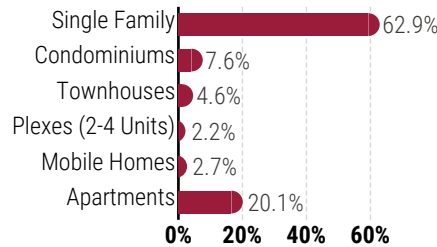

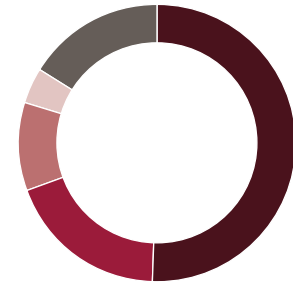

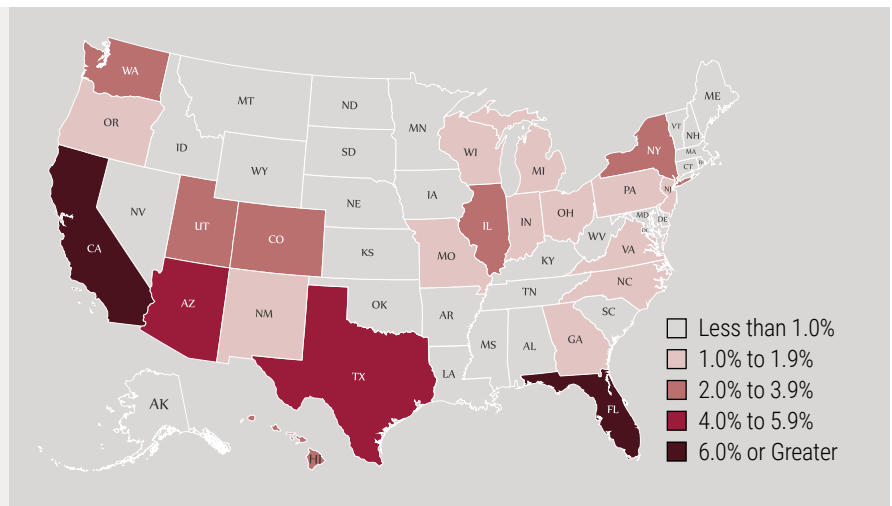

### Household Income Distribution



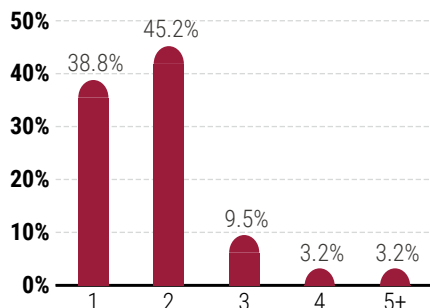

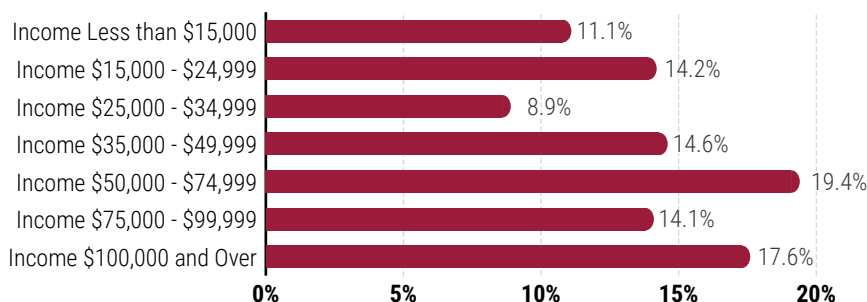

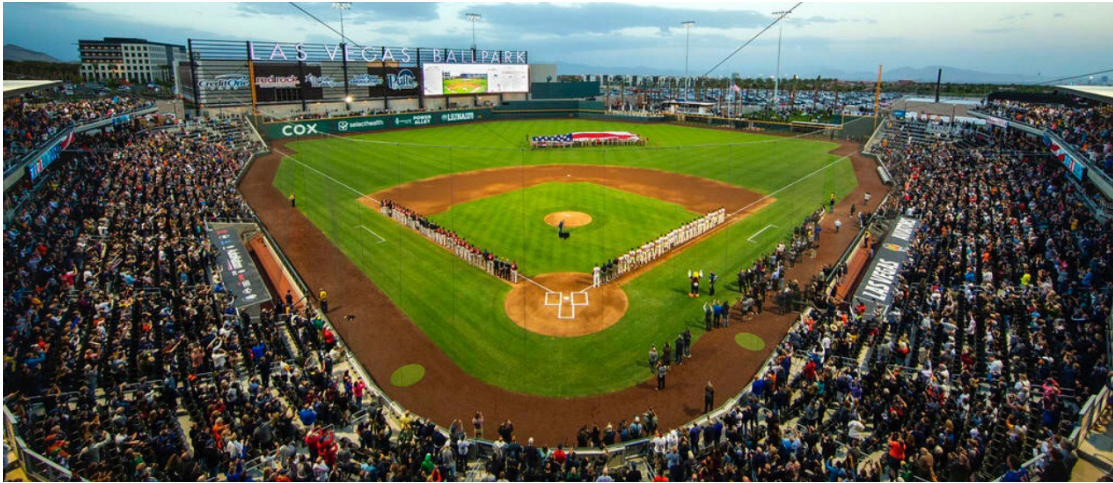

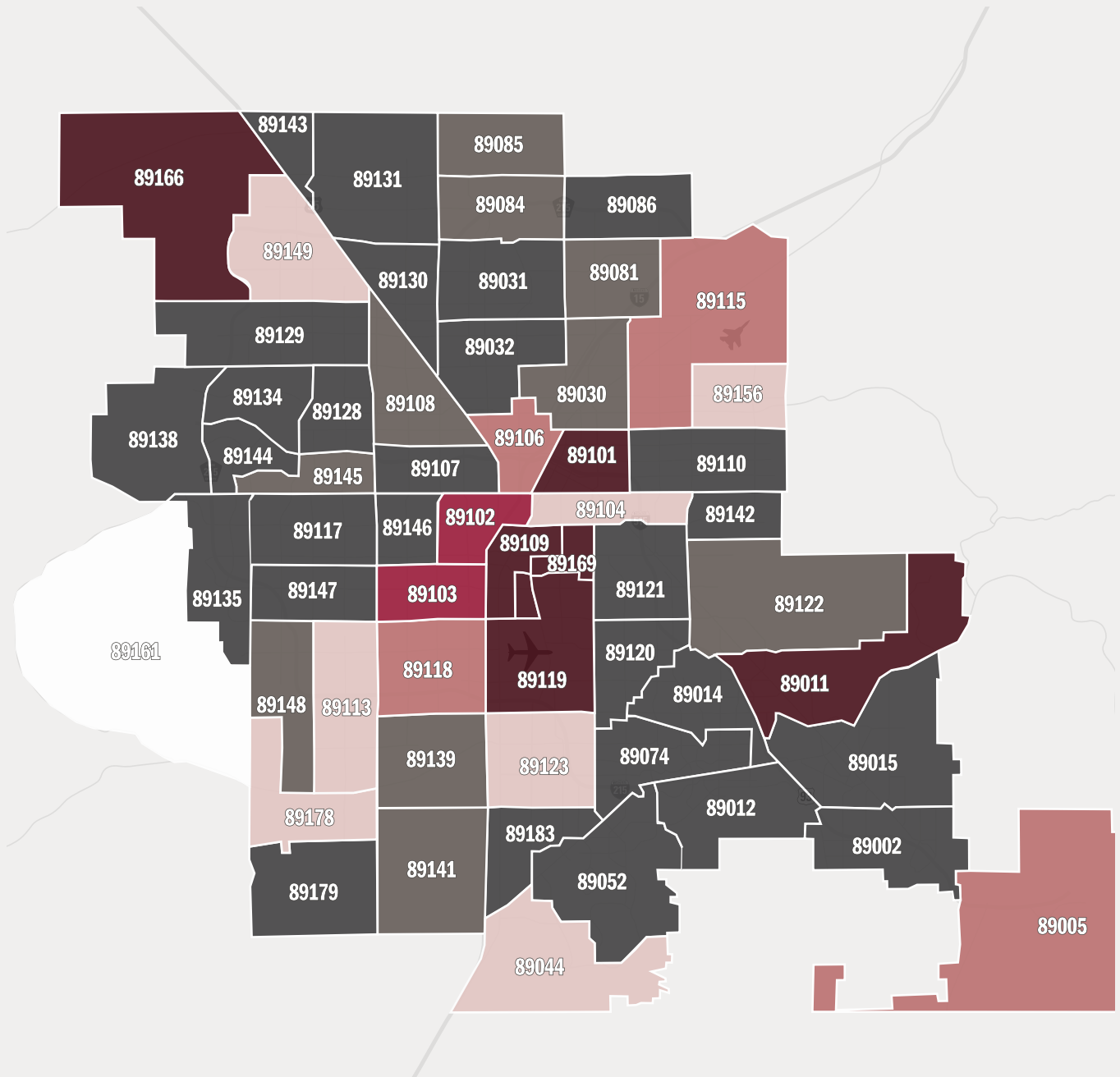

## About the Index

The Council for Community and Economic Research, C2ER, produces the Cost of Living Index to provide a useful and reasonably accurate measure of living cost differences among urban areas. Items on which the Index is based have been carefully chosen to reflect the different categories of consumer expenditures. Weights assigned to relative costs are based on government survey data on expenditure patterns for professional and executive households. All items are priced in each place at a specified time and according to standardized specifications.

## Interpreting the Index

The Cost of Living Index measures relative price levels for consumer goods and services in participating areas. The average for all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, equals 100, and each participant's index is read as a percentage of the average for all places.

auto maintenance and gasoline. **HEALTHCARE:** Office visits to optometrist, doctor and dentist. Non-prescription drugs and prescription drugs. **MISCELLANEOUS GOODS & SERVICES:** Hamburger sandwiches, pizza, fried chicken, haircut, beauty salon, toothpaste, shampoo, dry cleaning, men's shirt, boy's jeans, women's slacks, major appliance repair, newspaper subscription, movie, tennis balls, veterinary services, beer, wine and drop-in yoga class.

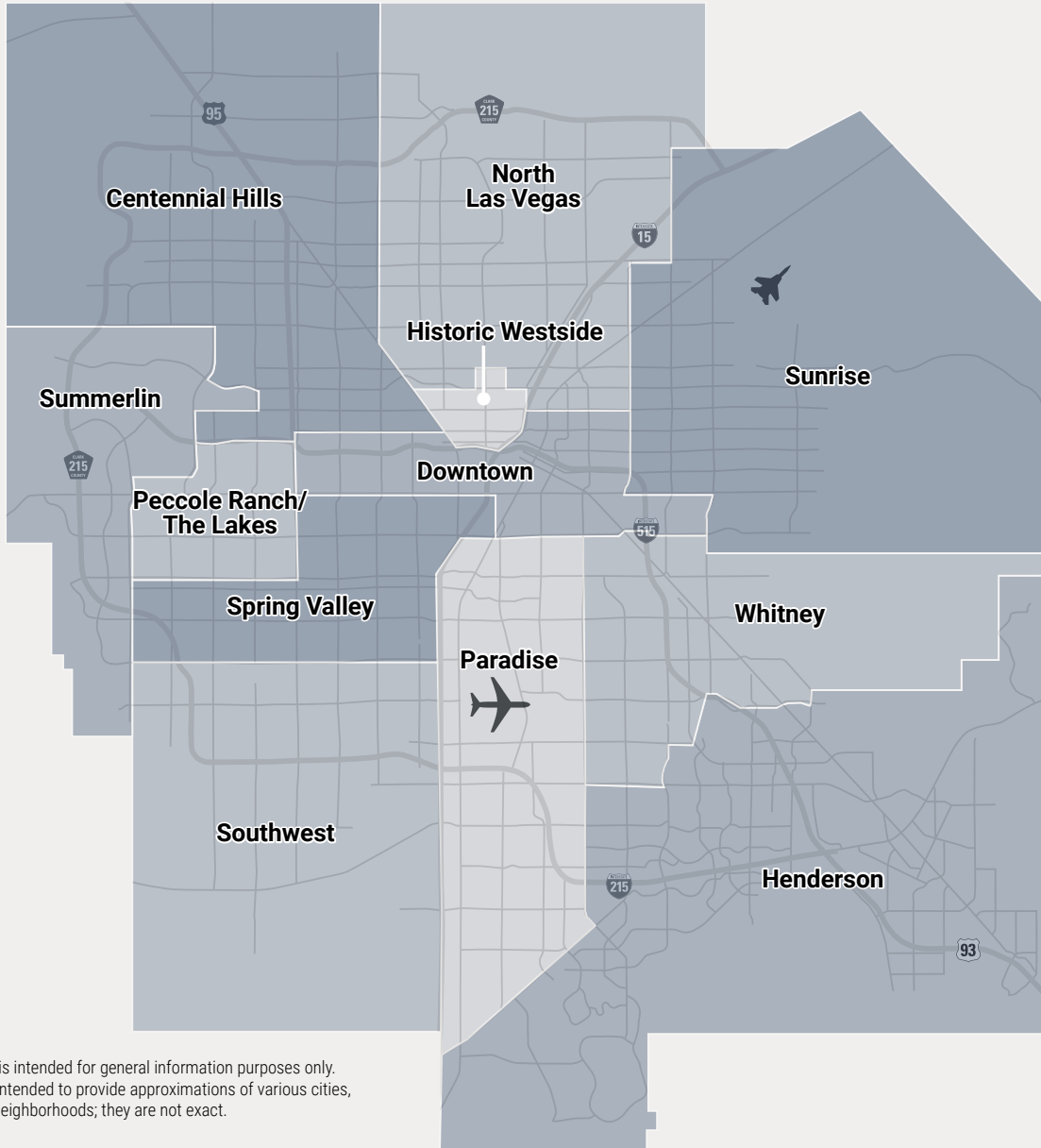

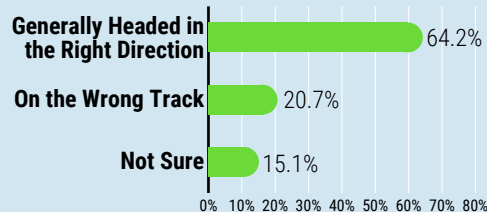

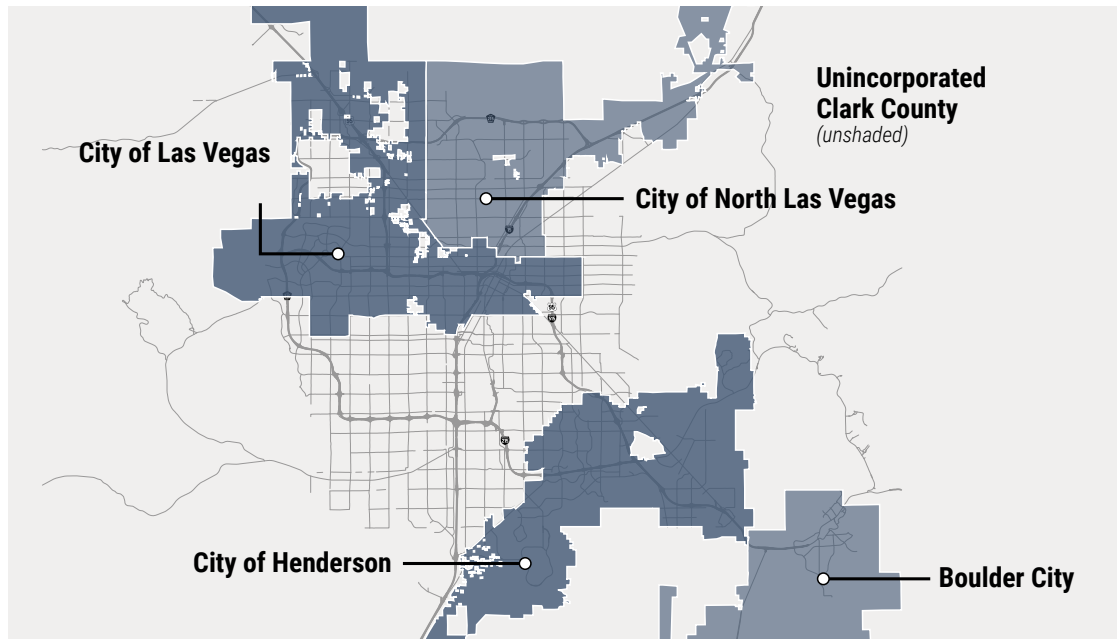

## Clark County

With jurisdiction over the world-famous Las Vegas Strip and covering an area the size of New Jersey, Clark County, is the nation's 14th-largest county. If Clark County's unincorporated area were a city, it would be the largest in Nevada. Clark County is governed by a seven-member County Commission, elected from geographic districts on a partisan basis for staggered four-year terms. William Andrews Clark, who established the railroad that linked Los Angeles with Salt Lake City. Las Vegas was founded in 1905, after Clark's railroad purchased land for a town site and sold lots via auction, creating Downtown Las Vegas.

