian, and 6.6% multi-racial. The District offers nationally-ranked magnet schools; career and technical academies; an online secondary school, Nevada Learning Academy; and several International Baccalaureate programs available to elementary, middle, and high school students.

Services offered by the District also include: a school police department, adult education courses, special education, and partnerships with higher education institutions and community organizations such as Vegas PBS and the Public Education Foundation. As the largest school district in Nevada, CCSD plays a pivotal role in ensuring the future success, growth, and advancement of the State.

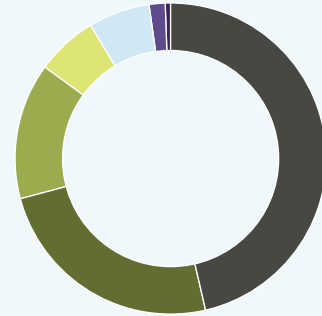

Achievements

- Clark County School District (CCSD) announced a record high graduation rate of 83.22 percent for the Class of 2017. During the past seven years, CCSD's graduation rate has improved by more than 40 percent (24 percentage points). The increase in graduation rate is also reflected in the number of graduates, as the Class of 2017 was CCSD's largest ever, with 20,030 graduates. Eight CCSD schools posted 100 percent graduation rates in 2017.
- Nevada has the largest five-year and three-year increases in the nation for the percentage of public high school graduates earning a 3 or higher on an Advanced Placement (AP) Exam. Overall, 24.7 percent of students in Nevada's graduating Class of 2017 scored a 3 or higher on an AP Exam, which is higher than the national average. Nevada ranked 14th in the nation this year in AP success.
- CCSD is working with legislators and Governor Sandoval on innovative initiatives to support our most at-risk students. Thirty-One Zoom Schools in CCSD receive additional funding to help English language learners, and 22 Victory Schools specifically support students of poverty that may be struggling with proficiency or need other assistance.
- CCSD has one of the top Magnet programs in the country and several nationally ranked schools. In 2018, 26 schools were recognized with Magnet Schools of America (MSA) Merit Awards. Two of our schools were selected by MSA as among the best in the nation for the past two years. MSA also selected Superintendent Pat Skorkowsky as its Superintendent of the Year for the 2016-17 school year.
- CCSD has the largest fine arts program in the country and is recognized for some of the finest programs in the nation. Las Vegas Academy of the Arts has 15 Grammys, more than any other school in the nation. The CCSD Music Education Program has been honored with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM) for 17 consecutive years.

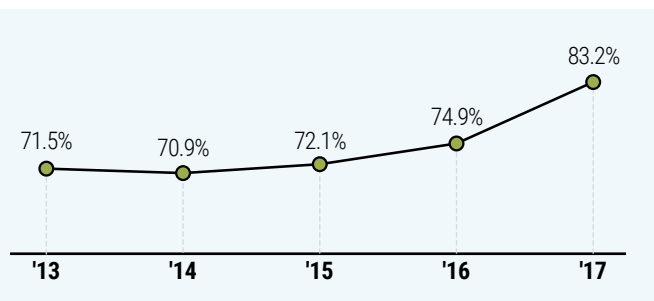

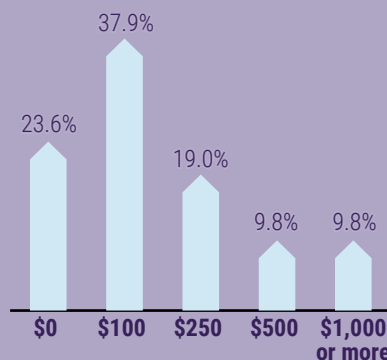

Private Schools

Nevada School Choice Coalition

The Nevada School Choice Coalition, which is a state affiliate of the American Federation for Children (AFC), has been operating in Nevada since the Nevada Legislature passed the Education Savings Account (ESA) and the Opportunity Scholarship programs in 2015. The Coalition partners with AFC in its mission to improve our nation's K-12 education by advancing systemic and sustainable public policy that empowers parents, particularly those in low-income families, to choose the education they determine is best for their children. The investments of AFC have resulted in 52 private school choice programs in 26 states and Washington, D.C., which serve nearly 500,000 children.

In addition to carrying out its mission in the state of Nevada, the Coalition was formed to help families and school choice supporters learn about the ESA and the Opportunity Scholarship programs and how to advocate for high quality education for their children. The Coalition has charged forward to change the landscape of education in Nevada by bringing more educational options to Nevada children, many of whom did not have prior access.

As a tax credit program, the Opportunity Scholarship is privately funded by corporations, which receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit against their Modified Business Tax liability enabling corporations to direct their tax liability toward K-12 education. Through the Opportunity Scholarship program, eligible Nevada families have access to \$26 million dollars in funding to go towards the education of their choice. Since 2015, over 1,600 families have been awarded a scholarship.

As illustrated in the below graphs, the enrollment growth of students has increased substantially since the program inception with 1,692 scholarships awarded this year. Clearly Nevada's economically-needy families want access to educational options!

The ESA program allows students to gain access to a customized learning solution, which includes private school, learning therapies and tutoring through a portion of funds provided by the state. As the nation's first universal ESA program, the program became law in 2015 and was set to begin January 2016, however a court injunction stopped it from going into effect. After opponents of the ESA filed two lawsuits against the program, the Nevada Supreme Court upheld the ESA, declaring it constitutional, but struck down the funding mechanism. Despite significant efforts in 2017, a bill to create a new funding mechanism was not enacted and the program is currently waiting for funding.

Recent Highlights

- › As of January 2018, there have been 1,692 scholarships awarded for the 2017-18 school year.
- › During the 2017 legislative session, the Opportunity Scholarship program was awarded a one-time increase of \$20 million. As a result, the total cap increased to \$26 million for the 2017-18 fiscal year and will re-adjust to \$6.6 million in 2018-19 with annual 10% increases. Approximately \$11 Million in tax credits remains in the 2017-18 cap.
- › In AFC's 4th annual National School Choice Poll, support for school choice continues to be very strong across key demographic groups and party affiliation:
 - › 63% of All Voters support school choice
 - › 77% of Latinos
 - › 56% of African Americans
 - › 75% of Republicans
 - › 62% of Independents
 - › 54% of Democrats

Partnerships with the following chambers and organizations were formed helping to increase the reach of the Coalition's mission and message: the Latin Chamber of Commerce, the Peruvian Chamber of Commerce, Nevada Hispanic Business Group, and the Nevada Pastors for School Choice.

What is on the horizon for healthcare in Las Vegas?

Las Vegas is on a journey to becoming the most recognized destination for Global Health & Wellness Travel, a Medical Tourism Destination. Las Vegas HEALS, Las Vegas Convention & Visitors Authority (LVCVA), Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance (LVGEA), UNLV College of Hospitality and the Governors Office of Economic Development (GOED) developed a regional strategic plan, identifying a set of key growth opportunities and recommendations. These planned initiatives for the industry & regional growth are perfectly aligned to develop Las Vegas as a Regional Center of Excellence.

The new UNLV School of Medicine will be enrolling its second class in the summer of 2018, Touro University Nevada recently received approval to expand its class size and Roseman University College of Medicine will soon enter the accreditation process. All are attracting faculty for Graduate Medical Education, expansion which is well underway with new physician residency, fellowship, nursing and specialty programs designed to empower future graduates of our medical schools. These programs will play an integral role in growing a physician workforce to not only cater to the local market but to also attract global medical and wellness travelers.

The Las Vegas Medical District (LVMD), containing two teaching hospitals (University Medical Center and Valley Hospital Medical Center), will become the future home of the UNLV School of Medicine. Meanwhile, in the City of Henderson, the vision of East Side Medical Corridor has progressed by the development of the new Henderson Hospital. Union Village, Henderson Medical Plaza, Gateway Masterplan and Dignity Health's ambulatory facility are all part of that vision.

The new and current infrastructure is essential in helping align our physicians, nurses, allied health professionals, and ancillary businesses to participate in creating an integrated healthcare delivery environment in southern Nevada.

Nevada, and especially Las Vegas, has identified healthcare as a top priority and is executing an ambitious plan with competitive talent along with infrastructure to deliver growth for becoming a global leader in healthcare employment, tourism, innovation as well as research.

These changes are discussed in more detail below. **Dimensions and Indicators** - The Scorecard measures LTSS system performance using 25 indicators across 5 dimensions: **Affordability and Access** (six indicators) includes the relative affordability of private pay LTSS, the proportion of individuals with private long-term care insurance, the reach of Medicaid and the Medicaid LTSS safety net for people with disabilities who have modest incomes, and the ease of navigating the LTSS system. **Choice of Setting and Provider** (six indicators) includes the balance between institutional services and home- and community-based services (HCBS), the extent of participant direction, and the supply and availability of alternatives to nursing homes, including residential care options such as assisted living and the supply of home health and personal care aides. **Quality of Life and Quality of Care** (three indicators) includes employment of people with disabilities living in the community, and two indicators of quality in nursing homes. Due to discontinuation of data sources, half of the quality indicators from the previous Scorecard could not be repeated, and no suitable replacements could be found. Because of these gaps, the Quality of Life and Quality of Care dimension received only one-half of the weight of the other four dimensions in determining states' overall ranks on LTSS system performance. **Support for Family Caregivers** (a single policy composite, divided into four indicators) includes supports for working caregivers, person- and family-centered care, nurse delegation and scope of practice, and transportation policies. **Effective Transitions** (six indicators) includes measures of hospitalization and institutionalization that should be minimized in a high-performing LTSS system.