The City of Henderson is nestled among three of the most renowned man-made attractions – the neon of Vegas, the engineering marvel of the Hoover Dam, and the tranquil beauty of Lake Mead. As a vibrant and inviting residential and business community, Henderson offers an abundance of cultural events, special attractions, miles of trails and open spaces, and outstanding recreational facilities, as well as renowned resorts, restaurants and shopping.

Henderson, located in the expansive Las Vegas Valley, has been home to pioneers and visionaries long before its incorporation in 1953, and has grown to be the second-largest city in Nevada, with a population of 314,486. The City operates under a council-manager form of government. Elected officials consist of a mayor, four city council members and three municipal judges. The mayor and council are elected at large on a nonpartisan basis. All elected officials serve four-year terms. City Council meetings are held on the first and third Tuesday of each month.

Henderson is consistently recognized as a premier destination to live, work and play. In fact, MONEY Magazine ranked Henderson as one of America’s Top 100 Best Places to Live and WalletHub.com rated Henderson as one of the best cities in the U.S. to start a business.

With Southern Nevada’s favorable tax climate, Henderson’s business-friendly government and the City’s revolutionary expansion of entrepreneurship, business leaders across the nation have turned to the City of Henderson’s Economic Development and Tourism Department for assistance in expanding and relocating their businesses to Henderson.





## City of Las Vegas

Las Vegas was founded as a city on May 15, 1905, when 110 acres of land were auctioned off by the Union Pacific Railroad. Las Vegas was incorporated on June 1, 1911. The city is divided into six wards with an elected representative for each ward. The mayor is elected at large to serve the entire community.

The city of Las Vegas is a council-manager form of government, combining the strong political leadership of elected officials with the vigorous managerial experience of an appointed city manager. All policies and major budget decisions rest with the City Council and with the city manager charged with running the day-to-day operations of the organization.

Today, the city's core – Downtown Las Vegas - is in the midst of a renaissance, inspiring key projects such as The Smith Center for the Performing Arts and the Cleveland Clinic Lou Ruvo Center for Brain Health, both located at Symphony Park, a 61-acre development in the heart of the city. Other key downtown projects like the Mob Museum, Neon Museum, DISCOVERY Children's Museum, the Las Vegas Premium Outlets and the Zappos.com headquarters have brought an economic influx to the place where Las Vegas started.

In addition, the Las Vegas City Council has prioritized the Las Vegas Medical District, which is emerging as one of the most important economic development projects in Southern Nevada. With the health and well-being of the community in mind, the medical district is a collaborative effort between the city, area hospitals, the UNLV School of Medicine and other downtown Las Vegas medical providers. Its goal is to become the clinical care, research, wellness and education and training center of Southern Nevada and the premier academic medical district in the southwestern United States.

The Smart City Transportation Master Plan is another way the city of Las Vegas is leading the way in essential areas of innovation. The city's philosophy, "mobility for all," led the city to establish an Innovation District that encourages and facilitates the testing of cutting-edge technologies with a particular focus on autonomous vehicles and technologies that advance mobility and transportation. Through a variety of public/private partnerships, the city is testing a driverless shuttle operating on a 0.6-mile loop in mixed traffic within the Fremont East Entertainment District. Via a federal grant, the city and the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada are preparing to launch a driverless shuttle called GoMed to better connect downtown residents with the Las Vegas Medical District. The city is mapping downtown roadways via Lidar 3-D technology to better guide autonomous vehicles; and the city is developing a robust downtown wireless network to support communication between vehicles, roadside infrastructure and traffic management centers. There are also six traffic signals downtown that are outfitted with Dedicated Short Range Communication (DSRC) radios that broadcast the signal timing and phasing. The installation of the DSRC on the traffic signals were the main infrastructure modification made for the project, which aids the driverless shuttle in recognizing traffic signal phases.

Downtown Las Vegas is also home and host to the Downtown Project, a private catalyst for new and inventive businesses, which includes the Downtown Container Park among its many investments. Other areas breathing a fresh, hip vibe into the area include the Fremont East Entertainment District, Fremont Street Experience, a new major hotel called Circa now under development by gaming mogul Derek Stevens, Main Street, 18b The Las Vegas Arts District and multiple restaurants and small businesses.

The City, which was incorporated in 1946, encompasses 104 square miles within Clark County in Southern Nevada. The City operates under a council-manager form of government, with a Mayor and four City Council members. The Mayor is elected at large; Council members are elected by wards. The City has one municipal judge who is elected at large. The City of North Las Vegas stretches across the northern rim of the Las Vegas Valley and is home to 252,000 residents.

The City of North Las Vegas is proud of its longstanding tradition of maintaining a business-friendly atmosphere. North Las Vegas is taking care of business, paving the way to become a premier site for green sustainable industries, manufacturing, e-commerce and distribution centers, retail, and high-tech businesses. The City also fosters a positive environment for new small businesses and entrepreneurial endeavors. North Las Vegas has a number of resources for existing and prospective businesses, including strong community partnerships with agencies such as the Las Vegas Metro Chamber of Commerce and the Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance.

North Las Vegas also enjoys close proximity to major transportation corridors, railways, and two airports. This gives North Las Vegas businesses easy access to large and growing markets across the Western United States, including California, Arizona, and Utah.

The City of North Las Vegas' Economic and Business Development Division is focused on creating a sustainable community that promotes a high standard of living and the long-term economic health of the City by developing human capital, critical infrastructure, regional competitiveness, and business growth through expansion, and attracting industries for manufacturing and distribution. Priority areas include:

- › Medical Job Creation Zone, a 150-acre medical and research campus adjacent to the VA Hospital
- › Infill development

- › Apex Industrial Park, including related infrastructure projects: 750,000-gallon elevated water tank, \$58 million I-15/U.S.93 Garnet Interchange, U.S. 93 capacity improvements, 12-mile surface water line

## Mesquite



Mesquite, a municipality with over 22,000 people, is located approximately 80 miles northeast of Las Vegas along Interstate 15 near the Nevada/Arizona border. Nestled in the heart of the Virgin River Valley, Mesquite is known for its stunning natural beauty, low cost of living, and high quality of life.

For decades, Mesquite has been known as a tourism and recreation destination, with seven championship golf courses and more outdoor recreation within a 100-mile radius of its boundaries than any other city in the western U.S.

In recent years, Mesquite has also become known as a top place to do business. In 2015, the Boyd Company, a noted site selection firm, rated Mesquite as one of the top 25 U.S. locations for new distribution warehouse operations.

Mesquite sits exactly 365 miles between Los Angeles, CA and Salt Lake City, UT and has approximately 4,000 acres of industrial land available for commercial development, with abundant water supplies. Mesquite has improved the transportation infrastructure access by building an all new freeway exit to serve the industrial core of the community. As Southern Nevada's regional economy expands, Mesquite is well positioned to take advantage of its diverse industrial growth.

The Clark County Commission is assisted by an elected 5-member Town Advisory Board.

The county and special districts have invested significantly into infrastructure for diversification to help the community grow. The community has plenty of water, drawn directly from the Colorado River, and sewer services for domestic, commercial, and industrial use.

**Business Development:** The Laughlin Economic Development Corporation provides business development and site selection resources for businesses and industries wishing to locate in the township of some 80 square miles, of which only about 6 square miles are developed. The LEDC works closely with the county's Town Manager's Office, LVGEA and the Nevada Governor's Office of Economic Development.

Some 14 square miles of vacant land extends to the California and Arizona borders immediately south of the Big Bend State Park, which the 4-lane Needles Highway (15 miles to Interstate 40) bisects. A county-commissioned study showed industrial, commercial, and residential areas feasible for development. Also, the electric utilities that own a 4 square mile block in the middle of town, have offered more than 2,000 acres for sale to a master developer – with all utilities and roads surrounding the site of a former electric generating station that has been removed.

## Laughlin

Nevada's southern-most community, Laughlin, is nestled between the Colorado River and the mountains at the point where Nevada, California, and Arizona meet in the desert.

Home to some 11,000 residents, the modern community includes retirees from every career imaginable who are better-off financially than average and higher educated than average. Most pay cash for their homes in the residential area called Upper Laughlin at the base of the mountains overlooking the Colorado River.

Laughlin also enjoys two visitor seasons a year, attracting some 2 million visitors annually. In the mild winters, "snowbirds" flock to the community in their RVs. In the summer, Laughlin draws water-worshipping/sun-loving visitors with their watercrafts whom share the aquatic, eastern Nevada border with the community's water taxis and riverboats.

Laughlin also is home to Nevada's Big Bend State Recreational Park, complete with full service RV hookups and services, and the Clark County-operated Colorado River Heritage Greenway Park and Trails for walking, hiking, bicycling, and picnic and fishing facilities. It extends several miles from Davis Dam, which forms Lake Mohave, downstream to a scenic pedestrian bridge over Nevada Highway 163 that extends into Downtown Laughlin. Ten casinos, many with high-rise towers providing tremendous views of the water, slopes, and mountains framing Laughlin to the east and west, provide gambling, dining, entertainment, and shopping in a 2 mile strip, and the Laughlin River Walk between the resorts and the water's edge.

As part of the Las Vegas Metropolitan Statistical Area, Laughlin is also a distinct part of the tri-state river communities' Mohave Valley, extending to Needles, Calif., and Golden Shores on the south at Interstate 40 upriver to Bullhead City and the Lake Mohave section of the Lake Mead National Recreation Area on the north.

Laughlin is ripe for Vegas Valley businesses to open branch stores and offices in the community. As the area's primary advocate for sensible growth, the Laughlin Economic Development Corporation, provides networking, promotion, professional services, and site location assistance.

### Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC)

The Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada (RTC) is one of the only agencies nationwide that manages public transit, traffic management, and roadway planning and funding, in addition to administering the Southern Nevada Strong (SNS) regional plan, all under one roof. The RTC creates an efficient and effective transportation system that promotes mobility as a key driver to an economically vibrant community.



As the transportation planning organization for Southern Nevada, the RTC works with local municipalities to plan, fund and launch infrastructure projects that improve Southern Nevada's roads and transportation options. To meet the region's growing transportation needs, the RTC has awarded all of the 225 contracts under the first Fuel Revenue Indexing (FRI) initiative, with most projects already completed. The agency is now working with the jurisdictions to prioritize and fund infrastructure and roadway projects under the extension of FRI through 2026.

As the region's transit agency, the RTC operates 39 bus routes throughout the valley. Recognized as one of the most efficient transit systems in the U.S., the RTC fixed-route system completes approximately 64 million passenger trips a year with a fleet of more than 400 vehicles. The agency is committed to converting nearly all of its fleet to compressed natural gas (CNG) vehicles over the next several years to help improve the valley's air quality.

The RTC's traffic management center, the Freeway and Arterial System of Transportation (FAST), uses intelligent technology to monitor traffic flow, identify detours, adjust traffic signals and keep vehicles moving as smoothly as possible. Working in coordination with local jurisdictions, NHP and NDOT, FAST's regional coordination has been advantageous to Southern Nevada and private industry alike. It has enticed globally recognized companies to launch innovative technologies and pilot demonstrations on the streets of Southern Nevada.

These cutting-edge projects include the groundbreaking artificial intelligence-based and real-time reporting platform of Waycare to respond to roadway incidents up to 12 minutes faster and predict where dangerous driving conditions may occur, resulting in a 17 percent reduction in primary crashes on a segment of I-15. The RTC is also preparing to launch GoMed in 2020, which will connect downtown Las Vegas with the growing medical district via autonomous shuttles. Thanks to a \$5.3 million federal grant, GoMed will enhance mobility for patients, medical professionals and the new UNLV medical school as well as improve pedestrian safety.

As the region's metropolitan planning organization, the RTC engages in transportation-related planning studies and coordinates the long-term collaborative planning through SNS. The SNS Implementation Office coordinates with regional partners to execute the plan's goals of providing access to reliable transportation, increasing housing options for all income levels, ensuring quality education, and strengthening social services and healthcare networks.

For the region, it means jobs, progress and growth. In addition, the RTC works with the local jurisdictions and private companies to demonstrate new, advanced transportation technologies that help diversify the local economy and improve mobility and safety on our roads.

**Business Development:** From its inception in 2014, Fuel Revenue Indexing (FRI) has significantly spurred economic development in Southern Nevada, especially within the small-business community. FRI has generated 225 contracts for critical roadway improvement projects that employed nearly 80 small businesses and created 8,101 jobs overall. And since Southern Nevadans voted in 2016 to extend FRI until 2026, our community will benefit from continued economic development from future transportation infrastructure projects.

The RTC's commitment to furthering advanced transportation technology and smart community initiatives has resulted in pilot projects, contracts and product launches with nearly a dozen private sector partners, including Audi, Waycare, Keolis, Inrix, Aptiv, Lyft, Qualcomm, Commsignia, Tango, Geotab, Nexar, and iCone.