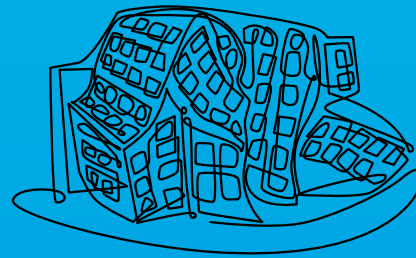
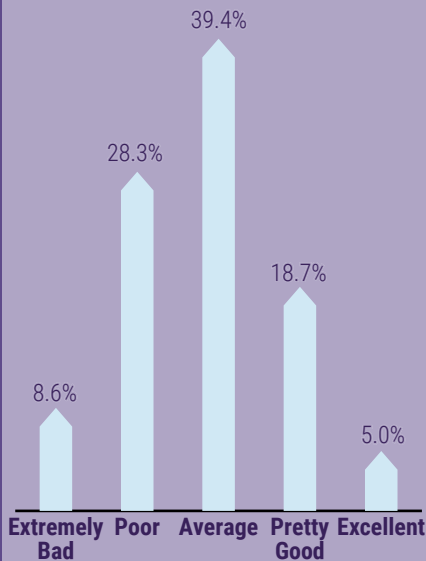

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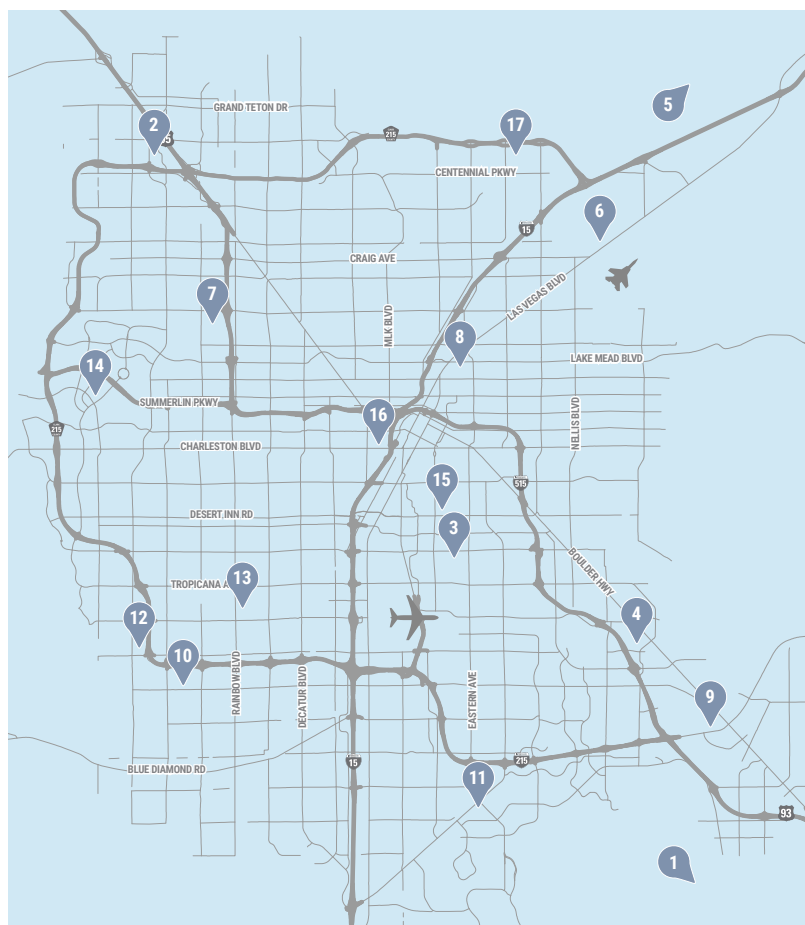

Centennial Hills Hospital



In 2018, Centennial Hills Hospital celebrates 10 years of quality care. A decade of service delivering babies, saving lives and taking care of the hearts of our northwest and North Las Vegas communities. Located in the fast-growing northwest quadrant of Clark County, Centennial Hills Hospital also cares for a wide range of medical situations that arise from accidents at Mount Charleston National Recreation Area, as well as procedures for spines and joints.

To accommodate the growing community, the hospital recently completed an \$18.2 million expansion that added 60 private patient rooms and over 200 additional parking spaces. The hospital also added biplane angiography capabilities to treat stroke and other neurological diseases by utilizing minimally invasive neuro-interventional radiology procedures in its new biplane lab. The emergency department often serves as its front door, with more than 54,000 patients seen on an annual basis. Major emergencies, such as strokes and heart attacks, as well as minor emergencies are treated at the facility.

Centennial Hills Hospital features a comprehensive women's center offering care for women at every stage of life. The program also supports alternative delivery models including midwifery. In the last year, overall deliveries at the facility exceeded 3,200. Infants who require advanced medical care spend time in the hospital's Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), and "NICU graduates" are celebrated with an annual reunion at the hospital. Digital mammography and advanced diagnostic testing are also available.

For those who need surgery, a da Vinci® Robotic Surgical System can be used for abdominal, gynecological and urological cases. Centennial Hills Hospital also performs over 2,100 orthopedic surgeries per year. This service line is supported by a nurse navigator on the orthopedic nursing unit and the Mako Robotic-Arm Assisted Surgery System, the only system of its kind in Southern Nevada, which uses customized technology for total hip replacement, total knee replacement and partial knee resurfacing.

For people who may require therapy after surgery, Centennial Hills Hospital offers an outpatient therapy center to assist with the recovery and rehabilitation. Other outpatient services include a new wound healing and hyperbaric medicine center, which opened in 2017.

Mike O'Callaghan Military Medical Center

The 99th Medical Group, also known as Mike O'Callaghan Military Medical Center, is a 50-bed Air Force medical center providing medical care and support to maintain the combat readiness of Nellis and Creech Air Force Base personnel. Nellis boasts the Air Force's second largest TRICARE Prime enrollment population of more than 48,500 enrollees. The facility undergoes a comprehensive survey by The Joint Commission (TJC) and is pleased to hold full accreditation status. The last TJC accreditation survey was successfully conducted in January 2018.

The ground breaking for this facility occurred in July 1991, and the doors opened in July 1994. The facility cost \$84 million to build. The facility holds the distinct honor of being the nation's first hospital to be funded, planned, and built as an operational joint venture with the VA.

In 2011, the Air Force Medical Service upgraded Nellis to a medical center, bringing significant additional resources to the Nellis community. In January 2012, the facility was officially renamed the "Mike O'Callaghan Federal Medical Center" (MOFMC). The VA opened a new hospital in 2013 and departed from the MOFMC. The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act renamed the facility the "Mike O'Callaghan Military Medical Center."

St. Rose Dominican, Rose de Lima Campus


The town of Henderson rose out of a dusty spot of desert in the early 1940s, and its lifeblood was Basic Magnesium Inc., a plant that pulled water and electricity from what was then called Boulder Dam to produce magnesium, a material used for munitions and airplane parts during the war. In 1942, Basic Magnesium Hospital was founded by the U.S. government to provide health care to area industrial workers and their families during the war.

When World War II ended, magnesium production was no longer needed for defense purposes, so many of the 14,000 employees moved away. Basic Magnesium Hospital was put up for sale. The first of the three Dignity Health-St. Rose Dominican hospitals, the Rose de Lima Campus, was established in 1947 when the Adrian Dominican Sisters of Adrian, Michigan, purchased Basic Magnesium Hospital from the U.S. government for \$1 a year for 25 years. The hospital was the first in southern Nevada to be accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals in 1955, as well as the first in the area to obtain a radioisotope laboratory and the first full accredited cancer treatment center in 1956. It was the first in the state to use a PillCam camera, used to better diagnose diseases in the small intestine in 2002, and the first to be certified by the Undersea and Hyperbaric Medical Society in 2009. A \$25 million, 4-story expansion was completed in 1991, bringing the total square footage to over 220,000 feet housing 110 beds.

The third and youngest hospital in the Dignity Health-St. Rose Dominican system, the San Martín Campus, opened its doors to the public in 2006 to serve the ever-growing surrounding community. Named after Saint Martin de Porres, a Dominican brother who provided care to the sick and the poor, maintained an animal hospital and established an orphanage and a hospital for poor children. Saint Martin de Porres' tradition of making those around him feel comfortable and secure is continued through the San Martín Campus' Healing Garden's beautiful waterfall and the Robert Ferre' designed labyrinth in the Redina Family Healing Garden.

The year after opening, the San Martín Campus became the first hospital in Nevada to offer the Allura Xper FD10/10 Cardiac imaging X-ray System. Located on Warm Springs Road in Southwest Las Vegas, the hospital has received numerous awards and recognition for its quality care.

St. Rose Dominican, Siena Campus

The second campus in the St. Rose Dominican hospital network, the Siena Campus, is named after Saint Catherine of Siena. Having dedicated herself to the care of the unfortunate, she was canonized in 1461. In 1970 she was bestowed the title Doctor of the Church for the strides she made in healthcare, and their importance to the church in perpetuity.

The Siena campus opened in 2000, with 141 patient rooms. In 2012, Siena campus opened one of the first hybrid operating suites in Nevada, a state-of-the-art, all-in-one setting in which diagnosis and treatment can take place. In 2015, the Siena campus opened the five-story, 227,000-square-foot Dominican Tower, nearly tripling the original campus total square footage. The tower cost approximately \$160 million and added another 100 private rooms, bringing the Siena Campus to 326 beds in total. The number of private emergency rooms more than doubled. ER treatment and Rapid Medical Assessment spaces have expanded to over 70 rooms, and six new operating suites have been added.

In conjunction with adding space, the tower will help streamline the hospital experience. The Cardiology Center was expanded to include its own admitting and waiting areas for noninvasive procedures. Outpatient support services have been expanded greatly, including admitting, nutrition services, radiology lab, pharmacy, and endoscopy suites.

Infants who require advanced medical care spend time in the hospital's level three Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), and "NICU graduates" are welcomed back to an annual reunion.

Based upon the age and lifestyle of its residents, a wide range of surgeries are available, including orthopedics, spine, general surgery, and vascular surgery. With its daVinci® Robotic Surgical System, surgeons use the technology especially for abdominal, gynecological, and urology procedures.

When patients need additional expertise to recover from a stroke, other major illness, or injury, they can easily transfer to the acute rehabilitation unit. An Outpatient Therapy Center is onsite, offering physical, occupational and speech therapy for adults and children. Additionally, a wound healing and hyperbaric center is also available on the hospital's campus to assist patients with chronic and/or non-healing wounds.

Valley Hospital

Since 1971, the health care professionals of Valley Hospital have prided themselves on providing excellent care to their patients. Located in the heart of the Las Vegas Medical District (LVMD) near the government centers and The Smith Center for Performing Arts, it is the founding hospital of The Valley Health System.

In 2018, Valley Hospital begins its 13th year of providing graduate medical education. As an advanced teaching hospital, Valley Hospital has more than 80 physician residents and fellows working directly with patients. An American Osteopathic Association (AOA) approved graduate medical education program to train and teach future physicians. Under the direction of experienced faculty members, these physicians provide intensified patient care using evidence-based medicine and following clinical pathways that research has shown to be effective with most patients. In 2017, the hospital began its new Pharmacy Residency program. Throughout the year, pharmacy residents will enhance their competency in managing medication-use systems and learn how to support medication therapy outcomes for patients. Besides developing highly qualified pharmacists in southern Nevada, the residency program helps to bring in talent from other parts of the country to work here.

As a tertiary care facility, Valley Hospital provides advanced cardiovascular, interventional neurological, and neurosurgical services. Physicians began performing open heart surgery in the late 1970s. The hospital's continued emphasis on cardiovascular care continues with interventional cardiac procedures including balloon angioplasty, vascular procedures, and heart pumps to improve patients' outcomes. Valley Hospital is committed to staying at the forefront of technology. It recently completed Phase 1 of the Cardiology/Cath Lab modernization project. Two Cath Labs now offer advanced technology for both EP and interventional cardiology procedures. Phase II later in the year will include modernizing the patient waiting and check-in areas, and adding a physician and family consultation room.

Meanwhile, neurosurgeons perform complex endovascular and spine surgeries, while interventional radiologists carry out intricate neurological procedures in the biplane angiography lab. Patients who are recovering from a stroke, other major injury, or surgery can transfer to the acute rehabilitation unit on the fourth floor for more intensive therapy to aid in their recovery.

A wide range of surgical procedures are also performed at the hospital, with patients benefitting from Da Vinci® XI Robotic Surgery Technology used especially for abdominal, colorectal, gynecological, and urological surgery. Those requiring inpatient care, are directed to one of several nursing units tailored to their particular post-surgical needs.

As part of the continuum of care, patients and community members can utilize the Advanced Wound Care & Hyperbaric Center for chronic and hard-to-heal wounds.

VA Southern Nevada Healthcare System (VASNHS) provides outpatient and inpatient medical services to Veterans residing in southern Nevada, within an official catchment area of Clark, Lincoln, and Nye Counties. VASNHS also draws Veterans from Arizona, Utah, and California.

Primary and Specialty Care services are disbursed among several clinical sites within the Las Vegas Valley, including the Northwest Primary Care Clinic (PCC), Northeast PCC, Southwest PCC, and Southeast PCC. A Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) in Pahrump, Nevada, provides rural health care to Veterans residing in Nye County, and a Rural Outreach Clinic in Laughlin, Nevada, serves Veterans in Southern Clark County.

The healthcare system opened a comprehensive medical center in 2012, that provides specialty and inpatient services. Inpatient services include 90 Medical, Surgical, Psychiatric, ICU, Step-Down, and Rehabilitation beds. An Emergency Department is located at the medical center. The southern Nevada Fisher House opened on the main medical center campus in 2016, and provides temporary lodging to families of Veterans or active-duty service members undergoing inpatient or extensive outpatient treatment in the Las Vegas Valley.

VASNHS maintains a joint venture with the Department of Defense's 99th Medical Group at the Mike O'Callaghan Military Medical Center (MOMMC). VASNHS also maintains a Community Resource and Referral Center (CRRCC) for homeless and at-risk Veterans and a Veterans Recovery Center (VRC).

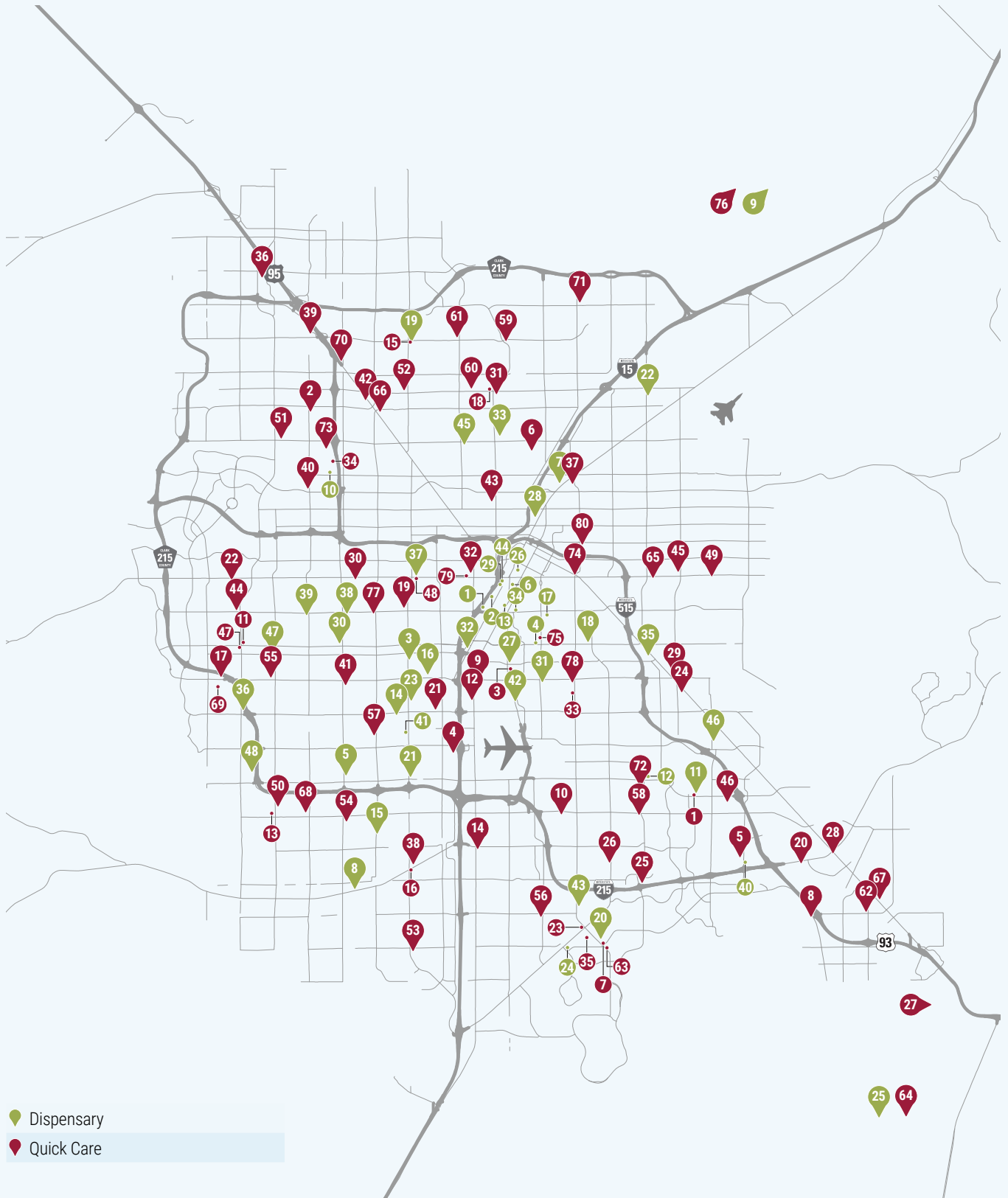

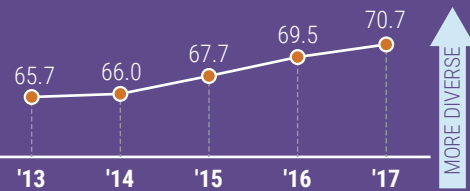

Which of the following 11 western states has the most favorable tax and business climate for new corporate investment?

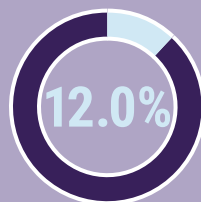

Target Industries

The Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance focuses on targeting industries that provide the most growth potential and help diversify the economy of southern Nevada. Economic diversification enhances regional competitiveness in the global economy, while also helping attract and retain a talent pool that will further develop the region.

Gaming, Tourism and Conventions

As a tourism capital of the world, one of southern Nevada's top-performing industries over time has been gaming, tourism and conventions. With such high employment levels and strong performance relative to that of the U.S., there is no doubt that the industry and its supporting activities will continue to drive economic growth in the region for years to come.

Finance, Banking and Insurance

The region's position as a leading convention and trade show destination brings global businesses from a wide array of industries to southern Nevada on a regular basis and the region remains poised to leverage this opportunity to attract global capital across a variety of finance related activities including banking and insurance.

Although a regional focus on "business headquarters and services" is often only an extension of business recruitment efforts directed toward other industries, establishing this industry as a direct target for economic development reflects the strength of regional assets that can be leveraged toward the recruitment of business headquarters – regional headquarters or operations, U.S. locations for international companies and corporate headquarters – as well as the professional, technical, administrative and support services that serve as core inputs into business headquarters or operations and support service firms.