### 2018 RTC Accomplishments

- › Completed construction on time and within budget and opened the first phase of Interstate 11 (I-11), a 12.5-mile highway segment that enhances travel and commerce between Arizona and Nevada by reducing congestion, increasing safety and improving local access to businesses and regional mobility.
- › Awarded all 225 roadway construction projects funded by the first phase of Fuel Revenue Indexing that totaled \$628 million, created 8,101 jobs and provided work to nearly 80 local small businesses.
- › Broke ground on the first project funded by the 10-year extension of Fuel Revenue Indexing, the Lone Mountain Road improvement project between the 215 Beltway and Tenaya Way.
- › Enacted more frequent service along nine popular RTC transit routes. Fifteen of RTC's 39 routes, or about 40 percent, now run every 20 minutes or better during weekday daytime hours, making service more convenient for passengers.
- › Launched RTC Ride On-Demand, same-day, on-demand service for a group of paratransit and veteran clients. This public-private partnership offers wheelchair-accessible vehicles to ensure equitable service to the disabled community, resulting in an average 50-percent savings in operating costs.
- › Launched a workforce mobility partnership with Lyft to provide first-and last-mile service from 13 designated RTC bus stops for employees of a North Las Vegas warehouse not served by transit. Lyft provides trips at reduced rate, while the employer pays the majority of the cost.
- › Continued developing On Board, our community's future mobility plan, with local agency partners through planning exercises and gathered public feedback via community conversations and presentations, including a vision and values survey that collected more than 22,000 responses and touched more than 80,000 people.
- › Engaged with agency partners to "Reimagine Boulder Highway" to analyze and propose potential improvements to a corridor that experiences 10 percent of pedestrian fatalities in the entire state of Nevada.
- › Installed LiveTrax software on all 404 transit vehicles, allowing local police departments access to real-time camera feeds on all buses, which improves customer safety.
- › Enhanced the rideRTC app to include safety and more convenient trip-planning functions.
- › Along with all six local jurisdictions and other public-sector agencies, adopted a unified vision for Smart Communities that helps provide a blueprint for continued coordination and cooperation as we work with various private-industry companies to leverage advanced technology to build a smarter and more connected Southern Nevada.
- › Transported more than 32,000 passengers on nearly 5,000 trips on the AAA/Navya autonomous shuttle in downtown Las Vegas, which wrapped up its year-long service in November.

Currently, Silver Rider offers transportation opportunities in eleven communities in Southern Nevada: Mesquite, Laughlin, Indian Springs, Logandale, Overton, Moapa Valley, Glendale, Searchlight, Cal-Nev-Ari, Palm Gardens and Boulder City.

## The Las Vegas Monorail

The Las Vegas Monorail has been transporting residents and visitors throughout the Las Vegas Strip on its zero-emissions trains for nearly 15 years. Leisure and business travelers comprise the vast majority of its millions of annual riders, though a number of Las Vegas residents have discovered the benefits of the Monorail getting to and from concerts, fights, Vegas Golden Knights games at the T-Mobile Arena and other events along Las Vegas Boulevard. As younger travelers and international visitors alike tend to utilize rail and transit modes more frequently, it's no surprise that 30 percent of Monorail riders are Millennials and more than 30 percent are international visitors to Las Vegas.

In 2017, the Monorail developed the technology interface to all conventions and tradeshows to integrate transit fares directly into attendees' badges, requiring only a quick tap of their show badge on Monorail faregates to ride the system. Several integrations were completed with multiple major, citywide tradeshows—including the National Association of Broadcasters, CONEXPO – Con/Agg, CES and PackExpo, with more to come.

As a long-established leader in providing driverless transit technology, the Monorail continues to be an early adopter of emerging technology solutions that enhance the rider experience. It has introduced mobile e-ticketing, allowing guests to purchase Monorail fare online and have it delivered to their mobile device; at the fare gates, they can simply scan the QR code and go. In addition, it is poised to provide a first-ever transit service solution in partnership with one of the world's most recognizable technology companies in early 2018.

As Las Vegas' most clean mass transit resource, the Monorail, aided in the annual removal of an estimated 2.1 million vehicle miles from Southern Nevada's major roadways, reducing emissions by more than 27 tons of carbon monoxide (CO), volatile organic compounds (VOC) and nitrogen oxides (NOx) over the course of 2018.

The Las Vegas Monorail has seven stations: MGM Grand, Bally's/Paris Las Vegas, Flamingo/Caesars Palace, Harrah's/The LINQ, Las Vegas Convention Center, Westgate Resort & Casino, and SLS Las Vegas. Trains arrive every few minutes at each station, enabling passengers to travel the length of the Strip in less than 15 minutes in a safe, clean, and climate-controlled environment. Hours of operation are Monday 7 a.m.-midnight, Tuesday-Thursday 7 a.m.-2 a.m., and Friday-Sunday 7 a.m.-3 a.m. A single ride ticket costs \$5 (\$1 for Nevada residents) and unlimited ride passes are available as well.

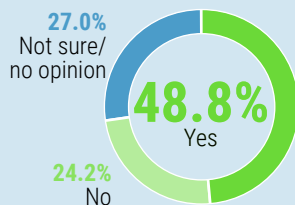

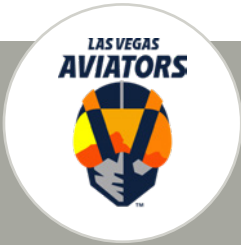

## Las Vegas Aviators

The Las Vegas organization has the proud distinction of being the longest enduring franchise in the history of professional sports in the state of Nevada. The 2019 campaign will mark the 37th Pacific Coast League season in the Silver State. The franchise has reached the 300,000 plateau in "home" attendance in all 36 seasons! Las Vegas' all-time attendance total at Cashman Field was 12,001,011.

Cashman Field opened in 1983 with the Stars, Triple-A affiliate of the San Diego Padres. The Stars were the home team for 18 years (1983-2000), until the franchise switched affiliations to the Los Angeles Dodgers in 2001. The franchise also unveiled a new alien theme logo based on the government base known as "Area 51." The team nickname was changed from Stars to 51s. The 51s were affiliated with the Dodgers for eight seasons (2001-08). Las Vegas then signed a Player Development Contract (PDC) with the Toronto Blue Jays and spent four seasons as the top affiliate of the Blue Jays (2009-12). Las Vegas, on Sept. 12, 2012, then announced a two-year PDC with the New York Mets. (2013-14). The 51s and Mets had a total of six years with the PDC (2013-18). The 51s, on Sept. 17, 2018, announced a "new" PDC with the Oakland Athletics for two seasons (through 2020). The Las Vegas franchise will rebrand in 2019! The new Las Vegas Ballpark (10,000), located in Downtown Summerlin, will open in April, to go along with the new team nickname: Aviators, which was officially announced on Dec. 8, 2018.

Fran Riordan will enter his first season as manager of Triple-A Las Vegas in the 2019 campaign. In 2018, Las Vegas compiled a record of 71-69 (.507) and finished in third place in the PCL Southern Division, behind El Paso.

## Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC)

UFC®, the world's premier mixed martial arts organization, boasts more than 278 million fans worldwide and has produced over 460 events in 24 countries since its inception in 1993.

UFC was acquired in 2016 by global sports, entertainment, and fashion leader Endeavor (formerly WME| IMG), along with strategic investors Silver Lake Partners and KKR, in what is among the largest transactions in sports history.

Since 2001, UFC has been proudly headquartered in Las Vegas, with a network of employees around the world. UFC produces more than 40 live events annually that consistently sell out some of the world's most prestigious arenas, and its programming is broadcast in over 165 countries and territories to more than one billion TV households worldwide in 40 different languages.

In October 2018, the biggest event in UFC history, UFC® 229: KHABIB vs. MCGREGOR, was held at T-Mobile Arena and generated \$86.4 million in economic impact for the Las Vegas metropolitan area, marking the largest economic impact for a single UFC event measured globally to date.<sup>1</sup> The event also set new records for attendance (20,034) and ticket revenue (\$17,188,894) for UFC in Las Vegas.

In addition to the \$86.4 million in total economic output, the landmark event also contributed \$17.2 million in salaries and wages and supported an estimated 414 jobs in the Southern Nevada market. Visitors attending events related to UFC® 229: KHABIB vs. MCGREGOR were responsible for an estimated \$3.7 million in public revenues in Nevada.

In 2017, UFC opened the doors of a brand new 184,000 square foot corporate campus that houses nearly 300 employees and includes the state-of-the-art UFC Performance Institute, the world's first mixed martial arts multi-disciplinary research, innovation, and training center. To date, more than 400 athletes from UFC's roster have utilized the facility and the services provided remotely. Several dozen NFL, NBA, NHL, MLB and Olympic sports athletes have also visited the facility for support during their off-season training. The UFC Performance Institute delivers elite-level programs that support MMA athletes with all their development, fight preparation, and rehabilitation requirements.

In 2019, UFC will open UFC APEX, a 130,000 square foot technologically advanced production facility adjacent to its Las Vegas headquarters that will host live events and other productions.

## Vegas Golden Knights

The Vegas Golden Knights are a National Hockey League franchise owned and operated by Black Knight Sports and Entertainment LLC. Established by founding partners William Foley, his family and the Maloof family, the Vegas Golden Knights came into existence on June 22, 2016 when the ownership group was awarded a franchise in Las Vegas, Nevada. The city was ready for major professional sports and when Foley brought the Golden Knights to Southern Nevada, the team became a state-wide phenomenon.

General Manager George McPhee began constructing the Golden Knights upon his hiring on July 13, 2016, building out his hockey operations staff and then selecting Gerard Gallant as the team's first head coach on April 13, 2017. Through calculated decisions at the NHL Expansion Draft, NHL Draft and throughout the season, the Golden Knights constructed a roster that would compete in the short term while also being well positioned for long term success.

The inaugural season of NHL hockey in the city kicked off with two road wins for the Golden Knights before the first game at T-Mobile Arena on the Las Vegas Strip. The team's home opener celebrated the bravery of the city in the aftermath of the October 1st tragedy.

After clinching the Pacific Division title on March 31, 2018, Golden Knights became the first modern-era expansion team from any of the four North American professional sports leagues to start from scratch and finish first in its division. With a fifth-place finish overall during the regular season, Vegas also became the first expansion team from any of the four North American professional sports leagues to start from scratch and finish among the top-five in the league.



Vegas went 12-3 in the first three rounds of the Stanley Cup Playoffs to reach the Stanley Cup Final, including a four game sweep of the Los Angeles Kings in the first round. They became the first expansion team to reach the Stanley Cup Final since the St. Louis Blues in 1968 and, with a victory in game one, became the first expansion team to win a game in the Final.

The Golden Knights inaugural season is considered to be the most successful first year for an expansion team in North American sports history.

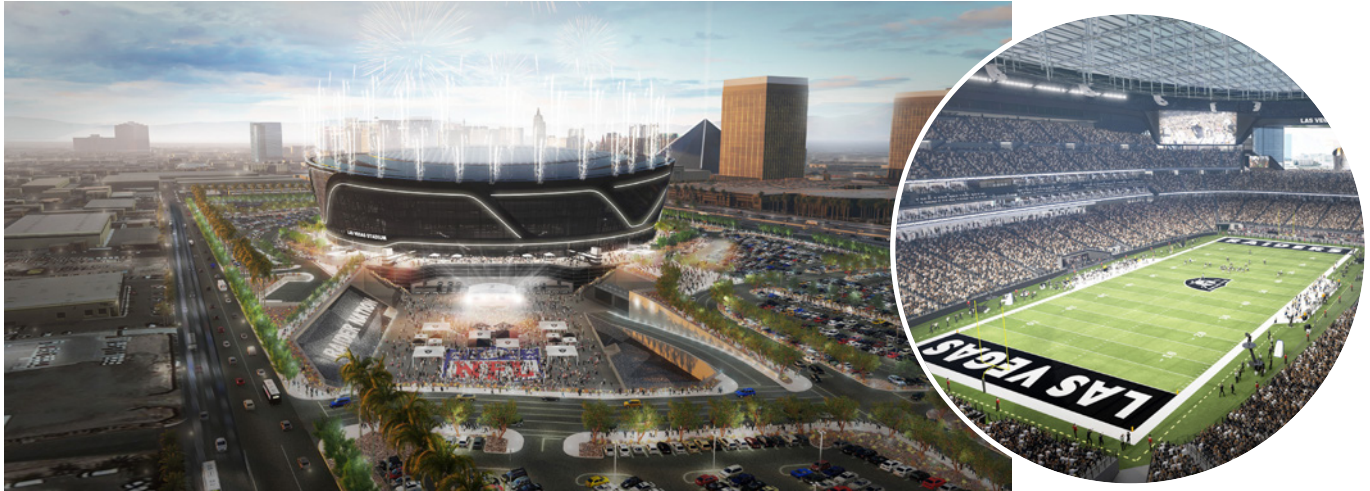

In 1963, Al Davis was named head coach and the league's youngest ever general manager, establishing a culture that has remained with the Raiders to this day. Whether it was changing the team colors to silver and black, innovating on the field, or articulating the team's values – "Commitment to Excellence" and "Just Win Baby" – Davis led the team to revered heights including 15 total Division Championships, five total Conference Championships, one American Football League Championship and three Super Bowl Championships.

One of the most recognizable brands in professional sports, the Raiders will permanently relocate to Las Vegas in time for the 2020 NFL season. In conjunction with their arrival, Las Vegas Stadium will open its doors adjacent to the Las Vegas Strip, and become one of the most technologically advanced stadiums in the world. The fully-enclosed and climate-controlled stadium will not only be the home to the Raiders, it will also host world-class entertainment including globally-recognized sporting events and concerts.

### Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl



Now nearly three decades old, the Las Vegas Bowl has been held each December since 1992 at Sam Boyd Stadium. The first bowl game in the nation owned and operated by ESPN Events, the game has boasted eight sell-out crowds in recent years. Hosting the top choice from the Mountain West vs. a Pacific-12 Conference opponent, the bowl has featured at least one ranked team in 12 of the last 13 games, including last year's 31-20 victory by No. 21 Fresno State over Arizona State before the ninth-biggest crowd in event history.

Known as the Mitsubishi Motors Las Vegas Bowl for the second straight year in 2019, the game has been the home to multiple college football milestones over the years. In 1995, Toledo and Nevada played in what was the first overtime game on the Division I FBS level. In 2002, Katie Hnida of New Mexico became the first woman to play in a FBS-level game when she entered to attempt an extra point. Also, 2011's game featured three scoring plays 98 yards or longer and was believed to be the first bowl game in history that included a kickoff return for a touchdown to start each half. The 2016 outing saw San Diego State's Donnel Pumphrey become the rushing king of college football when he passed Ron Dayne to finish with a career mark of 6,405 yards.

### Wrangler National Finals Rodeo (NFR)

For the 34th consecutive year, the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo culminated the rodeo season in Las Vegas. Known as the world's richest and most prestigious rodeo, the Wrangler NFR had a total event attendance of 171,000 over the 10 days of competition. Held from December 6-15, the event attracted the top 120 rodeo athletes in the world, vying for a share of the \$10 million purse and the coveted gold buckle. The event has now sold out 320 consecutive performances. According to the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority, the estimated total economic impact in 2018 for the event was \$187.5 million.