Destination Health Care and Medical Services

Unique opportunities exist in southern Nevada to go beyond a more traditional supporting role in health care and pursue a more focused economic development strategy around health care services and medical education. These services are supported by a mix of assets and data-based

Autonomous Systems

As a region, southern Nevada is positioned to aggressively pursue a substantial portion of economic activity driven by autonomous systems and accommodate the industry's growth through multiple avenues, including the manufacturing, testing and implementation of autonomous technologies in both hardware and software, with established vehicle-to-infrastructure (V2I) capabilities, a progressive public policy environment and existing plans for mobility solutions.

Business Assistance Programs

Business Assistance Programs

In partnership with the Governor's Office of Economic Development and the local jurisdictions within Clark County, the Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance offers a variety of incentives to help qualifying companies locate and expand in the region. Programs include the following:

Sales and Use Tax Abatement

On qualified capital equipment purchases, with reductions in the rate to as low as 2 percent for a 2-year period.

Modified Business Tax Abatement

50 percent of the 1.475 percent rate on quarterly wages exceeding \$50,000 for a 4-year period.

Personal Property Tax Abatement

Up to 50 percent over a maximum of 10 years.

Real Property Tax Abatement for Recycling

Up to 50 percent abatement for up to 10 years on real for qualified recycling businesses.

Contact the Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance to learn how to qualify for these programs.

Aviation Parts Abatement

Up to 50 percent on personal property tax and a reduction of sales and use tax to a rate of 2 percent for a 20-year period.

Data Center Abatement

Up to 75 percent on personal property tax and a reduction of sales and use tax to a rate of 2 percent for a 10 or 20-year period.

Silver State Works Employee Hiring Incentive

Provides employers up to \$2,000 for hiring state-qualified employee candidates.

Inspired and funded by Zappos CEO Tony Hsieh, it also drives upward mobility and entrepreneurial energy through the pursuit of social collisions, co-learning, and connectedness in a long-term, sustainable way. Now in its fifth year, DTP serves as either an owner or investor to more than 300 businesses and legal entities by providing funding and support. Its efforts have created an estimated \$209.2 million in recurring economic output by employing more than 1,570 people since 2012.

DTP's wholly-owned and operated ventures employ more than 300 people. DTP has invested in over 100 tech companies and approximately 50 small businesses through its own Downtown Project Small Business Fund Investments and tech investment arm, VTF Capital. DTP-owned companies, including the hospitality lodgings Gold Spike and Oasis at Gold Spike; the retail center Downtown Container Park; and the community-building property Inspire Theater. These companies facilitate creativity and social collisions. Downtown Project owns and operates over 700 residential units in the neighborhood and a 231-residential unit, 15,000-square-foot retail mid-rise development under construction. DTP-supported small businesses, including a number of restaurants, services and lifestyle shops. DTP-affiliated ventures such as 9th Bridge School, a downtown private school; Life Is Beautiful, a three-day food, art, learning and music festival. Such ventures are fundamentally changing the community into a more social, supportive and innovative neighborhood.



Rob Roy's Innevation Center

Rob Roy's Innevation Center is a 65,000-square-foot collaborative workspace and community event venue driving Nevada's new innevation economy, donated to the community by Switch Founder and CEO, Rob Roy.

As the most successful technology entrepreneur in Nevada's history, Rob Roy created The Innevation Center as a result of his passion for enabling a more diverse Nevada economy. He fashioned the initiatives of Innevation after his patented, world-renowned data center ecosystem, Switch. He is "paying forward" the success of Switch by helping to empower Nevada's next generation of economic leaders.

Emerging tech companies, global powerhouse brands from Switch, economic developers, educators, community stakeholders, and universities collaborate at the Innevation Center to move Nevada forward. Collaboration occurs at events, Meetups, education series and in the everyday interactions of coworking members.

Nevada Taxes

Nevada Tax Climate

Offering one of the lowest tax burdens in the nation, Nevada is consistently cited by the likes of Forbes, Inc and Money magazines as having one of the best overall business climates in the nation. Nevada's tax structure is designed to be less burdensome to both business and its employees. The Tax Foundation rated Nevada as the No. 5 best state for business in 2018.

Alcoholic Beverages

Excise tax on importation, processing, storing or selling of all liquor (including beer). Malt beverages are taxed at 16 cents per gallon and liquor is taxed from 70 cents to \$3.60 per gallon depending on the alcohol content. Sales tax is collected on the retail price. Annual state license fees range from \$75 to \$500 according to the type of business.

Business License

A state license fee is paid annually. The fee is \$500 for domestic and foreign for-profit corporations. The fee is \$200 for all other businesses. Counties and cities can also impose a business license fee on businesses in their jurisdiction. The fee is generally based on the type of business (i.e., retail, professional, hotel, etc.)

Business Registration Fees

Fees for filing articles of incorporation or agreements of consolidation providing for shares apply in Nevada. The rate is based on the value of the shares with a minimum fee of \$75 and a maximum fee of \$35,000 (example: if the total value of shares is \$75,000 or less the fee is \$75; \$200,000 or less the fee is \$175; over \$1 million is \$375 plus \$275 for each additional \$500,000 or fraction thereof, not to exceed \$35,000). Except in the case of shares valued at \$75,000 or less, fees for the Annual Filing are the same as for filing the articles of incorporation; however, the maximum fee is \$11,100. Non-par value stock is assigned a value of \$1 per share for the purpose of computing the fee. Fees are the same for domestic and foreign corporations. Fees are also imposed upon Limited-Liability Companies, Limited Partnerships, Limited-Liability Partnerships and Business Trusts. Contact the Nevada Secretary of State office for additional information.

Car Rental

The state fee is imposed at 10 percent on the short-term rental of a passenger car. Both Clark and Washoe counties levy an additional 2 percent for authorized projects. Ten percent is remitted to the state general fund. Additional airport fees apply.

Cigarette/Tobacco Products

The excise tax on cigarettes is 9 cents per cigarette, which equates to \$1.80 cents per package of 20. Other tobacco products are taxed at 30 percent of the wholesaler's cost. Sales tax is also collected on the retail price.

Commerce Tax

As of July 1, 2015, the commerce tax is imposed on business entities doing business in Nevada. It is based on the Nevada gross revenue received by a business in a taxable year (July 1 through June 30). The rates of the commerce tax range from 0.0331 percent to 0.051 percent. The first \$4 million is subtracted from Nevada gross revenue. A 50 percent credit for the commerce tax paid is allowed against the modified business tax.

Gaming

There are five principal types of gaming taxes. Gross gaming revenue tax, table tax and slot taxes are levied by the state. In addition, gaming fees are levied by the county and local governments. For more information, contact the Nevada Gaming Control Board.

Lodging

A statewide tax of 1 percent of gross receipts is imposed on the rental of hotel and motel rooms. This is in addition to any locally imposed room taxes which range from 7 to 13 percent. In Clark County, the total combined rate ranges

from 11 to 13.38 percent. An additional 1%, apportioned to the LVCVA Expansion (1/2%) and the Stadium Construction Fund (1/2%) are effective March 1, 2017.

Live Entertainment Tax

Imposed at locations where live entertainment is provided for which there is an admission, cover or table charge. The rate is 9 percent. For non-gaming establishments there is no tax imposed if the maximum occupancy is less than 200.

Modified Business Tax

The tax is based on gross payroll paid in the calendar quarter and is imposed on businesses in Nevada that are required to make unemployment insurance contributions to the Nevada Department of Employment Security. General Business employers pay a tax rate of 1.475 percent on gross wages reported over \$50,000 in a quarter. Financial institutions and mining companies pay a rate of 2 percent. The employer can deduct any costs for providing a qualified employer-paid health care plan. A 50 percent credit for the commerce tax paid is allowed against the modified business tax.

Motor Vehicle Fuel

Gasoline and gasohol are taxed at 23 cents per gallon. Additional county taxes range from 5 cents to 10 cents per gallon. Diesel, kerosene, biodiesel and biodiesel blends are 27 cents per gallon; liquid petroleum and butane are 22 cents per gallon; compressed natural gas is 21 cents per gallon and water-phased fuel is 19 cents per gallon. Clark and Washoe counties index the tax for inflation based on the Producer Price Index.

Motor Vehicles

Fees are annual and must be paid, at the time of registration, on all vehicles operated on any highway. For mopeds, the fee is paid one-time per owner.

Governmental Service Tax

This tax is in lieu of personal property tax. The valuation of the vehicle is determined at 35 percent of the manufacturer's suggested retail price, without accessories. Vehicle value is depreciated to 95 percent after the first year and graduated down to 15 percent after nine years. Buses, trucks and truck trailers depreciate down to 85 percent after the first year and down to 23 percent after 10 years. The rate imposed by the state is 4 cents on each \$1 valuation. Counties may levy up to one cent on each dollar of valuation, but the total tax imposed cannot exceed 5 cents on each dollar of valuation.

Registration

Passenger cars, motorcycles, travel trailers, low speed and electric vehicles and trucks with a gross vehicle weight less than 6,000 pounds pay \$33 per year. Rates on trucks vary from a low of \$38 for a truck with a gross weight of 6,000 pounds to a maximum of \$1,360 for a truck with a gross weight of 80,000 pounds. Moped registration is a one-time fee of \$33 per owner.

Property

State statutes limit the property tax rate to a total of \$3.64 per \$100 of assessed valuation. Assessment is at 35 percent of taxable value. The tax is applied to the assessed value. Property tax rates may vary within the city and county, due to special districts or general improvement districts such as fire control districts, library districts and television districts. The tax bill is generally capped at a maximum increase of 3 percent over the prior year for an owner-occupied residence or a rental property with rent charged below the HUD Fair Market Rents, and a maximum increase of 8 percent for all other real and personal property. Secondary tax cap formulas also apply.

Real Property

Includes land, buildings and improvements not normally removable. The value for land is full cash value. The value for improvements is replacement costs less depreciation at

1.5 percent per year up to 50 years. The combination of these values is known as taxable value.

Personal Property

Includes property not permanently affixed to land, such as business equipment and mobile/manufactured homes not converted to real property. Assessment is 35 percent of original cost less depreciation.

Industrial Insurance

Industrial insurance is obtained through private insurance carriers, self-insurance or group self-insurance. For more information about self-insurance or group self-insurance contact the Nevada Division of Insurance.

Insurance Premium

Insurers pay 3.5 percent of the total direct premiums written for the preceding calendar year covering property and other risks in the state. The tax is passed onto the consumer in the cost of the premium. Risk retention groups registered in Nevada, but chartered in another state pay a rate of 2 percent. The tax is due on actual premiums received in the quarter with payment due 30 days following the end of the quarter.

Sales and Use

Sales tax is charged at the retail level on the sale of tangible personal property unless exempt by statute. A companion "use" tax is charged on property purchased outside of Nevada and brought into the state for use. The authorized maximum combined State rate is 6.85 percent. Counties are allowed various options to pay for items such as transportation, roads, flood control and water. In Clark County, the total combined rate is 8.25 percent effective April 1, 2017.

Unemployment Insurance

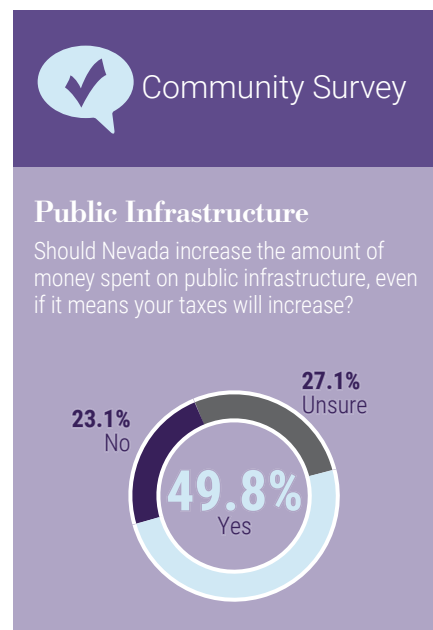
Paid by employers of one or more persons with total wages paid of \$225 or more during a calendar quarter. For the first 14 quarters as an employer in Nevada, the total rate is 3 percent. Thereafter, it may vary from 0.3 percent to 5.4 percent depending on the number of employees and the firm's unemployment record. The maximum wage base upon which the rate is applied changes annually. For 2016, the maximum wage base is \$28,200.

Universal Energy Charge

The tax is assessed on each therm of natural gas or kilowatt hour of electricity consumed in Nevada. The rate is 3.30 mills per therm of natural gas and .39 mills per kilowatt-hour of electricity. If tax collected exceeds \$25,000 in any calendar quarter, a refund for the amount over \$25,000 may be requested. The tax is distributed to the Welfare Division and is further distributed 25 percent to the Nevada Housing Division for weatherization. The Welfare Division uses the remaining 75 percent for energy assistance to low-income households. The tax is remitted within 30 days after the end of each calendar quarter. As a pass-through, the tax is itemized on each customer's billing statement as a separate line item.

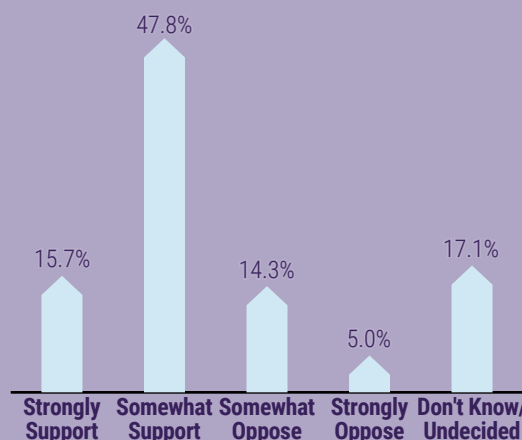

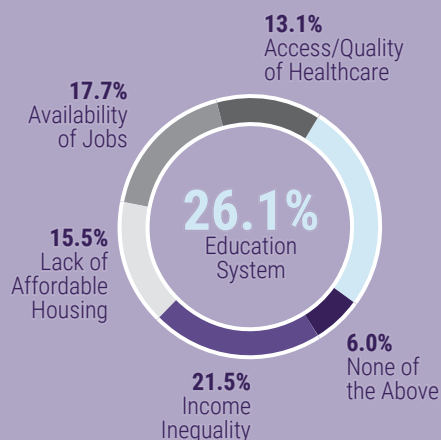

Which of the following is having the greatest negative impact on our economy?





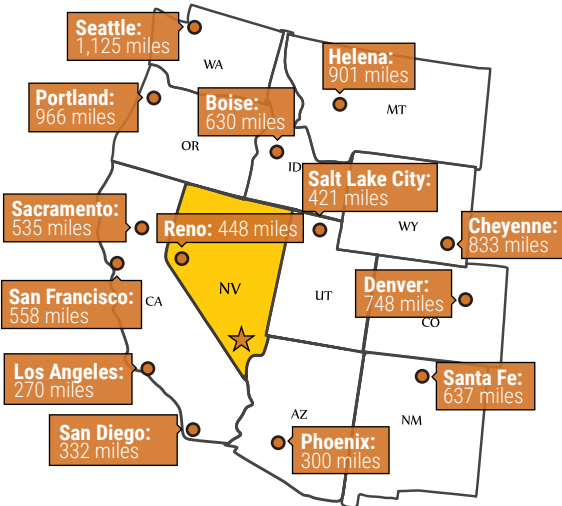

Distance From Las Vegas



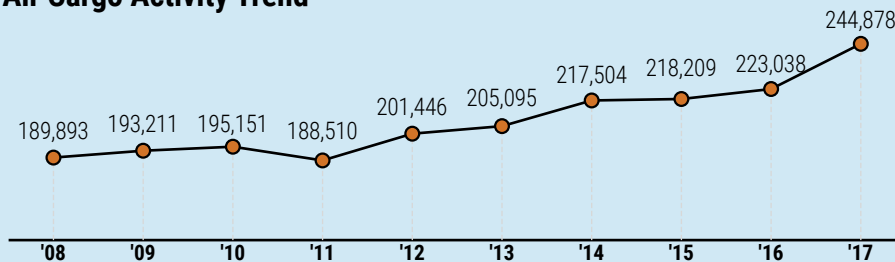

McCarran International Airport

McCarran International Airport is southern Nevada's gateway to the world. With 30 airlines providing nonstop flights to more than 150 destinations, McCarran International Airport is among the top 10 busiest airports in the United States, and among the top 30 busiest airports in the world. In 2017, McCarran hosted more than 48.5 million passengers, 3.5 million of which were from international destinations. McCarran is located in a focus city for three domestic carriers: Southwest Airlines, Spirit Airlines, and Las Vegas' very own Allegiant Air.

McCarran International Airport is owned and operated by the government of Clark County, Nevada, which is overseen by the Clark County Board of Commissioners. Unlike other departments within the County government, the Department of Aviation is a self-sufficient enterprise and operates without County General Fund tax revenue. Airport revenue is derived from aviation and non-aviation sources, as well as Passenger Facility Charges and Airport Improvement Program grants.

For decades, the skyrocketing popularity of Las Vegas ceaselessly challenged the airport's infrastructure. Over time, more and more aircraft, cars, and travelers have jockeyed for space within an airport whose initial developers never envisioned a time when 40+ million passengers would become the annual norm. Airport expansions were delivered in the 1980s, 1990s, 2000s, and most recently in 2012, with the opening of Terminal 3.

In recent years, international visitations have become an increasingly important priority for McCarran Airport. The opening of Terminal 3 in 2012 allowed McCarran to experience double-digit growth in international arrivals, and today, McCarran offers nonstop flights to 32 international destinations. McCarran's largest international carriers include: Westjet (Canada), Air Canada, British Airways, Virgin Atlantic, and AeroMexico.

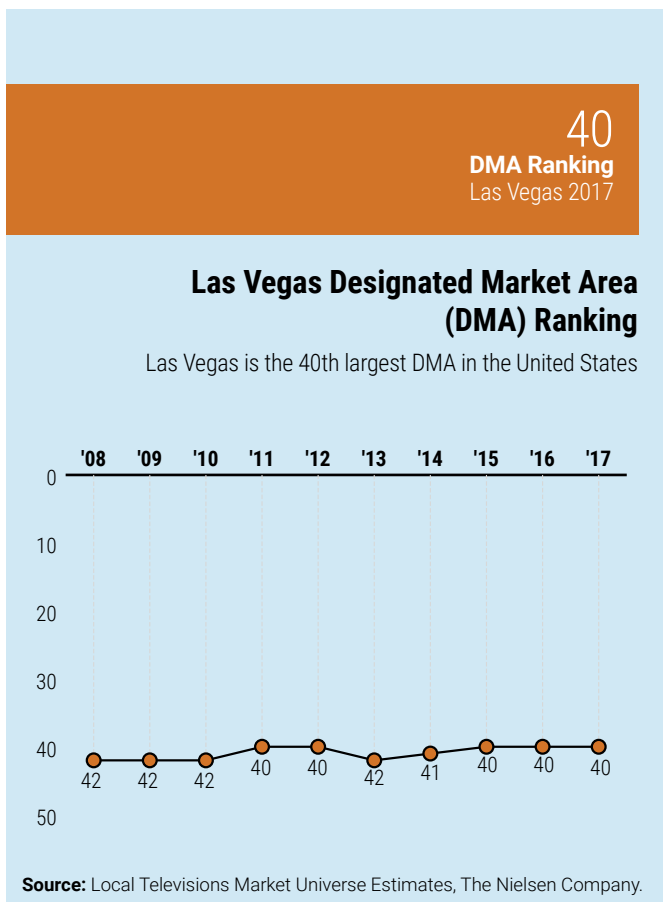

Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA)

The Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA) is a not-for-profit, regional water agency that was formed to address southern Nevada's unique water needs on a regional basis. SNWA is responsible for treating and delivering high-quality water, operating and managing regional water facilities, and implementing comprehensive water conservation programs. The wholesale water agency also maintains a 50-year water resource plan to ensure a secure water supply for southern Nevada over the next half-century.