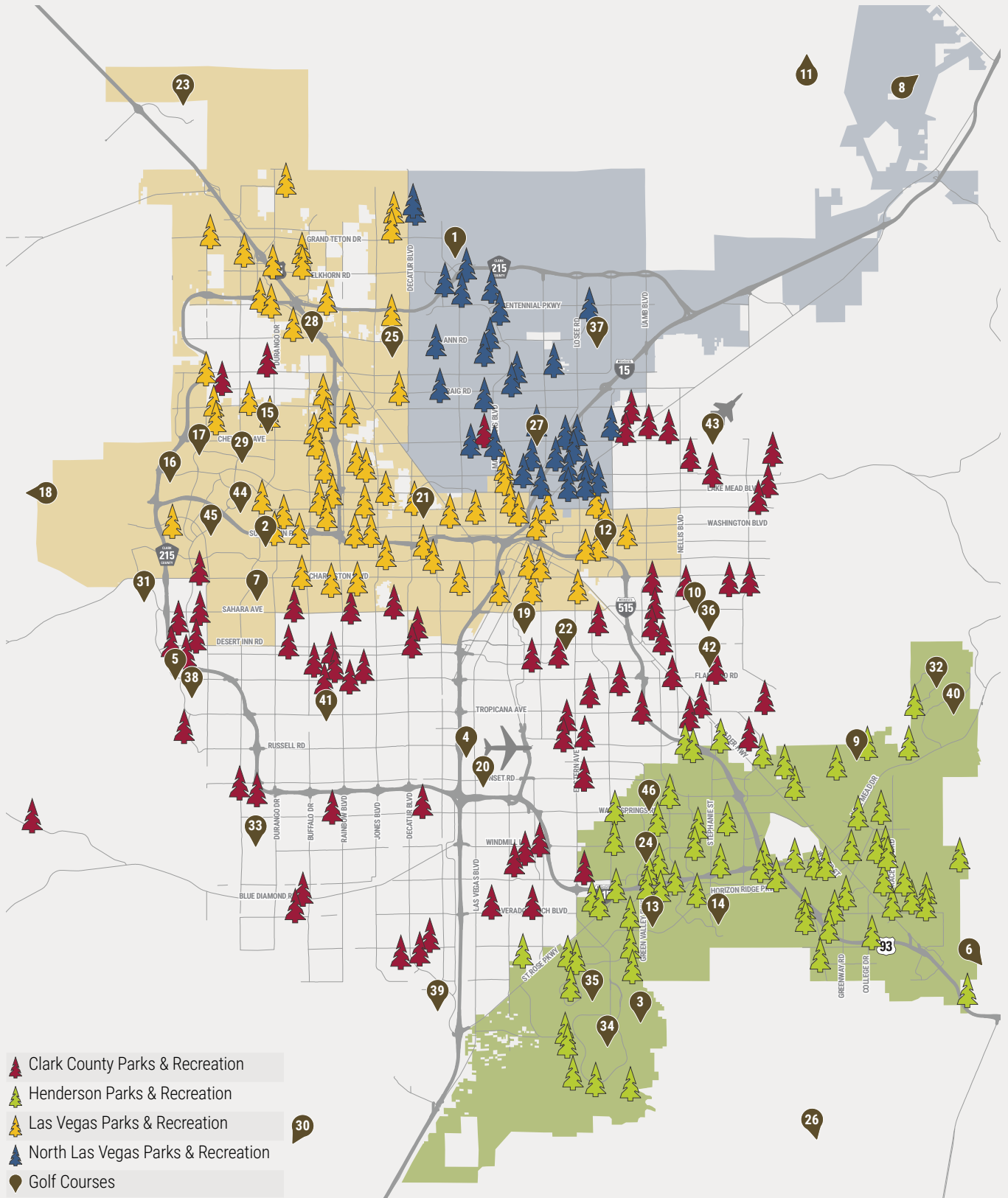


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# Las Vegas Valley Recreation Map

### Hoover Dam & Lake Mead National Recreation Area



The Bureau of Reclamation has offered tours of this National Historic Landmark since 1937. Today, Hoover Dam draws nearly one million visitors per year. Considered to be the world's largest dam and an engineering marvel at the time of its construction in the 1930s, the dam straddles the mighty Colorado River, which forms the border between the states of Nevada and Arizona. The American Society of Civil Engineers rates it as one of America's seven modern civil engineering wonders. The Hoover Dam is a curved gravity dam. Lake Mead pushes against the dam, creating compressive forces that travel along the great curved wall. The canyon walls push back, counteracting these forces. This action squeezes the concrete in the arch together, making the dam very rigid. Today, the Hoover Dam is the second highest dam in the country and the 18th highest in the world. It generates more than four billion kilowatt-hours (kWh) per year, enough to serve 1.3 million people. The visitor center is open from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. 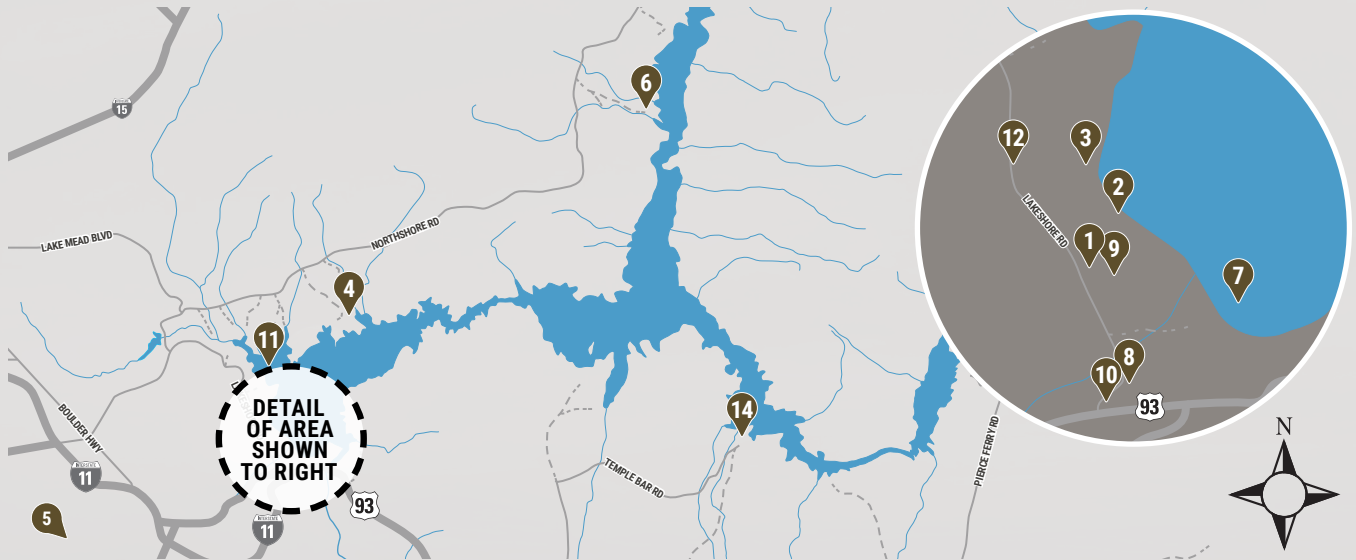
Lake Mead National Recreation Area is one of America's most diverse national recreation areas offering boating, hiking, cycling, camping and fishing. Spreading across 1.5 million acres of mountains, canyons, valleys and two vast lakes this year-round playground offers striking landscapes and brilliant blue waters. The area offers a startling contrast of desert and water, mountains and canyons, primitive backcountry and modern technology. Two powerful and uncompromising forces created this fantastic place. Nature, working slowly over millions of years, built the foundation.

The cultural resources and artifacts of Lake Mead tell a story about Native Americans, pioneers, miners, ranchers, settlers and dam builders who lived in Southern Nevada and Northern Arizona. Historic photographs captured steamships, early settlements, ranger activities, recreation and explorations. The once submerged town, St. Thomas, is also included in the artifact and photo sections of the Virtual Museum. 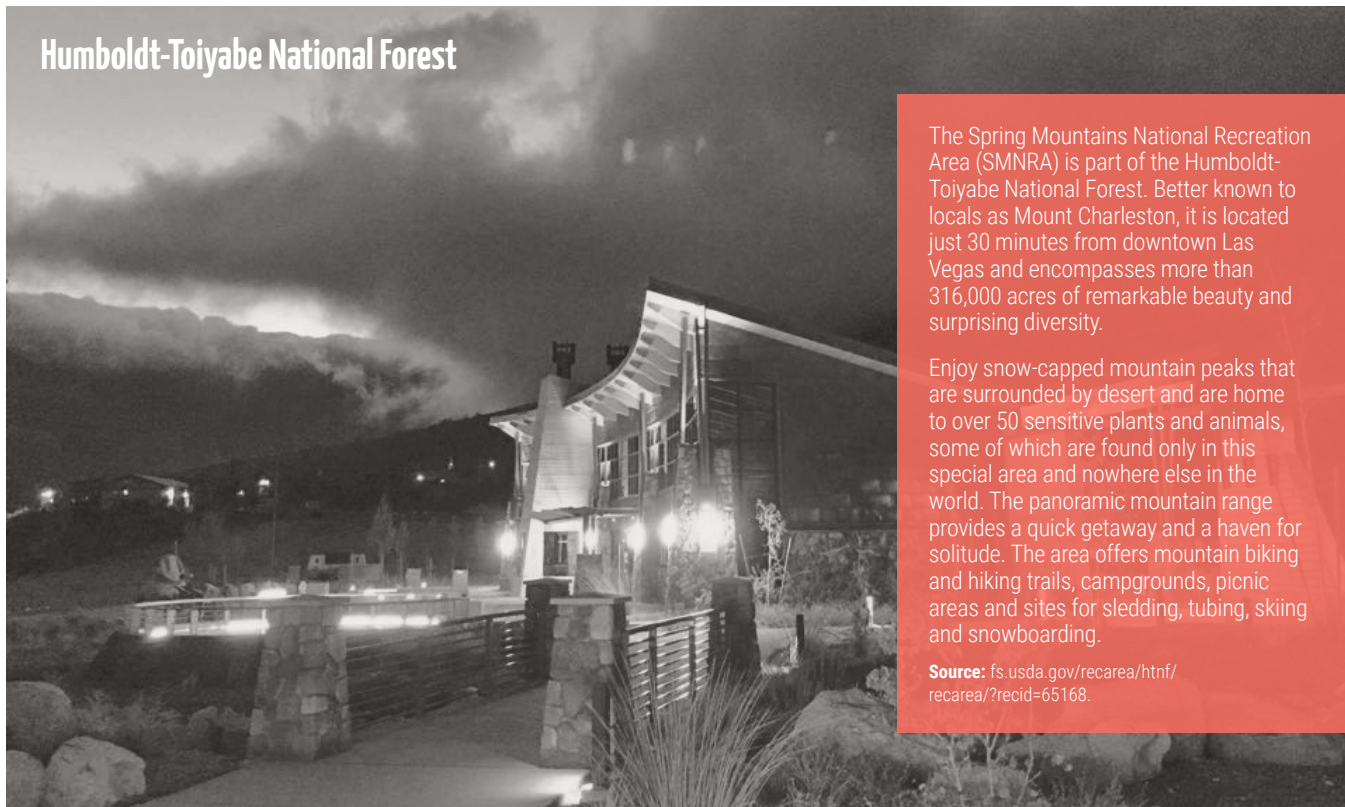

## Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest



The Spring Mountains National Recreation Area (SMNRA) is part of the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest. Better known to locals as Mount Charleston, it is located just 30 minutes from downtown Las Vegas and encompasses more than 316,000 acres of remarkable beauty and surprising diversity.

Enjoy snow-capped mountain peaks that are surrounded by desert and are home to over 50 sensitive plants and animals, some of which are found only in this special area and nowhere else in the world. The panoramic mountain range provides a quick getaway and a haven for solitude. The area offers mountain biking and hiking trails, campgrounds, picnic areas and sites for sledding, tubing, skiing and snowboarding.

## Old Las Vegas Mormon State Historic Park



More than 150 years ago, a spring-fed creek flowed through the Las Vegas Valley, creating an oasis in the desert. With the only free-flowing water and grass for miles around, the site attracted the native Paiute, as well as traders, emigrants and gold seekers traveling the Old Spanish Trail to California. The Spaniards called the place Las Vegas, which is Spanish for “the meadows”. By the 1830s, the meadows of Las Vegas had become an important stop on the Old Spanish Trail. The Las Vegas springs and creek, which flowed along the southern boundary of the modern site, proved to be a very welcome amenity for those passing through. Mormon travelers began passing through the meadows of Las Vegas almost immediately after settling Northern Utah, due to the need to procure supplies from Southern California.

Old Las Vegas Mormon Fort, the first permanent, non-native settlement in the Las Vegas Valley, features the historic remains of an adobe fort built by Mormon missionaries along a spring-fed creek in 1855. The creek provided irrigation for fields and orchards and the 150-square-foot outpost served as a way station for travelers. Today, the park is located in what is now downtown Las Vegas. In addition to the fort, which contains a multitude of historic artifacts, a visitor center contains exhibits and photos that illustrate the history of the site. The park and visitor center are open from 8:00 am - 4:30 pm, Tuesday through Saturday, year-round. For more information call (702) 486-3511.

## Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area



Red Rock Canyon was designated as Nevada's first National Conservation Area. Red Rock Canyon is located 17 miles west of the Las Vegas Strip on Charleston Boulevard/State Route 159. The area encompasses 195,819 acres and is visited by more than one million people each year. Red Rock offers enticements of a different nature including a 13-mile scenic drive, more than 30 miles of hiking trails, rock climbing, horseback riding, mountain biking, road biking, picnic areas, nature observing and visitor center with exhibit rooms and a book store.

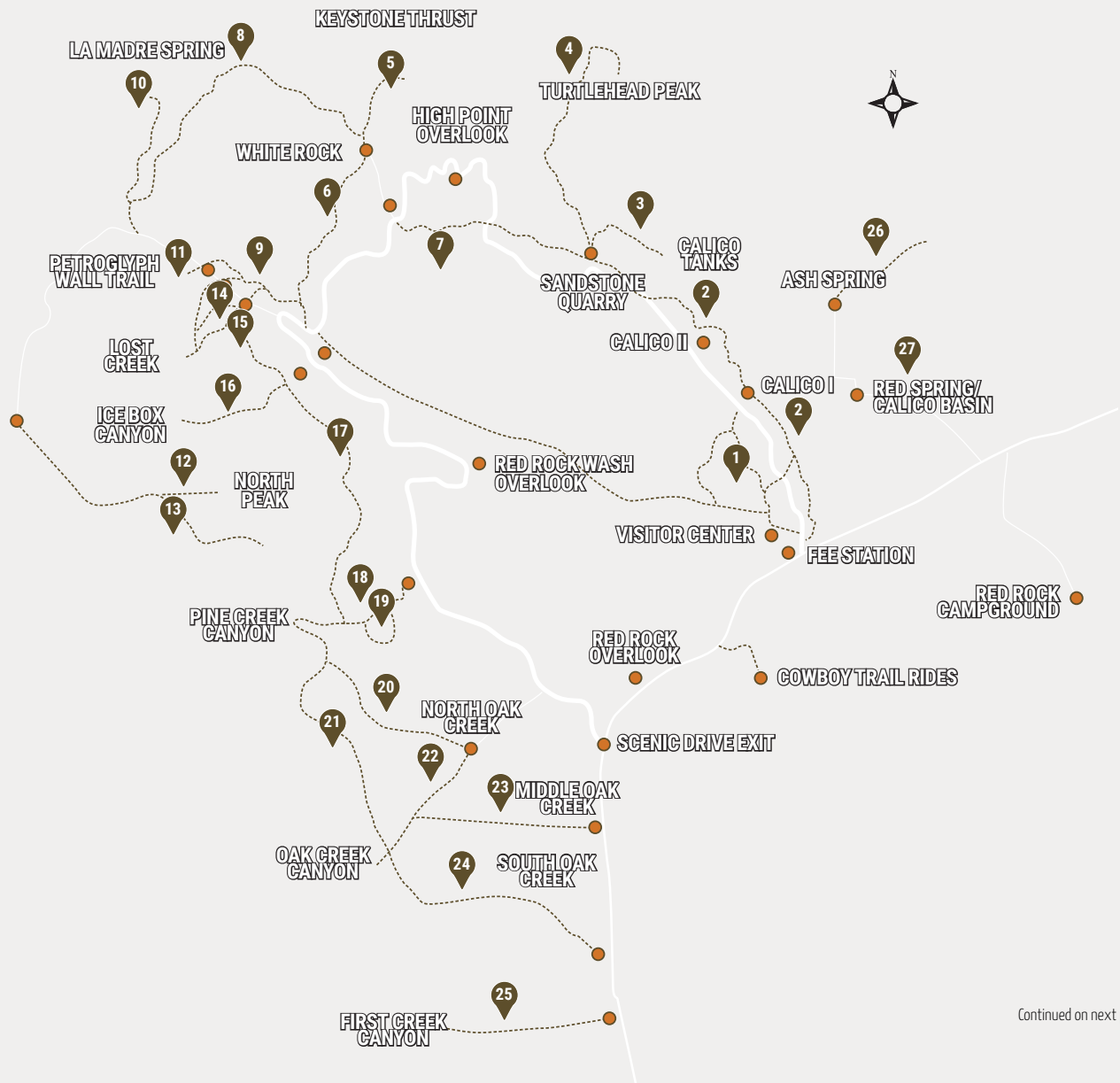
The unique geologic features, plants and animals of Red Rock represent some of the best aspects of the Mojave Desert. Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area is enjoyed by the local population as well as visitors from the United States and many foreign countries. Visitors enjoy the spectacular desert landscape, climbing and hiking opportunities and interpretive programs sponsored by the BLM.