Enhancing its nationally renowned water conservation program, SNWA initiated new restrictions prohibiting Sunday landscape irrigation, a step projected to save the community an additional 900 million gallons of water annually. The SNWA's suite of water efficiency and conservation incentive programs combined with water reuse have reduced the state's Colorado River water consumption by approximately 30%, even as southern Nevada's population and tourism base continue to grow.

Last year, the SNWA participated in negotiations that led to the signing of Minute 323, an addendum to the 1944 treaty between the U.S. and Mexico that permits storage of Mexico's deferred Colorado River water deliveries in Lake Mead and allows U.S. water agencies to invest in water efficiency projects in Mexico. In exchange for its investment, the SNWA will secure more than 27,000 acre-feet of water to meet the community's future needs. Overall, the provisions outlined in Minute 323 will help bolster water levels in Lake Mead, delay potential shortage conditions on the river, and provide more certainty for Colorado River water users in both countries.

The SNWA also spearheaded a national survey through the Water Utility Climate Alliance to assess if and how water utilities are addressing the risk of climate change to their water supplies. And, through a partnership with WaterStart—which involves the Nevada governor's office and a variety of progressive partners committed to investing in water innovation to broaden Nevada's economic base—the SNWA is field-testing emerging technologies that hold great potential for improving the efficiency of water use and system operations.

SNWA member agencies include the Big Bend Water District in Laughlin; the cities of Las Vegas, Henderson, North Las Vegas, and Boulder City; the Clark County Water Reclamation District; and the Las Vegas Valley Water District. Together, these seven agencies provide water and wastewater services to southern Nevada's two million residents and more than 40 million annual visitors.

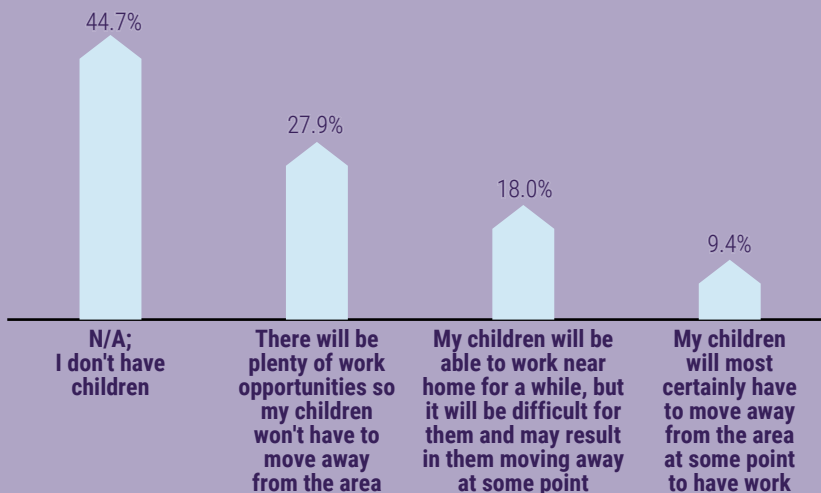

Number of New Home Sales

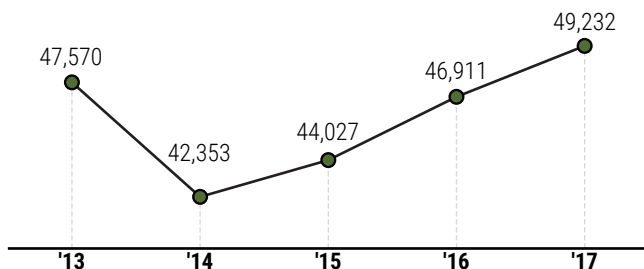


Median New Home Price

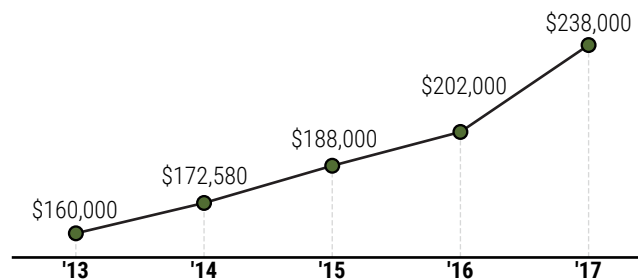

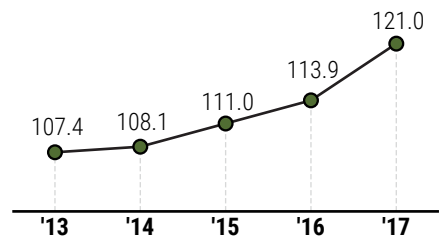

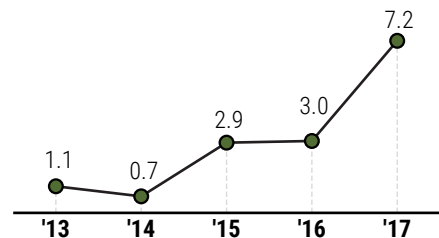
Las Vegas Industrial Market Inventory

(Million SF at Year-end)



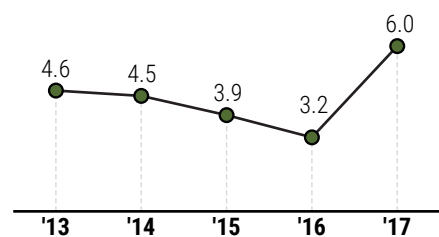
Las Vegas Industrial Market Completions

(Million SF Constructed)



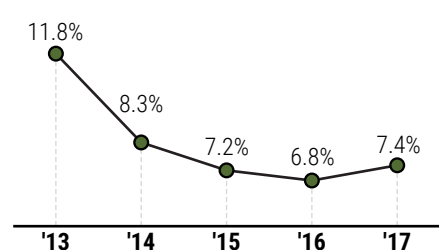
Las Vegas Industrial Market Net Absorption

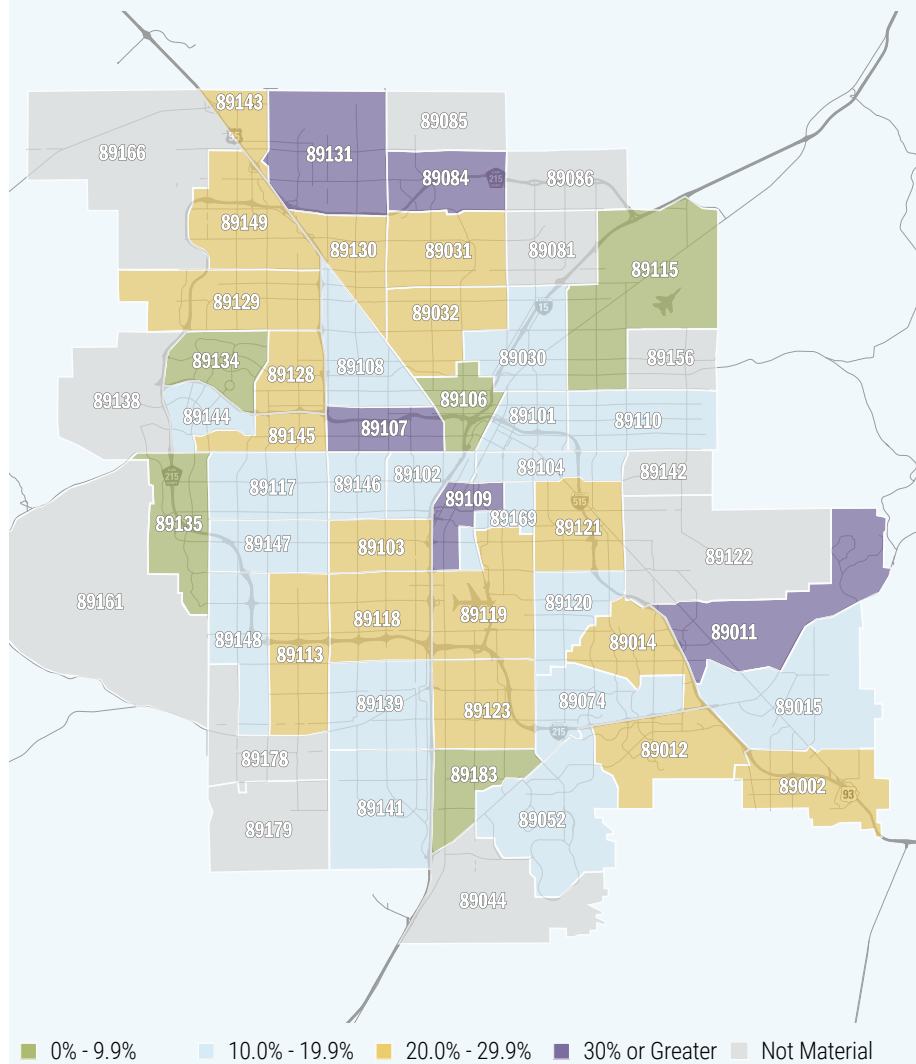

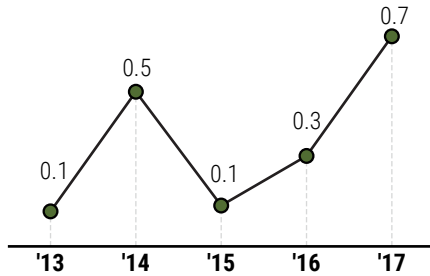
Las Vegas Office Market Inventory
(Million SF at Year-end)



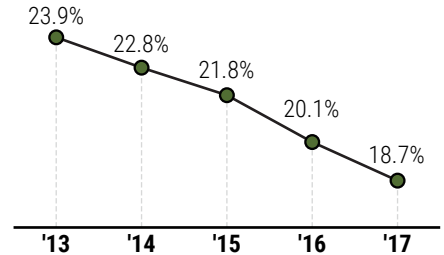
Las Vegas Office Market Net Absorption

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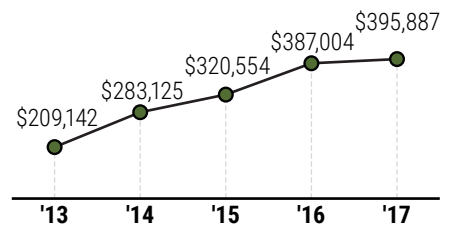

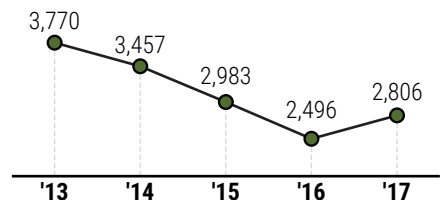

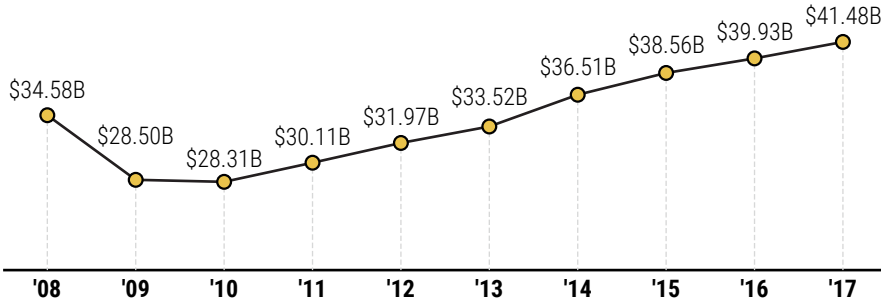

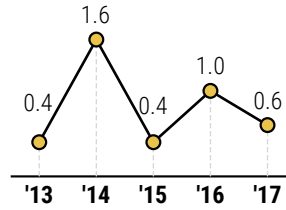
Las Vegas Retail Market Inventory (Million SF at Year-end)



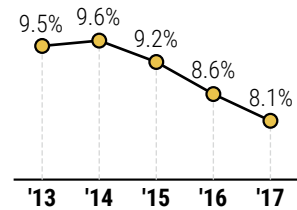
Las Vegas Retail Market Completions (Million SF Constructed)

Las Vegas Retail Market Vacancy Rate (As of Year-end)