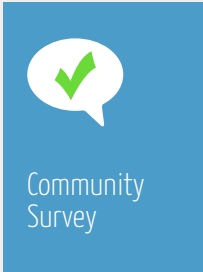

## Spring Mountain Ranch State Park

Spring Mountain Ranch State Park is located 15 miles west of Las Vegas, via Blue Diamond Rd., adjacent to the Red Rock Canyon National Conservation Area. The many springs in these mountains provided water for Paiute Indians and later attracted mountain men and early settlers to the area. This 520-acre oasis was developed into a combination working ranch and luxurious retreat by a string of owners who have given the area a long and colorful history, including German actress Vera Krupp and millionaire Howard Hughes. Visitors can explore some of the oldest buildings in Nevada, an 1860s blacksmith shop, the Sandstone Cabin that was home to the founding family and the ranch house. The park offers tree-shaded picnic sites with tables and grills, and offers various hiking trails.

The main ranch house offers visitors information about the ranch and surrounding areas, and a self-guided tour of the ranch house interior. Park volunteers are available to answer questions.

Cultural events are put on by Super Summer Theater every May through September, and living history programs bring the past back to life for a brief moment, giving visitors an opportunity to view life at the ranch as it may have once existed. These programs, which began in 1992, include costumed role playing, demonstrations and re-enactments of historic events such as the Civil War. For more information call (702) 875-4141.

## Valley of Fire

Valley of Fire is world-renowned for its 40,000 acres of bright red Aztec sandstone outcrops nestled in gray and tan limestone. As Nevada's oldest and largest state park, it contains ancient petrified trees and petroglyphs dating back more than 2,000 years. The park offers a full-scale visitor center that provides exhibits on the geology, ecology, prehistory and history of the park and nearby region. Open year round, the park has numerous campsites equipped with shaded tables, grills and water, as well as many intriguing trails. Valley of Fire State Park is six miles from Lake Mead and 55 miles northeast of Las Vegas via Interstate 15 and exit 75.

The visitor center is open daily from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. The rest of the park is open daily from sunrise to sunset with 24-hour access to campgrounds. For more information call (702) 397-2088.

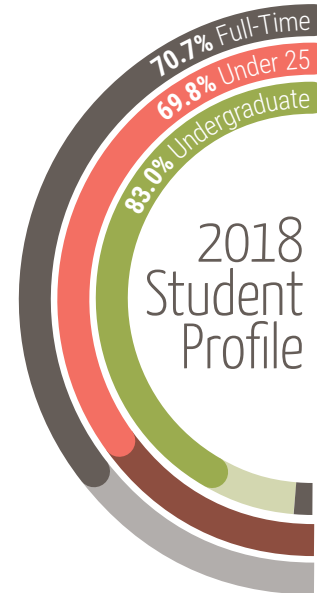

### Economic Impact Highlights

UNLV stimulates economic development and diversification through deepening and expanding connections with new and existing partners. Such collaborations create monumental impact in the Silver State, and UNLV is partnering with industry to build degree and professional development programs and to conduct research that addresses today's challenges.

As one of the largest employers in Clark County, UNLV generated \$2.51 billion in local economic activity in 2017. For every dollar invested in UNLV by the state, the university generated an additional \$12.50 in economic activity in Southern Nevada. Each dollar of student off-campus spending also generated approximately \$2.04 of economic activity in the community.

By 2025, UNLV is estimated to bring increased spending to Nevada, generating \$3.33 billion in local economic activity and supporting more

than 19,000 direct and indirect jobs. This includes an economic impact of \$468 million, with direct spending of \$165 million generated by the UNLV School of Medicine alone.

Additional economic value exists in the education provided to students, in the enduring effects of research and development, in advanced science and technology, and in a highly-trained and globally-competitive workforce, all of which help attract new industries that further diversify Nevada's economy. 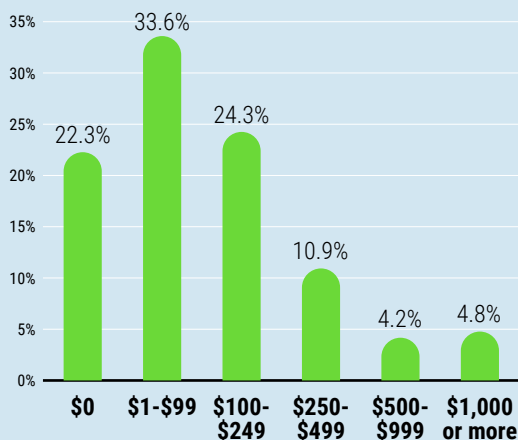

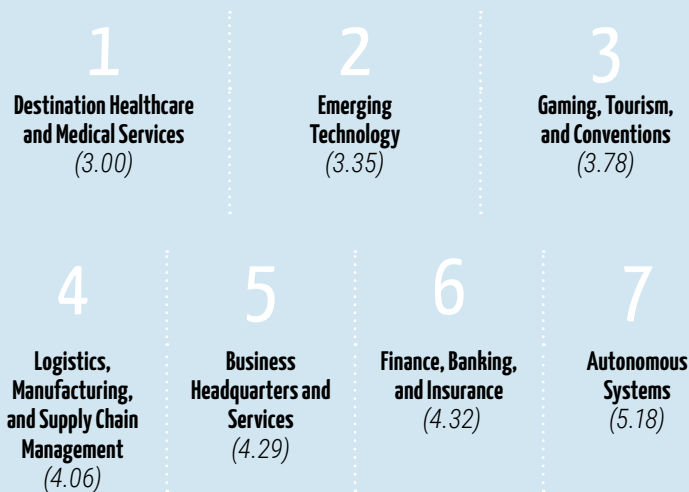
### Advancing Your Community’s Public Schools

## Desert Research Institute

The Desert Research Institute (DRI) is a recognized world leader in basic and applied interdisciplinary research. Committed to scientific excellence and integrity, DRI faculty, students, and staff have developed scientific knowledge and innovative technologies in research projects around the globe. Since 1959, DRI's research has advanced scientific knowledge, supported Nevada's diversifying economy, provided science-based educational opportunities, and informed policy makers, business leaders and community members. With campuses in Reno and Las Vegas, DRI is one of eight institutions in the Nevada System of Higher Education.

### Recent Research & News Highlights

- › In 2018, DRI partnered with the SANS Institute, a world-renowned internet security research and education organization, to launch an all-new cybersecurity internship program at DRI. Over the course of the Fall 2018 semester, sixteen interns completed 120 hours of hands-on training with DRI's Chief Information Security Officer and obtained marketable job skills related to cybersecurity: treating malware infections, defending against real-time denial of service attacks and providing security awareness training to end-users.
- › Because of the proven success and expertise of DRI's Science Alive K-12 Outreach Program in engaging students in STEM and training Nevada educators, the program was selected last year as one of several recipients of the first round of funding through Tesla's Nevada K-12 Education Investment Fund. With this funding, the Science Alive program is helping to develop and implement a statewide professional development infrastructure for educators that will give Nevada students the chance to get excited about STEM early on in their education and give them the skills needed to success in a STEM career.
- › In a first-of-its kind study of comparing the microbiology of Devils Hole with that of a constructed scale replica at the Ash Meadows Fish Conservation Facility, a team of DRI scientists discovered key differences in nutrient levels and species composition that may be impacting the ability of the highly endangered Devils Hole Pupfish to survive in captivity in the spring of 2018. Devils Hole Pupfish (population just 115 individuals in autumn 2017) are native only to Devils Hole, an isolated water-filled cavern of unknown depth located in a detached unit of Death Valley National Park within the Ash Meadows National Wildlife Refuge in Amargosa Valley, Nevada.
- › In 2018, researchers in DRI's ultra-trace ice core laboratory published remarkable new findings, tracing the rise and fall of ancient civilizations through lead deposits in Greenland ice cores. The team of scientists, archaeologists, and economists from DRI, the University of Oxford, NILU – Norwegian Institute for Air Research, and the University of Copenhagen used ice samples from the North Greenland Ice Core Project (NGRIP) to measure, date, and analyze European lead emissions that were captured in Greenland ice between 1100 BC and AD 800. Their findings captured the attention of media outlets around the world, including *The New York Times*, *The Atlantic* and *The Economist*. The team's research was listed as one 2018's top science stories in *Discover* magazine.

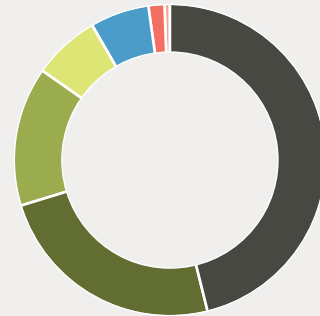

### Achievements

- Clark County School District announced a record high graduation rate of 85.22 percent for the Class of 2018. During the past eight years, the graduation rate has increased from 59.34 percent in 2011 to 85.22 percent in 2018. The increase in the graduation rate is also reflected in the number of graduates, as the Class of 2018 was CCSD's largest ever, with 21,102 graduates. Twelve CCSD schools posted 100 percent graduation rates in 2017.
- More than 24,600 Advanced Placement (AP) exams were administered to 14,064 students during the 2017-18 school year. The pass rate was 49.5 percent, which is an increase of 2.3 percent from the 2016-17 school year. Districtwide, there were 12,200 AP exams in CCSD that earned a qualifying score of 3, 4 or 5 for college credit.
- The release of state and nationwide results of the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) test, otherwise known as "the nation's report card," shows that students in the Clark County School District are performing at a comparable level or even

better than many of their counterparts in the nation's large urban school districts. The results showed that CCSD's performance is comparable to or exceeds 61.5% of large city school districts in fourth-grade math; 73.1% of large city school districts in eighth-grade math; 69.2% of large city school districts in fourth-grade reading; and 80.8% of large city school districts in eighth-grade reading.

- CCSD has one of the top Magnet programs in the country, and several nationally ranked schools. In 2019, 27 schools were recognized with Magnet Schools of America Merit Awards.
- CCSD has the largest fine arts program in the country, and is recognized for some of the finest programs in the nation. Las Vegas Academy of the Arts has 15 Grammys, more than any other school in the nation. The CCSD Music Education Program has been honored with the Best Communities for Music Education designation from the National Association of Music Merchants for 20 consecutive years.

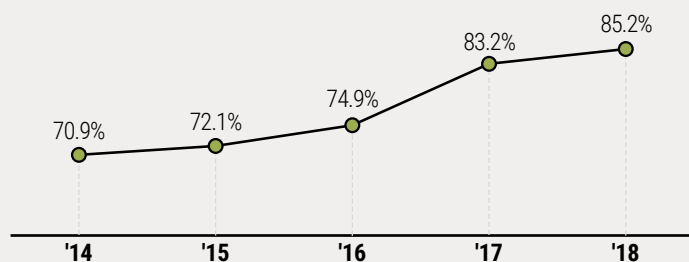

## Nevada School Choice Coalition

The Nevada School Choice Coalition, a project of the American Federation for Children (AFC), has been working in Nevada since the Nevada Legislature passed the Education Savings Account and the Opportunity Scholarship programs in 2015. Since 2009, AFC and its affiliates have operated in states across the country to advance educational choice. Today there are 54 private school choice programs in 26 states and Washington, D.C., which serve approximately 550,000 children.

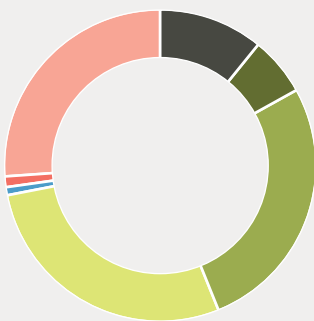
As a tax credit program, the Opportunity Scholarship is privately funded by corporations, which receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit against their Modified Business Tax liability, enabling corporations to direct their tax liability toward K-12 education. To be eligible for a scholarship of up to \$8,132 for K-12 private school tuition and fees for the 2018-19 school year, household income must not exceed 300% of poverty level. Through the Opportunity Scholarship program, eligible Nevada families had access to \$26 million dollars in funding to go towards the education of their choice last year. The program is capped at \$6.6 million for this school year; the Coalition is currently fighting to make funding permanent for this program so that families can continue utilizing their scholarships.

As illustrated in the graphs below, the enrollment growth of students has increased substantially since the program's inception with 2,306 scholarships awarded this year, and over 1,300 students on a waiting list. More than 70% of Scholarship Recipients are minority or mixed race; 28% percent of the students reporting themselves as Latino and 26% as mixed race. The average household income of students participating in the program is \$45,694 for a family of four. Clearly, Nevada's economically-needy families want access to educational options and are the ones benefiting from this program!

### Recent Highlights

- As of November 2018, there have been 2,306 scholarships awarded for the 2018-19 school year.
- During the 2017 legislative session, the Opportunity Scholarship program was awarded a one-time increase of \$20 million. As a result, the total cap increased to \$26 million for the 2017-18 fiscal year and re-adjusted to \$6.6 million in 2018-19 with annual 10% increases.

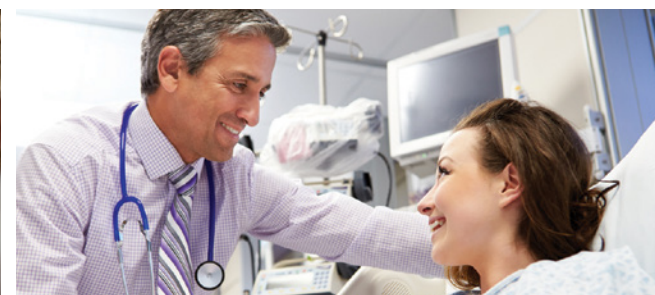



## Centennial Hills Hospital



Centennial Hills Hospital provides a wide range of medical services and procedures. For more than ten years, the hospital has been delivering babies, saving lives and taking care of the hearts of the Northwest and North Las Vegas communities. Centennial Hills Hospital also cares for a wide range of medical situations that arise from accidents at Mount Charleston National Recreation Area, to procedures for spines and joints.

To accommodate the growing community, the hospital recently announced plans for a master plan project that will begin with the build-out of a new, five-story patient tower expansion in 2019. Phase one, valued at an estimated \$95 million, will add 56 patient beds, increasing the total bed count to 318. This addition will provide increased capacity in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, Intensive Care Unit, Intermediate Unit and Medical Surgical Units across the hospital. The project will also expand key departments, including inpatient pharmacy, surgical services and the post-anesthesia care unit.

News of the five-story tower expansion comes less than two years after Centennial Hills Hospital completed the final two floors of its eight-story tower, adding 60 private patient rooms and over 200 additional parking spaces. Since 2017, Centennial Hills Hospital

has also added biplane angiography capabilities to treat stroke and other neurosurgical diseases, an advanced Wound Care and Hyperbaric Center and another 12 mother-baby rooms to meet increased demand for maternity services.

The emergency department often serves as its front door, with more than 55,000 patients seen on an annual basis. Major emergencies, such as strokes and heart attacks, as well as minor emergencies are treated at the facility.

Centennial Hills Hospital features a comprehensive women's center offering care for women at every stage of life. The program also supports alternative delivery models including midwifery. Overall deliveries in the past few years exceeded 3,200. Infants who require advanced medical care spend time in the hospital's Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), and "NICU graduates" are celebrated with an annual reunion at the hospital. Digital mammography and advanced diagnostic testing are also available.

For those who need surgery, a daVinci® Robotic Surgical System can be used for abdominal, gynecological and urological cases. Centennial Hills Hospital also performs over 2,100 orthopedic surgeries per year. This service line is supported by a nurse navigator on the orthopedic nursing unit and the Mako Robotic-Arm Assisted Surgery System, which uses customized technology for total hip replacement, total knee replacement and partial knee resurfacing, and is the only system of its kind in Southern Nevada.

And, for people who may require therapy after surgery, Centennial Hills Hospital offers an outpatient therapy center to assist with the recovery and rehabilitation.

## Valley Hospital

Since 1971, the health care professionals of Valley Hospital have prided themselves on providing excellent care to their patients. Located in the heart of the Las Vegas Medical District (LVMD) near the government centers and The Smith Center for Performing Arts, it is the founding hospital of The Valley Health System.

In 2019, Valley Hospital begins its 13th year of providing graduate medical education. As an advanced teaching hospital, Valley Hospital has more than 80 physician residents and fellows working directly with patients. An American Osteopathic Association (AOA) approved graduate medical education program to train and teach future physicians. Under the direction of experienced faculty members, these physicians provide intensified patient care using evidence-based medicine and following clinical pathways that research has shown to be effective with most patients. In 2017, the hospital began its new Pharmacy Residency program. Throughout the year, pharmacy residents will enhance their competency in managing medication-use systems and learn how to support medication therapy outcomes for patients. Besides developing highly qualified pharmacists in Southern Nevada, the residency program helps to bring in talent from other parts of the country to work here.

As a tertiary care facility, Valley Hospital provides advanced cardiovascular, interventional neurological and neurosurgical services. Physicians began performing open heart surgery in the late 1970s. The hospital's continued emphasis on cardiovascular care continues with interventional cardiac procedures including balloon angioplasty, vascular procedures and heart pumps to improve patients' outcomes. Valley Hospital is committed to staying at the forefront of technology. It recently completed Phase 1 of the Cardiology/Cath Lab modernization project. Two Cath Labs now offer advanced technology for both EP and interventional cardiology procedures. Phase II later in the year will include modernizing the patient waiting and check-in areas, and adding a physician and family consultation room.

Meanwhile, neurosurgeons perform complex endovascular and spine surgeries, while interventional radiologists carry out intricate neurological procedures in the biplane angiography lab. Patients who are recovering from a stroke, other major injury or surgery can transfer to the acute rehabilitation unit on the fourth floor for more intensive therapy to aid in their recovery.

A wide range of surgical procedures are also performed at the hospital, with patients benefitting from daVinci® Xi Robotic Surgery Technology used especially for abdominal, colorectal, gynecological and urological surgery. Those requiring inpatient care, are directed to one of several nursing units tailored to their particular post-surgical needs.

As part of the continuum of care, patients and community members can utilize the Advanced Wound Care & Hyperbaric Center for chronic and hard-to-heal wounds. In 2019, the center earned a Center of Distinction designation by Healogics.

## VA Southern Nevada Healthcare System



VA Southern Nevada Healthcare System (VASNHS) provides outpatient and inpatient medical services to veterans residing in Southern Nevada, within an official catchment area of Clark, Lincoln, and Nye Counties. VASNHS also draws veterans from Arizona, Utah and California.

Primary and Specialty Care services are disbursed among several clinical sites within the Las Vegas Valley, including the Northwest Primary Care Clinic (PCC), Northeast PCC, Southwest PCC and Southeast PCC. A Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) in Pahrump, Nevada, provides rural health care to veterans residing in Nye County, and the MCPO Jesse Dean Rural Outreach Clinic in Laughlin, Nevada serves veterans in Southern Clark County.

The healthcare system opened a comprehensive medical center in 2012, that provides specialty and inpatient services. Inpatient services include 102 Medical, Surgical, Psychiatric, ICU, Step-Down and Rehabilitation beds. An Emergency Department is located at the medical center. The Southern Nevada Fisher House opened on the main medical center campus in 2016, and provides temporary lodging to families of veterans or active-duty service members undergoing inpatient or extensive outpatient treatment in the Las Vegas Valley.

VASNHS maintains a joint venture with the Department of Defense's 99th Medical Group at the Mike O'Callaghan Military Medical Center (MOMMC). VASNHS also maintains a Community Resource and Referral Center (CRRC) for homeless and at-risk veterans and a Veterans Recovery Center (VRC).

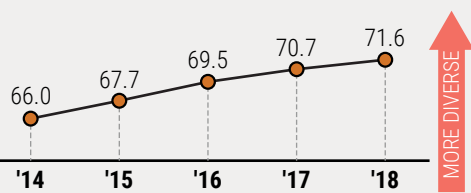

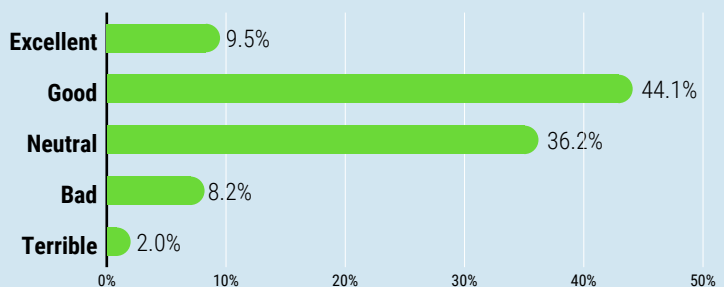

## Target Industries

The Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance focuses on targeting industries that provide the most growth potential and help diversify the economy of Southern Nevada. Economic diversification enhances regional competitiveness in the global economy, while also helping attract and retain a talent pool that will further develop the region.

### Logistics, Manufacturing and Supply Chain Management

The Southern Nevada landscape for manufacturing is marked by the strong tandem of the region's strategic geographic location and existing assets, including opportunities associated with leveraging development-ready land, industrial capabilities, regional connectivity and the state's business-friendly tax climate.

## Business Assistance Programs

### Business Assistance Programs

In partnership with the Governor's Office of Economic Development and the local jurisdictions within Clark County, the Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance offers a variety of incentives to help qualifying companies locate and expand in the region. Programs include the following:

#### Sales and Use Tax Abatement

On qualified capital equipment purchases, with reductions in the rate to as low as 2 percent for a 2-year period.

#### Modified Business Tax Abatement

50 percent of the 1.475 percent rate on quarterly wages exceeding \$50,000 for a 4-year period.

#### Personal Property Tax Abatement

Up to 50 percent over a maximum of 10 years.

#### Real Property Tax Abatement for Recycling

Up to 50 percent abatement for up to 10 years on real for qualified recycling businesses.

#### Aviation Parts Abatement

Up to 50 percent on personal property tax and a reduction of sales and use tax to a rate of 2 percent for a 20-year period.

#### Data Center Abatement

Up to 75 percent on personal property tax and a reduction of sales and use tax to a rate of 2 percent for a 10 or 20-year period.

#### Silver State Works Employee Hiring Incentive

Provides employers up to \$2,000 for hiring state-qualified employee candidates.

Nevada is one of 30 states that offer companies the option to incorporate as benefit corporations. Benefit corporation status allows a firm to protect its social impact through capital raises and leadership changes, creates more flexibility when evaluating potential sale and liquidity options, and prepares businesses to lead a mission-driven life post-IPO.

Certified B Corps are companies that have achieved a minimum verified score on the B Impact Assessment, a certification standard developed and maintained by the nonprofit B-Lab. Certified B Corps are evaluated on their impact on the environment, their workers, their customers, and their communities; they also all meet the highest standards of accountability and transparency.

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Nevada Taxes

## Nevada Taxes

### Nevada Tax Climate

Offering one of the lowest tax burdens in the nation, Nevada is consistently cited by the likes of Forbes, Inc and Money magazines as having one of the best overall business climates in the nation. Nevada's tax structure is designed to be less burdensome to both business and its employees. The Tax Foundation rated Nevada as the No. 5 best state for business in 2018.

### Alcoholic Beverages

Excise tax on importation, processing, storing or selling of all liquor (including beer). Malt beverages are taxed at 16 cents per gallon and liquor is taxed from 70 cents to \$3.60 per gallon depending on the alcohol content. Sales tax is collected on the retail

price. Annual state license fees range from \$75 to \$500 according to the type of business.

### Business License

A state license fee is paid annually. The fee is \$500 for domestic and foreign for-profit corporations. The fee is \$200 for all other businesses. Counties and cities can also impose a business license fee on businesses in their jurisdiction. The fee is generally based on the type of business (i.e., retail, professional, hotel, etc.)

### Business Registration Fees

Fees for filing articles of incorporation or agreements of consolidation providing for shares apply in Nevada. The rate is based on the value of the shares with a minimum fee of \$75 and a maximum fee of \$35,000 (example: if the total value of shares is \$75,000 or less the fee is \$75; \$200,000 or less the fee is \$175; over \$1 million is \$375 plus \$275 for each additional \$500,000 or fraction thereof, not to exceed \$35,000). Except in the case of shares valued at \$75,000 or less, fees for the Annual Filing are the same as for filing the articles of incorporation; however, the maximum fee is \$11,125. Non-par value stock is assigned a value of \$1 per share for the purpose of computing the fee. Fees are the same for domestic and foreign corporations. Fees are also imposed upon Limited-Liability Companies, Limited Partnerships, Limited-Liability Partnerships and Business Trusts. Contact the Nevada Secretary of State office for additional information.

### Car Rental

The state fee is imposed at 10 percent on the short-term rental of a passenger car. Both Clark and Washoe counties levy an additional 2 percent for authorized projects. Ten percent is remitted to the state general fund. Additional airport fees apply.

### Cigarette/Tobacco Products

The excise tax on cigarettes is 9 cents per cigarette, which equates to \$1.80 cents per package of 20. Other tobacco products are taxed at 30 percent of the wholesaler's cost. Sales tax is also collected on the retail price.

### Commerce Tax

As of July 1, 2015, the commerce tax is imposed on business entities doing business in Nevada. It is based on the Nevada gross revenue received by a business in a taxable year (July 1 through June 30). The rates of the commerce tax range from 0.0331 percent to 0.051 percent. The first \$4 million is subtracted from Nevada gross revenue. A 50 percent credit for the commerce tax paid is allowed against the modified business tax.

### Gaming

There are five principal types of gaming taxes. Gross gaming revenue tax, table tax and slot taxes are levied by the state. In addition, gaming fees are levied by the county and local governments.

**Lodging**

A statewide tax of 1 percent of gross receipts is imposed on the rental of hotel and motel rooms. This is in addition to any locally imposed room taxes which range from 7 to 13 percent. In Clark County, the total combined rate ranges from 11 to 13.88 percent. An additional 1%, apportioned to the LVCVA Expansion (1/2%) and the Stadium Construction Fund (1/2%) are effective March 1, 2017.

**Live Entertainment Tax**

Imposed at locations where live entertainment is provided for which there is an admission, cover or table charge. The rate is 9 percent. For non-gaming establishments there is no tax imposed if the maximum occupancy is less than 200.

**Modified Business Tax**

The tax is based on gross payroll paid in the calendar quarter and is imposed on businesses in Nevada that are required to make unemployment insurance contributions to the Nevada Department of Employment Security. General Business employers pay a tax rate of 1.475 percent on gross wages reported over \$50,000 in a quarter. Financial institutions and mining companies pay a rate of 2 percent. The employer can deduct any costs for providing a qualified employer-paid health care plan. A 50 percent credit for the commerce tax paid is allowed against the modified business tax.

**Motor Vehicle Fuel**

Gasoline and gasohol are taxed at 23 cents per gallon. Additional county taxes range from 5 cents to 10 cents per gallon. Diesel, kerosene, biodiesel and biodiesel blends are 27 cents per gallon; liquid petroleum and butane are 22 cents per gallon; compressed natural gas is 21 cents per gallon and water-phased fuel is 19 cents per gallon. Clark and Washoe counties index the tax for inflation based on the Producer Price Index.

**Motor Vehicles**

Fees are annual and must be paid, at the time of registration, on all vehicles operated on any highway. For mopeds, the fee is paid one-time per owner.

**Governmental Service Tax**

This tax is in lieu of personal property tax. The valuation of the vehicle is determined at 35 percent of the manufacturer's suggested retail price, without accessories. Vehicle value is depreciated to 95 percent after the first year and graduated down to 15 percent after nine years. Buses, trucks and truck trailers depreciate down to 85 percent after the first year and down to 23 percent after 10 years. The rate imposed by the state is 4 cents on each \$1 valuation. Counties may levy up to one cent on each dollar of valuation, but the total tax imposed cannot exceed 5 cents on each dollar of valuation.

**Registration**

Passenger cars, motorcycles, travel trailers, low speed and electric vehicles and trucks with a gross vehicle weight less than 6,000 pounds pay

\$33 per year. Rates on trucks vary from a low of \$38 for a truck with a gross weight of 6,000 pounds to a maximum of \$1,360 for a truck with a gross weight of 80,000 pounds. Moped registration is a one-time fee of \$33 per owner.

**Property**

State statutes limit the property tax rate to a total of \$3.64 per \$100 of assessed valuation. Assessment is at 35 percent of taxable value. The tax is applied to the assessed value. Property tax rates may vary within the city and county, due to special districts or general improvement districts such as fire control districts, library districts and television districts. The tax bill is generally capped at a maximum increase of 3 percent over the prior year for an owner-occupied residence or a rental property with rent charged below the HUD Fair Market Rents, and a maximum increase of 8 percent for all other real and personal property. Secondary tax cap formulas also apply.

**Real Property**

Includes land, buildings and improvements not normally removable. The value for land is full cash value. The value for improvements is replacement costs less depreciation at 1.5 percent per year up to 50 years. The combination of these values is known as taxable value.

**Personal Property**

Includes property not permanently affixed to land, such as business equipment and mobile/manufactured homes not converted to real property. Assessment is 35 percent of original cost less depreciation.

**Industrial Insurance**

Industrial insurance is obtained through private insurance carriers, self-insurance or group self-insurance. For more information about self-insurance or group self-insurance contact the Nevada Division of Insurance.