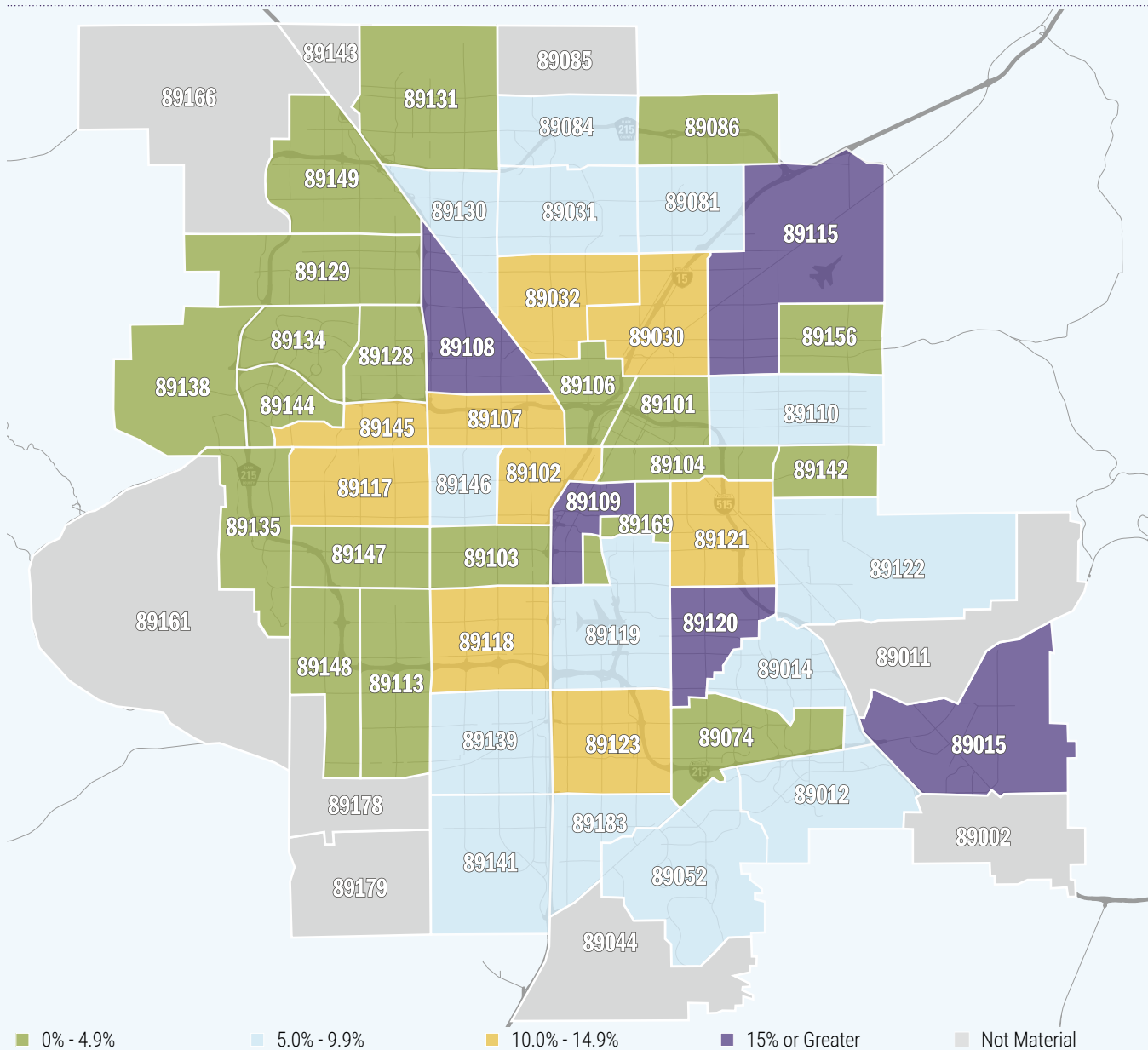

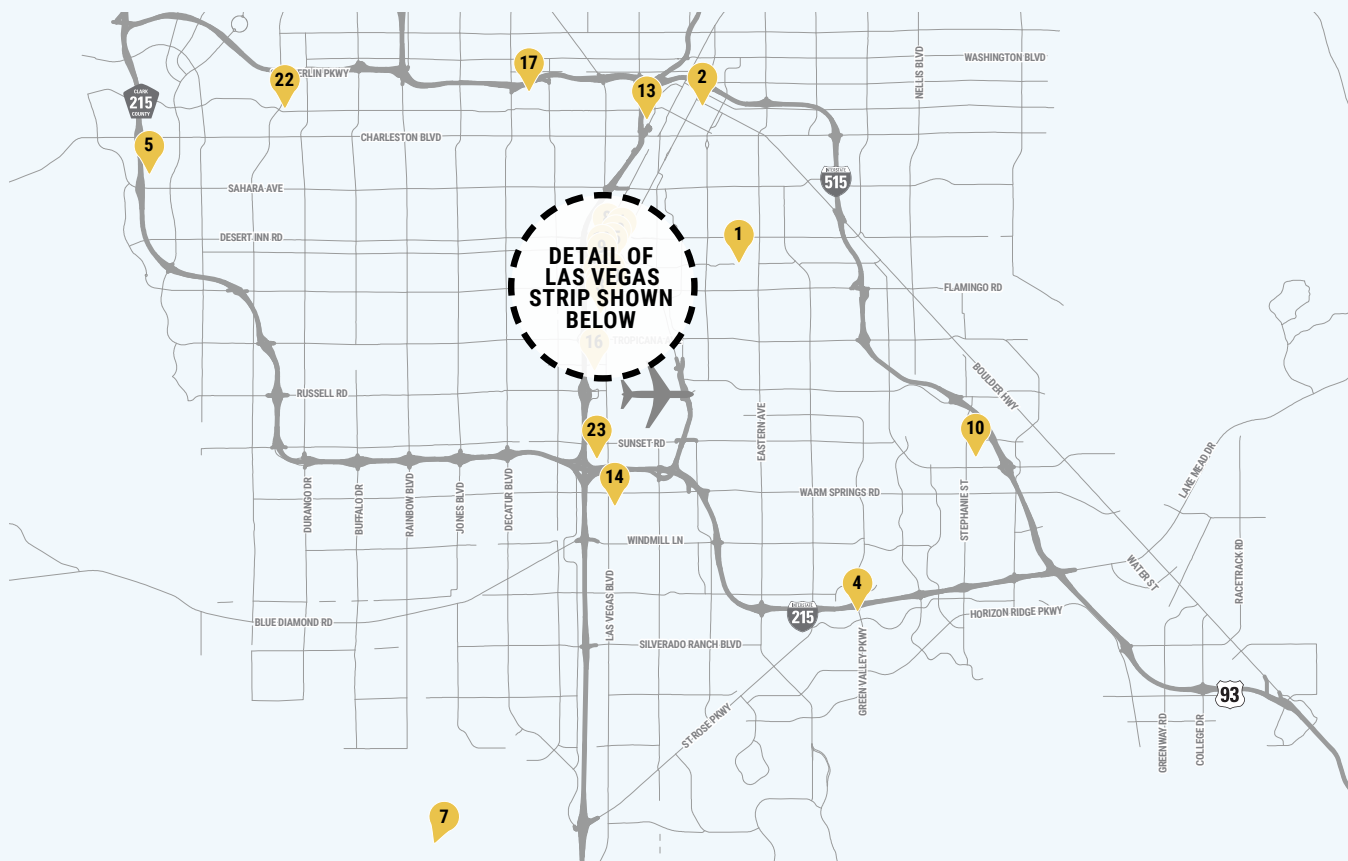

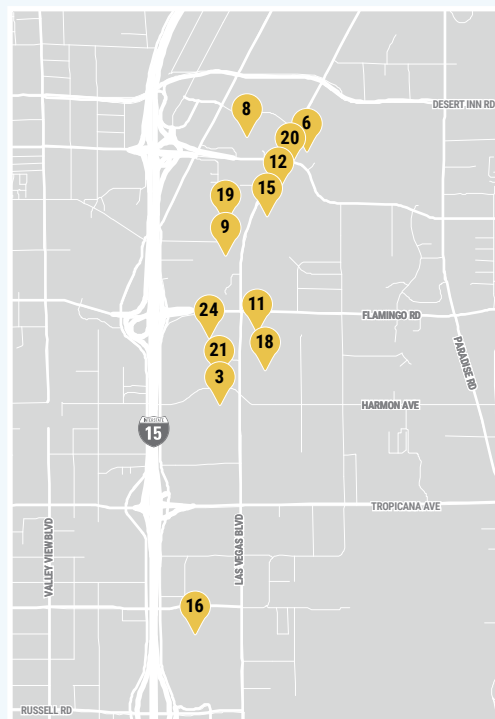

More than 4,000 attached residences of all kinds are planned at Downtown Summerlin to create a high-density urban residential community comprised of apartments, condominiums, lofts and brownstones. The Constellation, a luxury multifamily development with 124 residences, opened in 2016 as Downtown Summerlin's first apartment complex and is now fully leased. Plans were recently announced for a second apartment development with 267 units that will begin construction in early 2018.

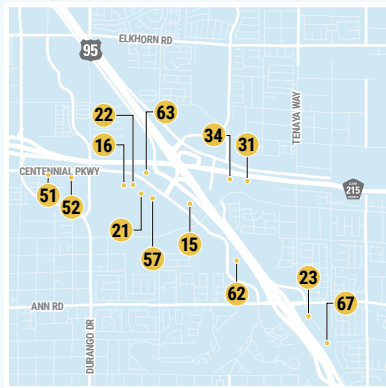
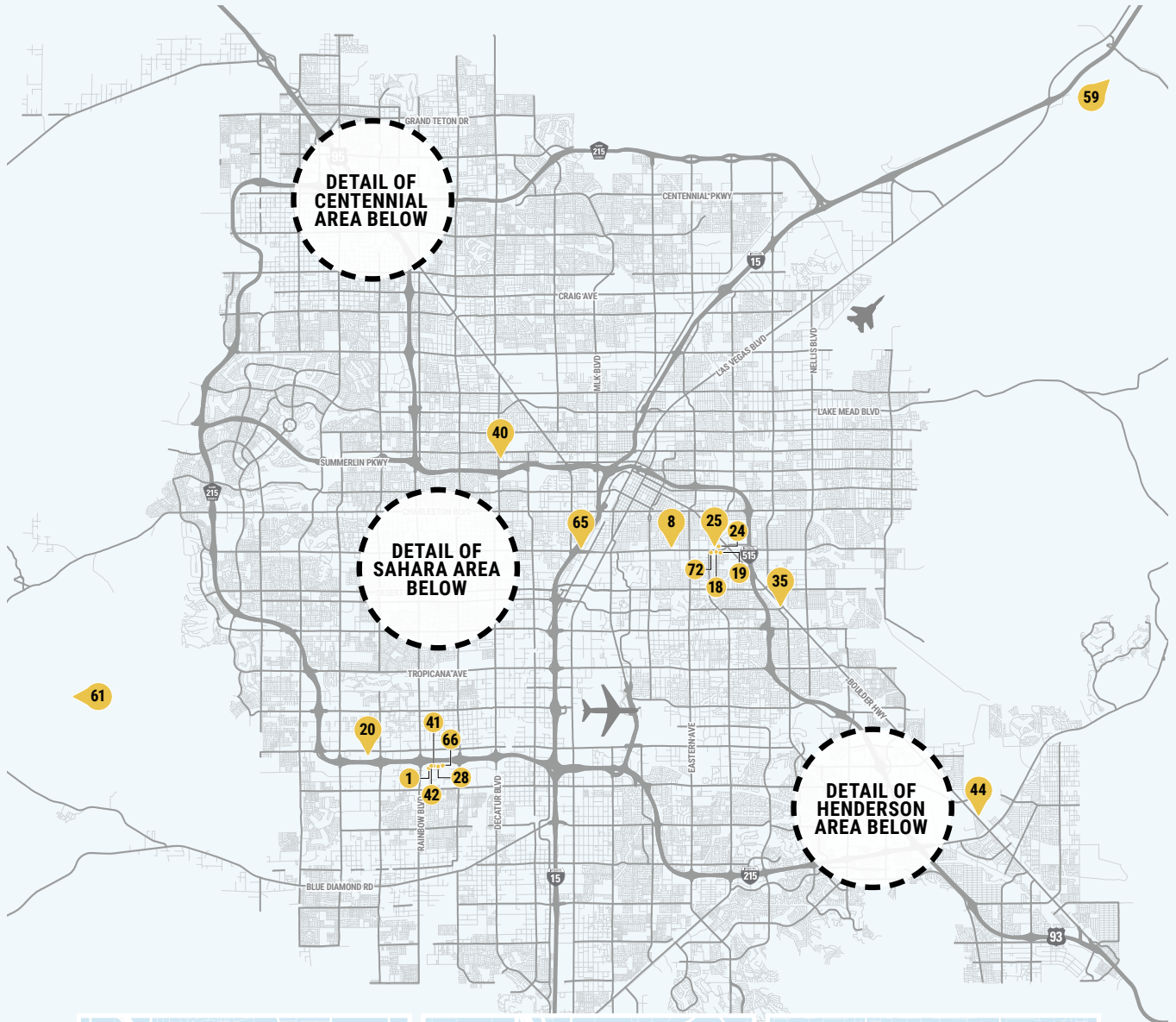
Rounding out Downtown Summerlin landmark facilities are Red Rock Casino Resort & Spa, Lifetime Athletic and the City National Bank building.



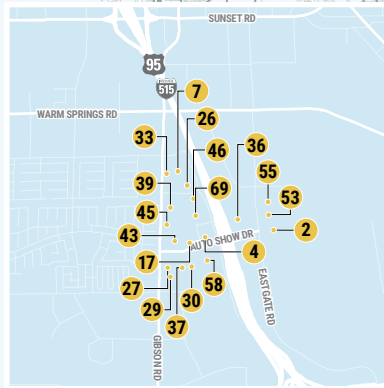

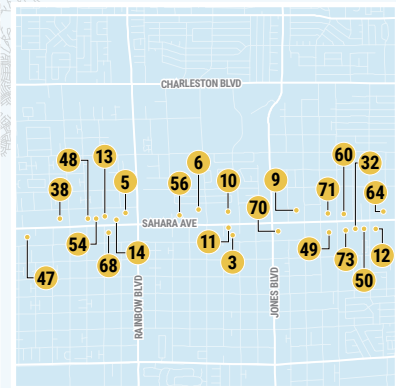

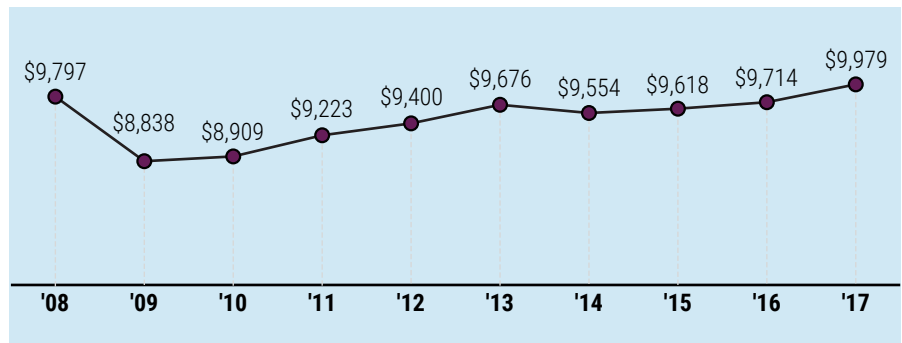

The Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority (LVCVA) is charged with marketing southern Nevada as a tourism and convention destination worldwide, and also with operating the Las Vegas Convention Center. With nearly 150,000 hotel rooms in Las Vegas alone and more than 11 million square feet of meeting and exhibit space citywide, the LVCVA's mission centers on attracting ever increasing numbers of leisure and business visitors to the area.

The Las Vegas Convention Center (LVCC), located one block east of the Las Vegas Strip, opened in 1959 and encompasses approximately 3.2 million square feet with approximately 2 million square feet of exhibit space and more than 241,000 square feet of meeting space. The facility, one of the most modern and functional centers in the world, is centrally located a short distance from 100,000 guest rooms.

In addition to exhibit and convention space, 144 meeting rooms handle seating capacities ranging from 20 to 2,500. A grand lobby and registration area (more than 225,000 square feet) efficiently link exhibiting of multiple events.

The LVCVA has just launched Phase 2 of the Las Vegas Convention Center District (LVCCD), a major economic development project to expand and renovate the convention center. The 1.4-million-square-foot expansion will provide an additional 600,000 square feet of exhibit space and accompanying meeting rooms, public areas, and service facilities. It will also provide a full renovation of the existing facility. This expansion will help Las Vegas maintain its status as the No. 1 trade show and convention destination for years to come.

Community Survey Methodology

This web-based survey was commissioned by Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance and conducted between February 27, 2018 and March 27, 2018. Respondents were selected from the current Clark County workforce and thus excludes retirees, students and other unemployed workers. The sample size of the survey was 500 with a margin of error of +/- 3.7 percent at the 90 percent confidence interval.