**Insurance Premium**

Insurers pay 3.5 percent of the total direct premiums written for the preceding calendar year covering property and other risks in the state. The tax is passed onto the consumer in the cost of the premium. Risk retention groups registered in Nevada, but chartered in another state pay a rate of 2 percent. The tax is due on actual premiums received in the quarter with payment due 30 days following the end of the quarter.

**Sales and Use**

Sales tax is charged at the retail level on the sale of tangible personal property unless exempt by statute. A companion "use" tax is charged on property purchased outside of Nevada and brought into the state for use. The authorized maximum combined State rate is 6.85 percent. Counties are allowed various options to pay for items such as transportation, roads, flood control and water. In Clark County, the total combined rate is 8.25 percent effective April 1, 2017.

**Unemployment Insurance**

Paid by employers of one or more persons with total wages paid of \$225 or more during a calendar

quarter. For the first 14 quarters as an employer in Nevada, the total rate is 3 percent. Thereafter, it may vary from 0.3 percent to 5.4 percent depending on the number of employees and the firm's unemployment record. The maximum wage base upon which the rate is applied changes annually. For 2016, the maximum wage base is \$28,200.

**Universal Energy Charge**

The tax is assessed on each therm of natural gas or kilowatt hour of electricity consumed in Nevada. The rate is 3.30 mills per therm of natural gas and .39 mills per kilowatt-hour of electricity. If tax collected exceeds \$25,000 in any calendar quarter, a refund for the amount over \$25,000 may be requested. The tax is distributed to the Welfare Division and is further distributed 25 percent to the Nevada Housing Division for weatherization. The Welfare Division uses the remaining 75 percent for energy assistance to low-income households. The tax is remitted within 30 days after the end of each calendar quarter. As a pass-through, the tax is itemized on each customer's billing statement as a separate line item.

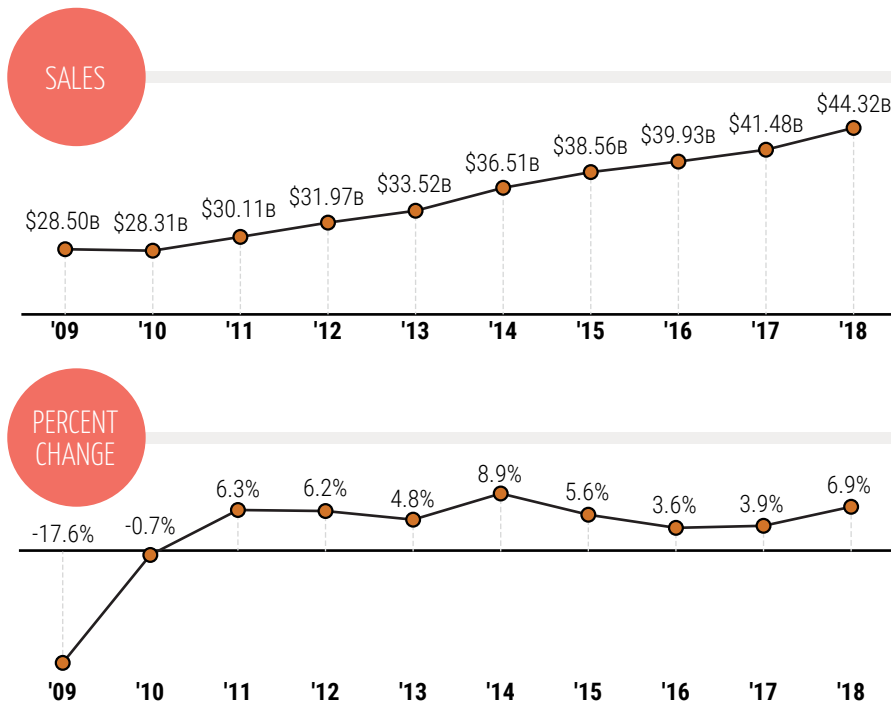

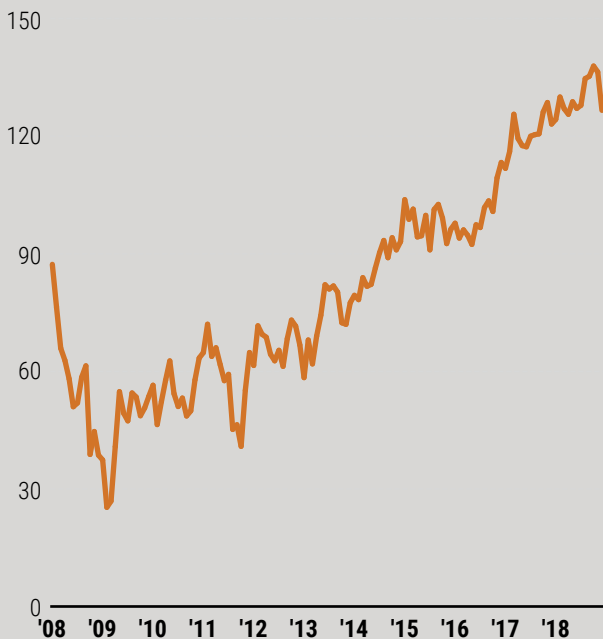

## Distance From Las Vegas



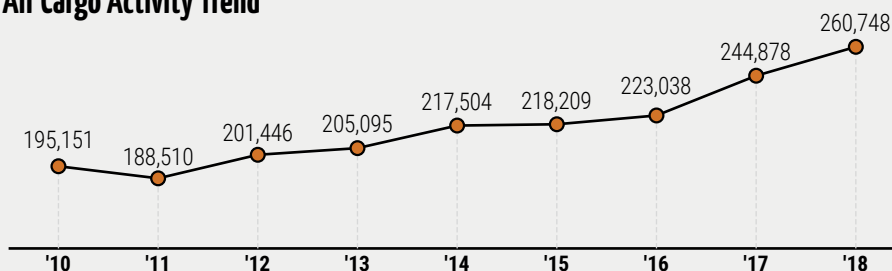

## McCarran International Airport

McCarran International Airport is Southern Nevada’s gateway to the world. With more than 30 airlines providing nonstop flights to more than 150 destinations last year, it was the ninth-busiest airport in North America, and among the Top 30 busiest airports in the world.

In 2018, McCarran hosted more than 49.7 million passengers, 3.8 million of whom were from international destinations. McCarran International Airport is owned and operated by the government of Clark County, Nevada, which is overseen by the Clark County Board of Commissioners. Unlike other departments within the County government, the Department of Aviation is a self-sufficient enterprise and operates without County General Fund tax revenue. Airport revenue is derived from aviation and non-aviation sources, as well as Passenger Facility Charges and Airport Improvement Program grants.

For decades, the skyrocketing popularity of Las Vegas challenged the airport’s infrastructure. Over time, more and more aircraft, cars, and travelers have jockeyed for space within an airport whose initial developers never envisioned a time when 40+ million passengers would become the annual norm. Airport expansions were delivered in the 1980s, 1990s, 2000s, and most recently in 2012, with the opening of Terminal 3.

In recent years, international visitation has become an increasingly important priority for McCarran Airport. The opening of Terminal 3 in 2012 allowed McCarran to experience double-digit growth in international arrivals. Today, McCarran offers nonstop flights to more than 30 international destinations. McCarran’s largest international carriers include: Westjet (Canada), Air Canada, British Airways, Virgin Atlantic, and AeroMexico.

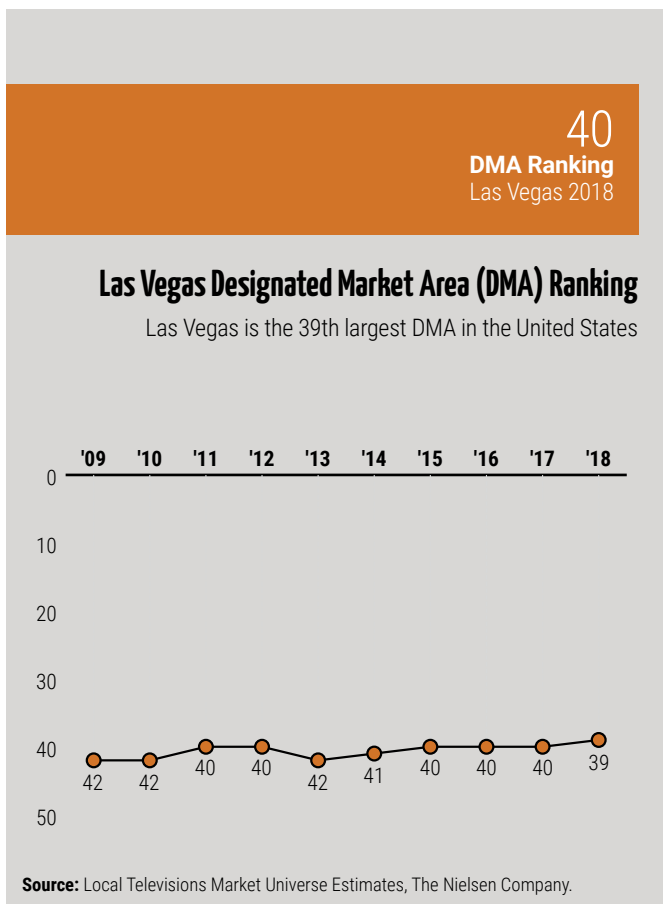

## Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA)

The Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA) is a not-for-profit, regional water agency established in 1991 to address Southern Nevada's unique water needs on a regional basis. The SNWA is responsible for treating and delivering high-quality water, operating and managing regional water facilities, and implementing comprehensive water conservation programs. The wholesale water agency also maintains a 50-year water resource plan to ensure a secure water supply for Southern Nevada over the next half-century.

Sustainably using its water resources, Southern Nevada also employs community-wide water reuse, reclaiming and returning nearly all water used indoors back to Lake Mead where it can be used again. Indoor water use accounts for about 40 percent of the community's total water usage, while water used outdoors, primarily for landscape irrigation, accounts for about 60 percent.

Enhancing its flagship water conservation initiative, SNWA last year boosted the incentive in its popular Water Smart Landscapes Rebate program (WSL) to \$3 per square-foot of grass converted to water-efficient landscaping. The program saves 55 gallons for every square foot of grass converted. Since 1999, local residents and businesses have converted more than 188 million square feet of grass to water-efficient landscapes, saving the community a cumulative 129 billions of gallons of water.

Moving forward, the SNWA is working with local municipal agencies to prohibit decorative turf installation, such as grass at neighborhood entrances and traffic medians. By eliminating such "useless" grass—which often is never used except by a lawn mower—the community could save an additional 12 billion gallons of water.

With an eye toward promoting more efficient use of water in the commercial and multi-family home sectors, the SNWA last year also boosted provisions of its Water Efficient Technologies (WET) Program. Businesses that incorporate water-saving appliances, fixtures, and other efficiency devices into their operations can receive a financial incentive to help offset costs for making their investment. WET participants recognize that being water-smart is good for their business, and since 2001, local businesses have saved more than 14 billion gallons of water through the WET program.

Regionally, the SNWA last year signed on to the Lower Colorado River Basin Drought Contingency Plan (DCP). Under the terms of this landmark agreement, the Lower Basin states of Nevada, Arizona, and California would make a series of voluntary reductions from their Colorado River withdrawal allotments to help protect water levels in Lake Mead, the source of 90 percent of Southern Nevada's water supply. Terms of the DCP would allow the states to recover some of their voluntary withdrawal reductions in the event Lake Mead's elevation rises.

Even under ongoing drought conditions, Southern Nevada has sufficient resources to meet the community's water needs well into the future. Continued conservation efforts by residents and businesses remains a critical component to managing current and future water resources.

SNWA member agencies include the Big Bend Water District in Laughlin; the cities of Las Vegas, Henderson, North Las Vegas, and Boulder City; the Clark County Water Reclamation District; and the Las Vegas Valley Water District. Together, these seven agencies provide water and wastewater services to Southern Nevada's two million residents and more than 40 million annual visitors.

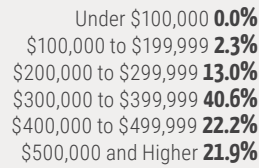

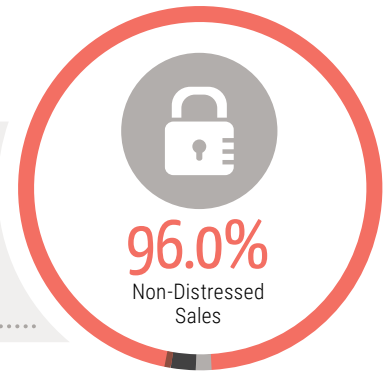

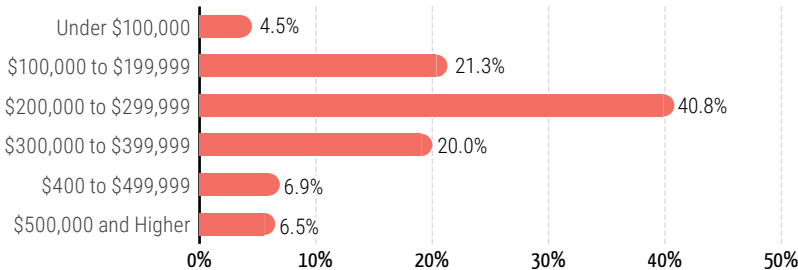

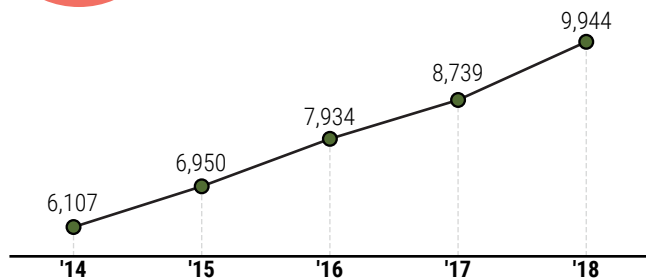

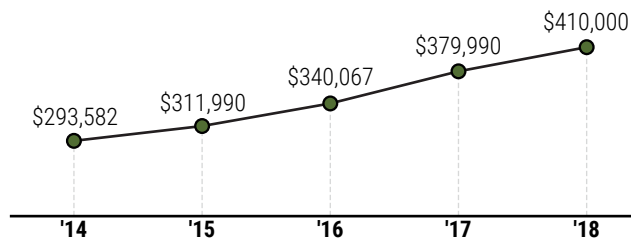

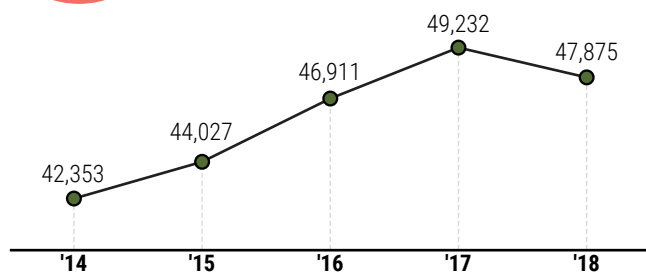

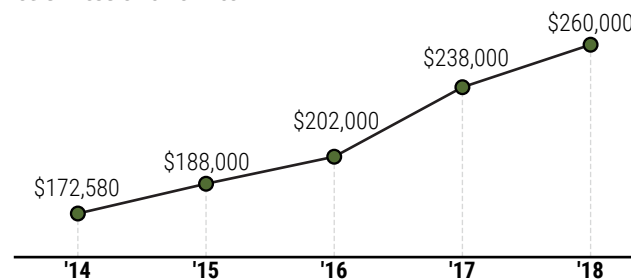

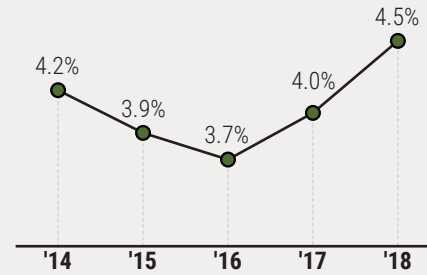

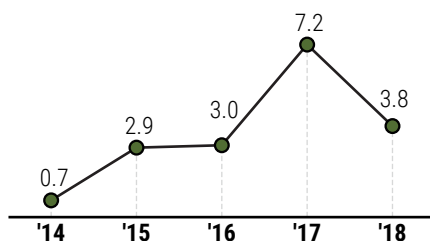

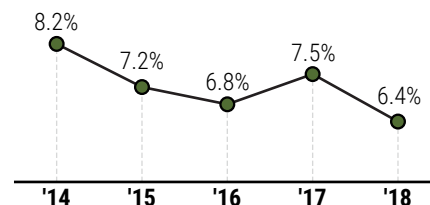
**Las Vegas Industrial Market Net Absorption**

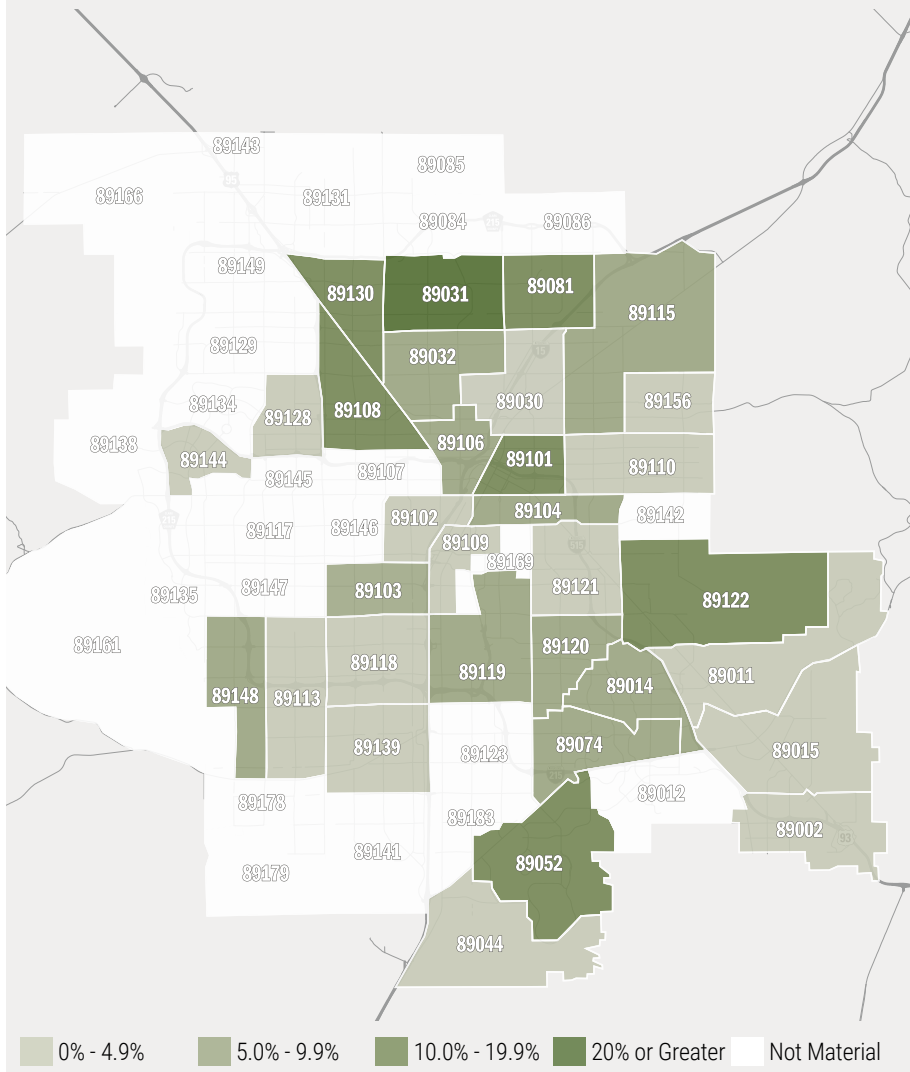

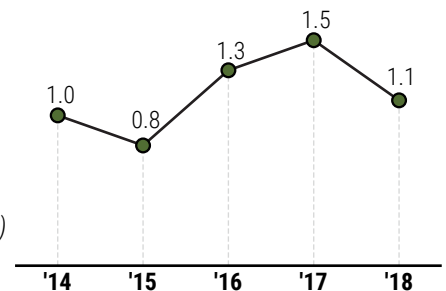

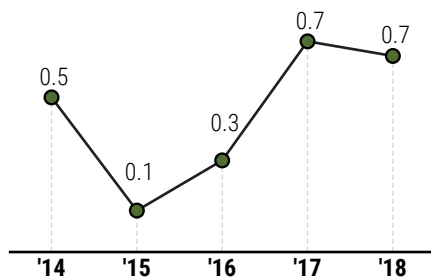
**Las Vegas Office Market Inventory**

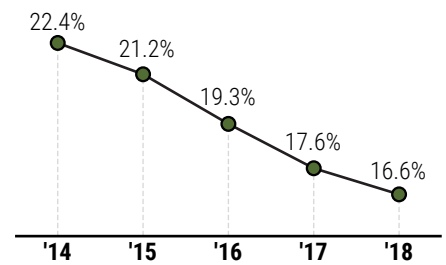

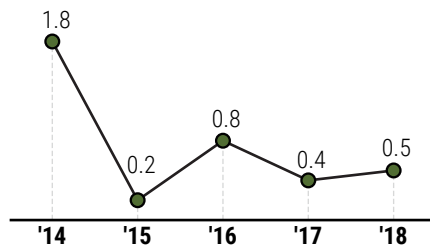

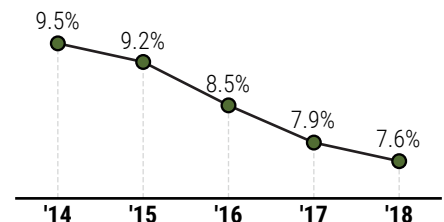

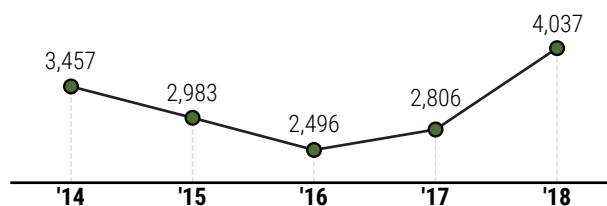

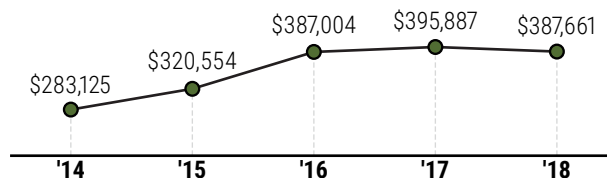
## Las Vegas Vacant Land Sales

(Number of Acres of Non-Resort Property Sold)

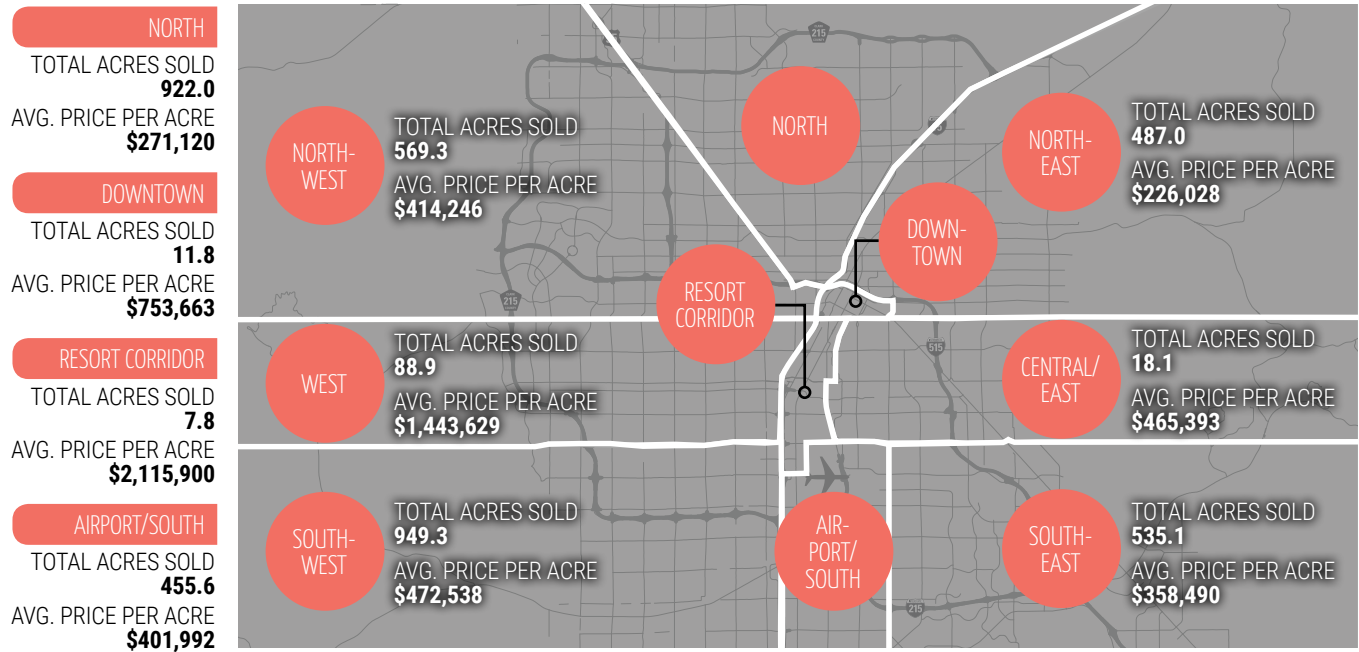

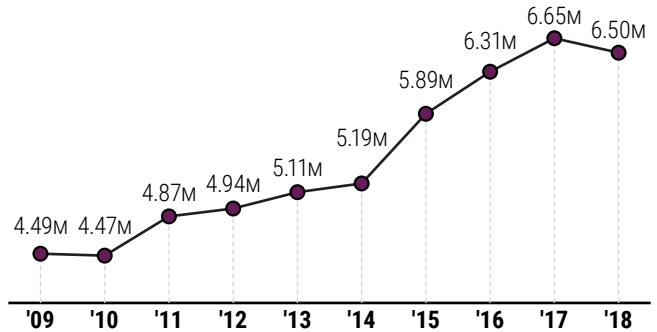

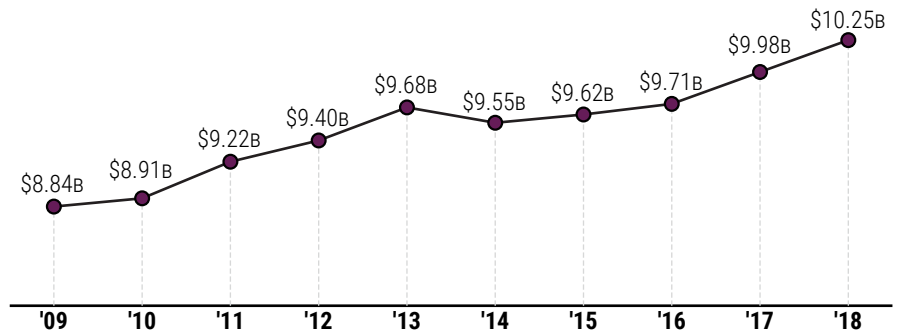

## Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority (LVCVA)

The Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority (LVCVA) is charged with marketing Southern Nevada as a tourism and convention destination worldwide, and also with operating the Las Vegas Convention Center. With nearly 150,000 hotel rooms in Las Vegas alone and more than 11.5 million square feet of meeting and exhibit space citywide, the LVCVA's mission centers on attracting ever increasing numbers of leisure and business visitors to the area.

The Las Vegas Convention Center (LVCC), located one block east of the Las Vegas Strip, opened in 1959 and encompasses approximately 3.2 million square feet with approximately 2 million square feet of exhibit space and more than 241,000 square feet of meeting space. The facility, one of the most modern and functional centers in the world, is centrally located a short distance from 100,000 guest rooms.

In addition to exhibit and convention space, 144 meeting rooms handle seating capacities ranging from 20 to 2,500. A grand lobby and registration area (more than 225,000 square feet) efficiently link exhibiting of multiple events.

The LVCVA has just launched Phase 2 of the Las Vegas Convention Center District (LVCCD), a major economic development project to expand and renovate the convention center. The 1.4-million-square-foot expansion will provide an additional 600,000 square feet of exhibit space and accompanying meeting rooms, public areas, and service facilities. It will also provide a full renovation of the existing facility. This expansion will help Las Vegas maintain its status as the No. 1 trade show and convention destination for years to come.

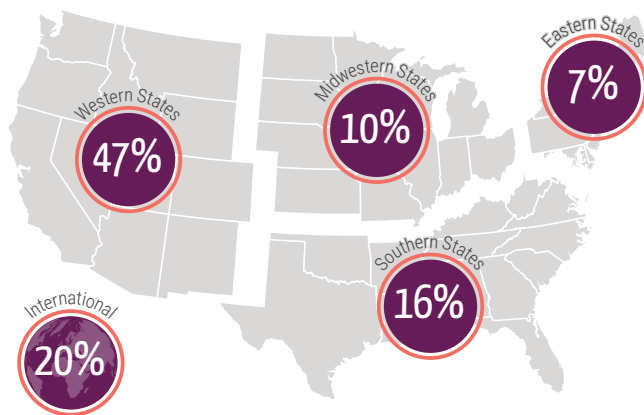

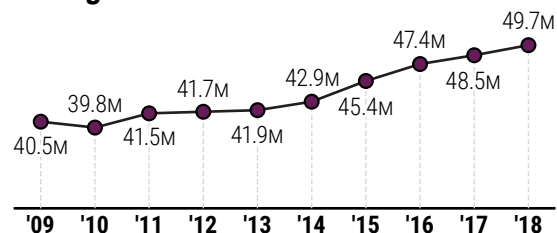

## Data Collection and Limitations

Population and housing unit data were obtained from Clark County Comprehensive Planning. With regard to specific demographic characteristics reported, Applied Analysis generated estimates which are derived from various sources, including census-based estimates and other third party providers, which were benchmarked as necessary. Year-to-year comparisons are subject to sampling variability and the influences of the survey and research methods used. Data presented in this publication were obtained from various third parties, including public and private community sources. While we have no reason to doubt the accuracy of the data reported herein, the information collected was not subjected to any auditing or review procedures by Las Vegas Perspective; and therefore, we make no representations or assurances as to its completeness.

## Community Survey Methodology

Three separate web-based surveys were commissioned by the Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance and conducted between March 7 and March 12, 2019. Respondents were selected from the current Clark County workforce and thus excludes retirees, students and other unemployed workers. The sample size of the survey was 500 with a margin of error of +/- 3.7 percent at the 90 percent confidence interval.
